### **Children's System of Care Council Updates**

## **SUPPORT SB 4**

The System of Care Advisory Council (created as a result of 2019's SB 1) was formed in March 2020 and is recommending full funding for all the 2019 investments and the creation of a full-time, dedicated executive director position based on the Oregon Council on Developmental Disabilities model.

#### **SB 4 Overview**

- Creates an Executive Director for SOC Council based on the Oregon Council on Developmental Disabilities (OCDD) model.
- Enhances accountability for funds associated with SB 1 investments. Requires the SOC Council to report back to future legislative sessions.

#### **2021-2023 Investments**

# Full Funding of the original SB 1 investments from 2019, some of which were swept during the 2020 Special Session.

- ➤ \$6.6 Million (Est. \$13m FF match) Intensive in-home behavioral health Expands intensive community-based behavioral health care for Oregon children, providing in-home services so youth are not referred to out of home placements. OHA Pop 403. Serves 1500 youth, avoids 300 residential placements.
- ➤ \$6.6 Million (Est. \$5m FF match) In-home services to strengthen families Increases capacity to provide in-home, evidence-based services for children and families not eligible for Medicaid, associated with Family First services. Serves 462 families per year.
- \$3.68 Million Crisis and Transition Services Expands current CATS, a proven way to increase family stability and decreases the likelihood of emergency department visits and youth suicide, statewide through direct grants administered by OHA.
- ➤ \$3.5 Million (Est. \$4.6m FF match) Therapeutic foster care Behavioral Health
  Treatment Foster Care combines intensive community-based behavioral health services in a
  structured foster care home that incorporates an evidence-based model for treatment foster
  care.
- > \$3.4 Million (Est. \$4m FF match) Intellectual and Developmental Disability and Mental Health resources This will fund the continued development of Host Homes (formerly known as Enhanced Foster Care) for Children with I/DD. This will provide enhanced I/DD foster care services to approximately 140 youth and provides a step down from residential as a child transitions back to a family home.
- \$5.7 Million (Est. \$3.4m FF match) Interdisciplinary Assessment Team Establishes a team of experts (developmental pediatrics, child psychiatry, neuropsychologists, etc.) to fill a critical need in assessment and stabilization of complex youth. Provides evaluation of youth, statewide education, consultation and telemedicine services.
- \$3 Million Residential services for I/DD and MH This new investment provides 12 additional beds for children's residential services for high need complex youth to support the Interdisciplinary Assessment Team
- \$6 Million Strengthen SOC at State and Local Levels Provides FTE for SOC Council, development of SOC Data Dashboard and grants to local SOC entities and Tribes.
