On behalf of the Willamette University College of Law, I write to express our school's complete and enthusiastic support for Universal Representation for Oregon's immigrant communities.

As you may know, Willamette has long-offered clinics to enable our students to represent clients in projects that involve immigration, in particular immigration matters associated with asylum claims, human trafficking, and matters affecting children. Because of the popularity of our immigration law clinic, we recently began offering a new course – Immigration Litigation.
