

# Community Information Exchange (CIE) Workgroup Membership Overview

## [CIE workgroup recruitment](#)

In late 2021, the Oregon Health Authority (OHA) recruited for CIE Workgroup members to align with the priorities of the Workgroup as outlined in the [charter](#). HITOC approved in October 2021.

The application period was open Oct 29 – November 17, 2022 and was sent through a variety of channels. The Oregon Health Authority (OHA) did broad communication outreach through various agency programs and offices like the Community Partner Outreach Program, Regional Health Equity Coalitions, Community Engagement Team, and the Oregon Department of Human Services Self-sufficiency Program Partner team to target community-based organizations serving individuals most likely to experience health inequities. In addition, recruitment information was included in the OHA Provider Matters newsletter targeting Medicaid providers with over 25,000 subscribers.

The application included open ended questions on health equity experience, lived or cross-cultural experience, and opportunities for the CIE Workgroup to address health equity and racial equity.

OHA staff reviewed the 38 applications received with the Health Information Technology Oversight Council (HITOC) chair, vice chair, and two HITOC members who will serve as liaisons to the CIE Workgroup. Priorities included: representation across the types of organizations impacted by CIE; expertise in health equity, technology, social services, and health care sectors; geographic diversity of membership; and a priority on members with lived experience relevant to addressing social determinants of health and health equity and those with cross-cultural experience with communities likely to be impacted by health inequities. Fifteen proposed members were identified and presented to HITOC who approved the membership in December 2021.

## [Areas of expertise and demographic identities represented](#)

The [CIE Workgroup Membership](#) of 15 members and two HITOC liaisons represents diverse professional experience as well as lived and cross-cultural experience, and includes representation from all regions of Oregon. In particular, the Workgroup includes members with the backgrounds highlighted below.

Note: Although OHA did not request demographic information in the application, members shared lived experiences identifying as Black, Latinx, person of color, and LGBTQIA+. Some shared experiences such as being raised in poverty and using public assistance programs.

- Working in community-based organizations (CBO), federally qualified health centers (FQHC), 211info, coordinated care organizations (CCO), local public health agencies, and health systems;
- Working with immigrants, refugees, people of color, Native Americans, monolingual non-English speakers, deaf and hard of hearing, and incarcerated youth.

- Work that focuses on sexual and domestic violence, housing/houselessness, health equity, behavioral health, oral health, and public assistance programs;
- Information technology expertise, including privacy and security expertise, informatics, data, and research;
- Member who have/current use Connect Oregon (powered by Unite Us), findhelp (formerly Aunt Bertha), Douglas County Communities' Network of Care. There are also other tools used by members to support this space, such as Vista Logic and other solutions; and
- Individuals who highlighted work, lived, or volunteer experience with the following populations::

## Supplemental interviews

In addition to CIE Workgroup members, OHA will engage a health equity consultant to conduct interviews with CBOs, especially those serving culturally and linguistically specific populations, and other perspectives needed to inform the CIE workgroup's efforts.

Interviews will be important to bring perspectives from CBOs who would receive referrals through a CIE to deliver social services such as food, housing, and transportation.

Interviews will seek to identify opportunities and challenges for CBOs related to CIE and strategies to address issues and assist CBOs in participating in CIE. The input from these interviews will inform the CIE Workgroup's discussion and recommendations to HITOC.

OHA will seek input to identify potential CBOs and individuals to interview and are interested to hear from the House Committee on Human Services and public on this.
