I am a retired Eugene 4J teacher with over 20 years teaching at the middle school and high school levels. Additionally, I have volunteered in a local preschool.

I first met Annie when she was in preschool. She was a joyful and curious child who came to school each day eager to learn new things. At the end of her last year in preschool, she looked forward to kindergarten in the fall.

Fall came—and so did standardized testing. "Annie needs extra practice for the test," her teacher said. "She can do that during recess, then retake the test."
