## <u>Testimony to the House Committee on Human Services in regards to HB 2544</u> February 26, 2021

Chair Williams, Co-Chairs Lief and Ruiz, distinguished members of the committee. I am writing today in support of HB 2544.

Oregon has the highest rate of youth homelessness compared to other states. In the 2018-19 school year, there were 3,700 reported unaccompanied homeless youth. We know the number is much higher. If we want to end adult homelessness, we must prevent youth homelessness.

The number one predictor of adult homelessness is being homeless as a youth. Youth become homeless mainly for two reasons: family distress and family dysfunction/abuse, and as many as 75% have a chronic medical condition. Also, LGBTQ and youth of color are disproportionately more likely to become homeless. If a youth continues on to adult homelessness the cost to the public system is in excess of \$3M for emergency services, medical care, housing, law enforcement, etc.

HB 2544 makes crucial investments in services. Specifically, this bill will invest:

- \$2.2M to expand Host Homes, housing that keeps youth in school or enables them to return to school by providing a home, food and a supportive family. Youth living in Host Homes are 40% more likely to graduate in comparison to youth who are without housing.
- \$2.2M to expand or enhance existing shelter facilities, outreach, culturally specific services, mental health/substance use prevention, and transitional living options.

<u>Parrott Creek Child & Family Services expanded its programs during the COVID-19 pandemic</u> to respond to increases in acute needs of children and, particularly homeless youth. We now offer:

- Case Management, Transitional Housing and Independent Living support to homeless youth and youth aging out of foster care facing housing insecurity;
- Residential and Outpatient Treatment for highly traumatized youth in the child welfare and juvenile justice system;
- Transition support into stable housing
- Clean-and-sober housing for mothers under the age of 25 reunifying with their children (predominantly infants and toddlers) have been in the care and custody of ODHS.

I appreciate your continued commitment in ensuring that ALL of Oregon's children have the opportunity to grow up in strong, stable and loving families.
