## WHAT THE MEASURE DOES:

Establishes a dental program in the Oregon Health Authority (OHA) to provide oral health coverage to low-income citizens of the island nations in the Compact of Free Association (COFA) with incomes below 138 percent of the federal poverty level. Directs OHA to provide culturally and linguistically appropriate outreach and assistance to applicants and enrollees. Requires OHA to accept as verification of eligibility an attestation that an applicant meets requirements. Requires OHA to contract with dental care organizations to provide oral health services to individuals enrolled in the program. Specifies covered services will have no out-of-pocket costs for enrollees. Appropriates funds to administer program. Takes effect on 91st day following adjournment sine die.

# **BACKGROUND:**

After World War II, the United States assumed administration of the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands. Individuals from these islands, referred to as "Compact of Free Association" (COFA) citizens, can freely migrate, without work permits or visas, and study, live, and work in the United States. In 2021, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) issued <u>guidance</u> directing states to cover all Medicaid benefits included in the state plan for COFA citizens who otherwise meet all of the state's eligibility requirements.

Senate Bill 1538 requires the Oregon Health Authority to establish a program to provide dental coverage for low-income COFA citizens who reside in Oregon and lack access to affordable dental coverage.
