RE: Support for HB 5039 & Oregon Youth Authority's Policy Option Package 115

Dear Chair Gorsek, Co-Chair Sollman, and Members of the Joint Committee on Ways and Means Subcommittee on Public Safety:

As Board Chair of Parrott Creek Child & Family Services, I work every day to ensure that we can continue to provide services that improve the lives of children, youth and families from across the state. (Please see www.pcreek.org.)

<u>Regrettably, Oregon has repeatedly failed to adequately invest in our youth.</u> Specifically, Oregon has not supported the creation of a strong, robust, skilled and financially stable array of community-based programs.

So, I am writing to you today to urgently request your support of:

- 1) HB 5039 for appropriate investment in services for Oregon's youth that are critically needed.
- 2) **Oregon Youth Authority's Policy Option Package 115**. POP 115 would provide an upward adjustment in the Behavioral Rehabilitation Services (BRS) rate to address the crippling 40 to 60% annual staff turnover community providers are challenged by. POP 115 would also provide **\$1.7M in federal match.**
- 3) Adequate funding for Sex Offender Treatment in BRS programs. Currently, organizations like Parrott Creek are providing this service without payment because it is part of our organizational mission. WE are subsidizing the cost of a treatment service that you have legislatively mandated. This is unethical. Funding this service in the BRS setting, rather than in an outpatient setting, will save the state in excess of \$1,000,0000 per biennium.

The reasons for my critical request of your support include:

- If there one area where Oregon continues to fail its population of vulnerable youth and by extension their families *and* their communities and that is in our collective investment in adequate and appropriate community services and supports.
- As a result, it is no surprise--and we should all be ashamed--that Oregon ranks <u>36th for teen suicide</u> rates,
 39th for K-12 achievement AND 47th for child & youth access to mental health treatment and support.
- The youth that end up in the Oregon Youth Authority's jurisdiction are the direct result of these failures in service investment.
- While the number of youth being referred to OYA has thankfully been declining, the acuity of their needs has been increasing. Significant mental and behavioral health needs, inappropriate sexual behaviors and offences, drug and alcohol addictions and highly challenging, sometimes aggressive, behaviors.
- Youth of color and youth from low-income communities across the state are disproportionately impacted.

Oregon has failed to adequately invest in the infrastructure and services our youth need—residential treatment, independent living, skills-training, mentoring and culturally responsive services—to best serve youth who enter the juvenile justice system.

Investing adequately in our youth means they can heal their trauma and go on to fulfilling and meaningful lives: as husbands and wives, as parents of happy and healthy children of their own, as successful employees or business owners themselves - and ss taxpayers who can invest in the next generation so that we don't repeat our mistakes of the past.
