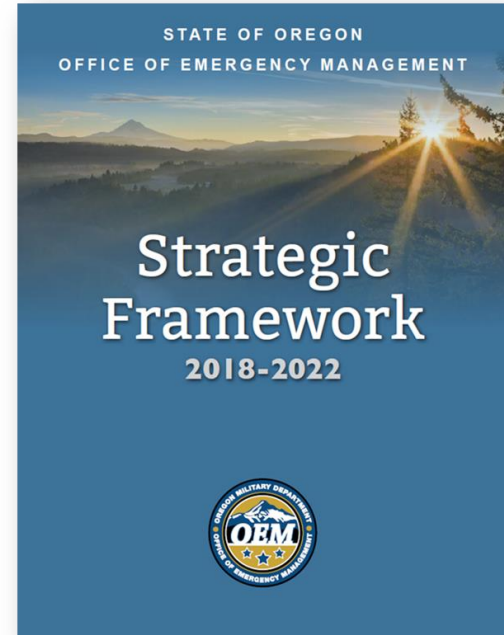

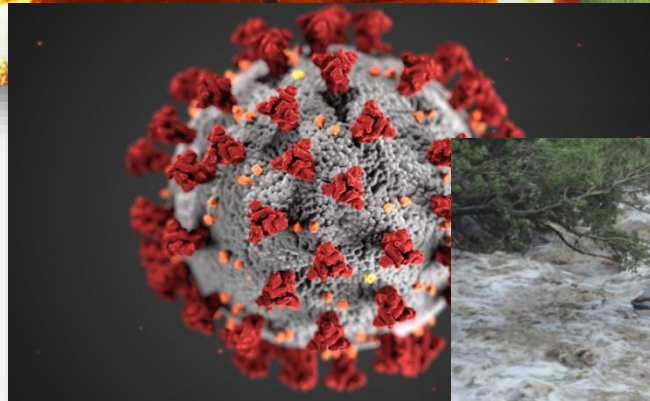


What's the Worst That Could Happen?

Emergency Management Structures

- ORS 401 and authorities
 - 401.032 places responsibility “at the local level”
- Local Emergency Management
 - Counties must, cities may
 - Different structures and capacity state-wide
- Tribal
 - Government to government relationship
 - Relationships with counties, the state, and federal agencies
- State OEM
 - Serves as the coordinating agency for state response through State Emergency Coordination Center (State ECC)
 - Connection to local and federal response
 - Subject Matter Expertise, Guidance and support

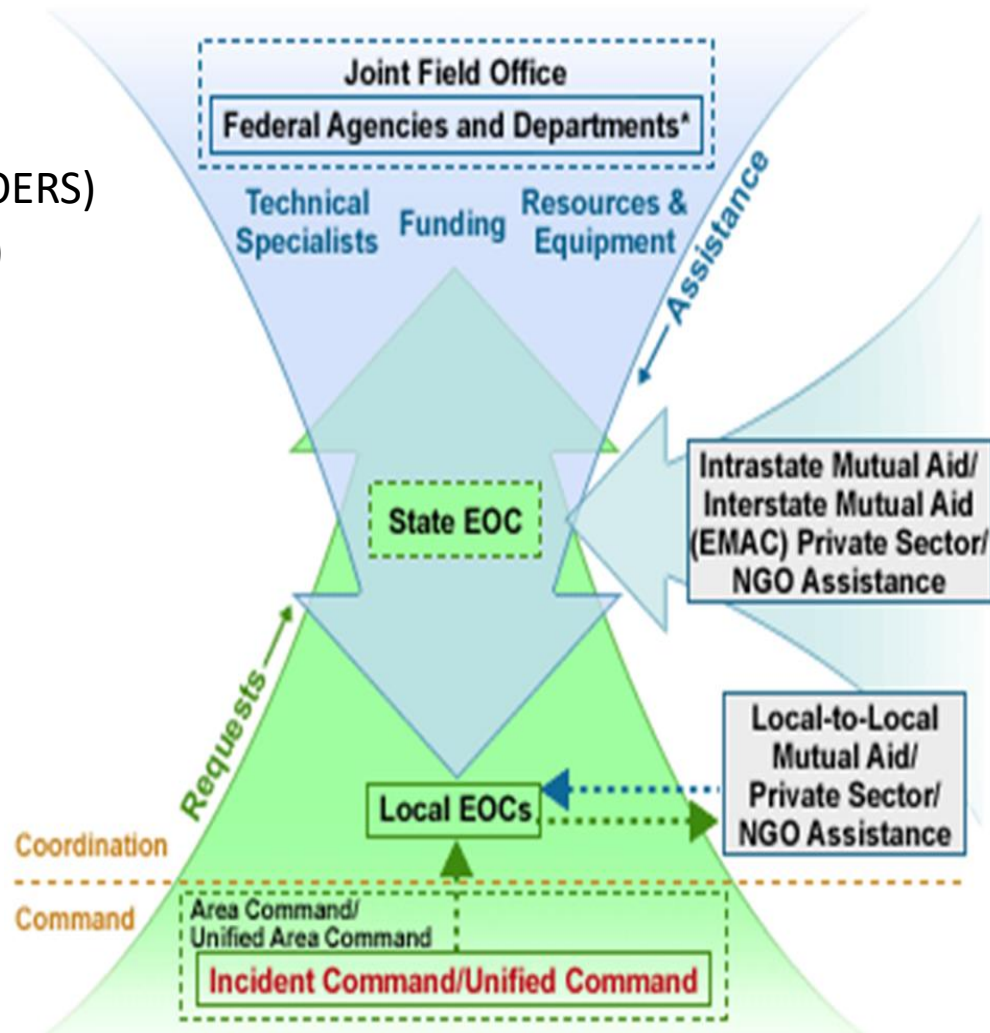

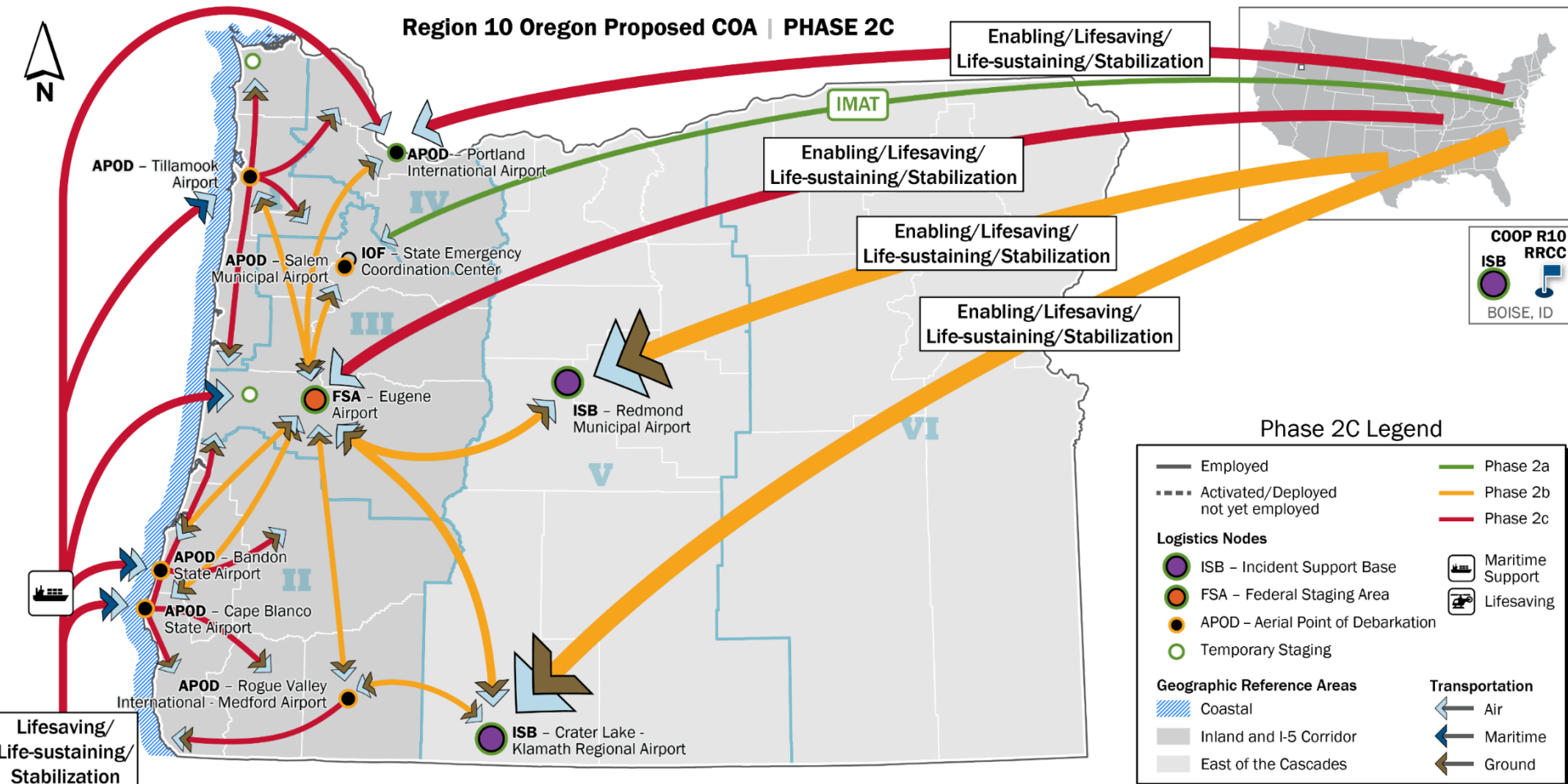
