
REMOVING THE SLAVERY EXCEPTION CLAUSE FROM THE OREGON STATE CONSTITUTION

No slavery. No exceptions.



THE PROBLEM:

No matter what we look like or where we live, we all want our families to be whole and our communities to be vibrant and safe. But the systems we have to ensure our safety disproportionately impact Black, Indigenous, and people of color (BIPOC) communities. This results in the over-incarceration of BIPOC individuals: Oregon's prison population consists of 10% Black Oregonians, 16% Latine/x Oregonians, 3% Native/Indigenous Oregonians, and 69% white Oregonians, despite the population of Oregon consisting of only 2% Black Oregonians, 1% Native/Indigenous Oregonians, 12% Latine/x Oregonians, and nearly 78% white Oregonians. No matter their racial identity, once incarcerated, adults in custody (AICs) are constitutionally classified as slaves, denying our incarcerated communities dignity and humanity. This is due to the language in Article 1, Section 34 of the Oregon State Constitution: "There shall be neither slavery, nor involuntary servitude in the State, otherwise than as a punishment for crime, whereof the party shall have been duly convicted."²
