

Testimony Before Oregon House Agriculture and Natural Resources Committee

Subject: HB 2845 – Directs Legislative Policy and Research Office to study issues related to funding construction of wildlife corridor road crossings to Legislative Committees

Chair Witt and members of the Committee

My name is Bill Richardson, and I live southwest of Philomath, Oregon. I am the Oregon and Washington Senior Lands Program Manager for the Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation and I am speaking today on the Foundations behalf.

The Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation is a national non-profit conservation organization whose mission is to ensure the future of elk, other wildlife, their habitat, and our hunting heritage. The Elk Foundation also works to open, secure, and improve public access for hunting, fishing, and other recreation.
