A focus of the Capitol History Gateway exhibits is recognizing and honoring the collective heritage of Oregonians. Over the years, you may have noticed the panels and memorabilia in the galleria recognizing the many contributions of African Americans, Basque Americans, Chinese Americans, Latino Americans, Polynesian Americans, Native Americans and other cultural groups to the Oregon story.

Free, family friendly and educational Capitol History Gateway events at the Capitol celebrate the diverse traditions, heritage, cultures and ethnicities that made Oregonians so unique. Events include: Oregon's birthday and Anniversary of Statehood, Cherry Blossom Day, Asian and Pacific Islander Day, Hispanic Heritage Day, Multicultural Day, Oregon's Bounty, A Tribute to Veterans, Tree Lighting Celebration, and Holidays at the Capitol.
