Consent Agenda – Various Agencies Requests for Approval to Apply for Federal Grants

The following three state agencies seek retroactive approval to submit grant applications to various federal agencies. Retroactive approval is necessary for grant applications with deadlines that fell before the submittal dates for the September 2023 meeting of the Joint Interim Committee on Ways and Means and for which prior legislative approval has not been obtained. All agencies submitted advance notification to legislative leadership of their intent to apply for the grants, as required by the Department of Administrative Services and the Legislative Fiscal Office.

Item 5: Higher Education Coordinating Commission - Dislocated Worker Training

Analyst: Kim To

Request: Approve, retroactively, the submission of a federal grant application to the Department of Labor (DOL), Quality Jobs, Equity, Strategy, and Training (QUEST), Disaster Recovery National Dislocated Workers (NDWG) grant program in the amount of \$5,000,000 to distribute to workforce community partners to provide employment and career training services to dislocated workers, particularly pandemic impacted workers, to secure high-quality jobs in growth industries including infrastructure, environment and climate, and the care economy.

Analysis: The Higher Education Coordinating Commission (HECC) notified the Legislature of its intent to apply for this funding on July 13, 2023. The Commission submitted the grant application on July 27, 2023, prior to the application deadline of August 4, 2023. On September 15, 2023, HECC received notice that funding has been approved and the agency will distribute the funding to the nine Oregon Local Workforce Investment Boards on a reimbursement basis. HECC does not anticipate needing additional Federal Funds limitation to disburse the grant. There is no match requirement, and HECC will use existing staff and resources to administer these grants.

Item 8: Department of Education – Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention

Analyst: Julie Neburka

Request: Approve, retroactively, the submission of a federal grant application to the U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP), in the amount of \$20,872 over a period of two years to prevent, detect, and respond to sexual abuse and sexual harassment in youth facilities.

Analysis: On June 16, 2023, the Oregon Department of Education (ODE) provided ten-day notification to the Legislature of its request to apply for re-allocated grant funds from OJJDP, which made \$632,566 available nationally for two-year awards to states to invest in strategies that will ensure a state's compliance with the Prison Rape Elimination Act. If awarded, ODE will pass the funds through to the Oregon Youth Authority (OYA), which will use the funds to supplement that agency's program to install

cameras in OYA juvenile close custody facilities. There is no required state match. ODE is the applicant for this grant is because the Youth Development Council, which oversees and directs ODE's Youth Development Division, is the federally designated State Advisory Group for the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention's policies and funding opportunities.

Item 16: Department of Public Safety Standards and Training – State Fire Training Systems

Analyst: John Terpening

Request: Approve, retroactively, the submission of a federal grant application to the U.S. Department of Homeland Security in the amount of up to \$20,000 for the 2023 State Fire Training Systems grant program.

Analysis: The State Fire Training Systems grant program is designed to provide professional development for the fire and emergency response personnel community. The Department of Public Safety Standards and Training (DPSST) has successfully applied for this annual grant since 2011 and will utilize the funds to deliver a variety of National Fire Academy endorsed classes to career and volunteer firefighters throughout the state as part of their continuing education. The grant has no state match requirement. DPSST provided notice of its intent to apply on June 27, 2023 and submitted an application on July 7, 2023, prior to the grant opportunity closing on July 10, 2023.

Recommendation: The Legislative Fiscal Office recommends that the Joint Interim Committee on Ways and Means approve the requests to apply for federal grants, en bloc, with the understanding that if the funds are awarded the agencies will return to the Legislative Assembly for approval of any necessary Federal Funds or Federal Funds as Other Funds expenditure limitation and position authority.

Nature of the Request

The Higher Education Coordinating Commission (HECC) is requesting retroactive approval to apply for a federal funding opportunity from the Department of Labor (DOL) under the Disaster Recovery National Dislocated Worker Grant (DRNDWG) umbrella. These grants were previously called National Emergency Grants (NEG). This request is for the Quality Jobs, Equity, Strategy, and Training (QUEST) Disaster Recovery National Dislocated Worker Grant. The opportunity was announced through the DOL Training and Employment Guidance Letter 2-22, released May 5, 2023. This opportunity is competitive and will be awarded on a first-come, first-serve basis. Successful applicants will propose projects that include strategic partnership development or expansion, community and participant outreach, business engagement, employment and comprehensive career and training services for dislocated workers, particularly COVID-19 impacted workers and those who lost their jobs due to foreign trade.

The application deadline was August 4, 2023. DOL will award funds to responsive, high-quality applications on a first-come, first-serve basis while funding remains available. Available funds for this grant may be depleted by other unforeseen NDWG funding needs, such as natural disasters and national emergencies.

Agency Action

After submitting a 10-day letter of notification on July 13, 2023, HECC applied for \$5 million in federal funds on July 27, 2023. The proposal from Oregon focuses on providing training for those impacted by COVID-19, under-represented populations and those displaced by foreign competition. This work aligns with our mission to equitably improve postsecondary training opportunities. The proposal also emphasized the importance of providing comprehensive, necessary supportive services, including childcare, transportation, housing, mental health supports, and other allowable services to program participants to enable them to successfully complete grant activities and meet their planned employment and training goals.

Most of the funds will be granted out to the nine Local Workforce Investment Boards (WIB's) in Oregon. HECC will be using current staff to manage the work. HECC already manages National Dislocated Worker Grants through Oregon's WIB's and does not foresee a need to request further expenditure limitation to

use these funds. There is no match required and the period of performance is three years from receipt of funds. They will be granted on a reimbursable basis.

Attached to this request are letters of support from Portland's Worksystems Inc. and Clackamas' Workforce Partnership. There is no known opposition to applying for these funds.

Action Requested

HECC requests retroactive authority to apply for a grant in the amount of \$5 million from DOL.
