Testimony for the Business and Labor Committee Hearing Tuesday 2/8/2022 by 350 Salem Oregon

HB 4002 would extend overtime pay to Oregon's 86,389 farmworker over the years 2023 to 2027. Salem Oregon supports HB 4002 but would like it strengthened to begin earlier.

Farmworkers are some of the lowest paid workers in Oregon with a median income of \$28,000 a year. Farmworkers who put food on our table should make enough money to be able to put food on their own table.

The reasons for having overtime laws to protect workers generally apply more strongly to farmworkers. These laws, dating back to the 1930's, are needed to prevent the exploitation of workers due to imbalance in power between individual workers and their employers. If anything, farmworkers have less bargaining power than most other workers. Their working environment is much harsher than most other workers.

Climate change is worsening working conditions for farmworkers due to increased temperatures and worse air pollution from increased wildfires.

The background of excluding farm and domestic workers from protections comes from the 1930s when almost all these workers were Black. According to a Statesman Journal article published today, these workers were excluded "at the behest of white southern farmers." Although most farmworkers are now Latino, an element of racism still seems present in excluding them from the legal protection of overtime rules.

Please act now to end the injustice of farmworkers being denied the protection of overtime rules.
