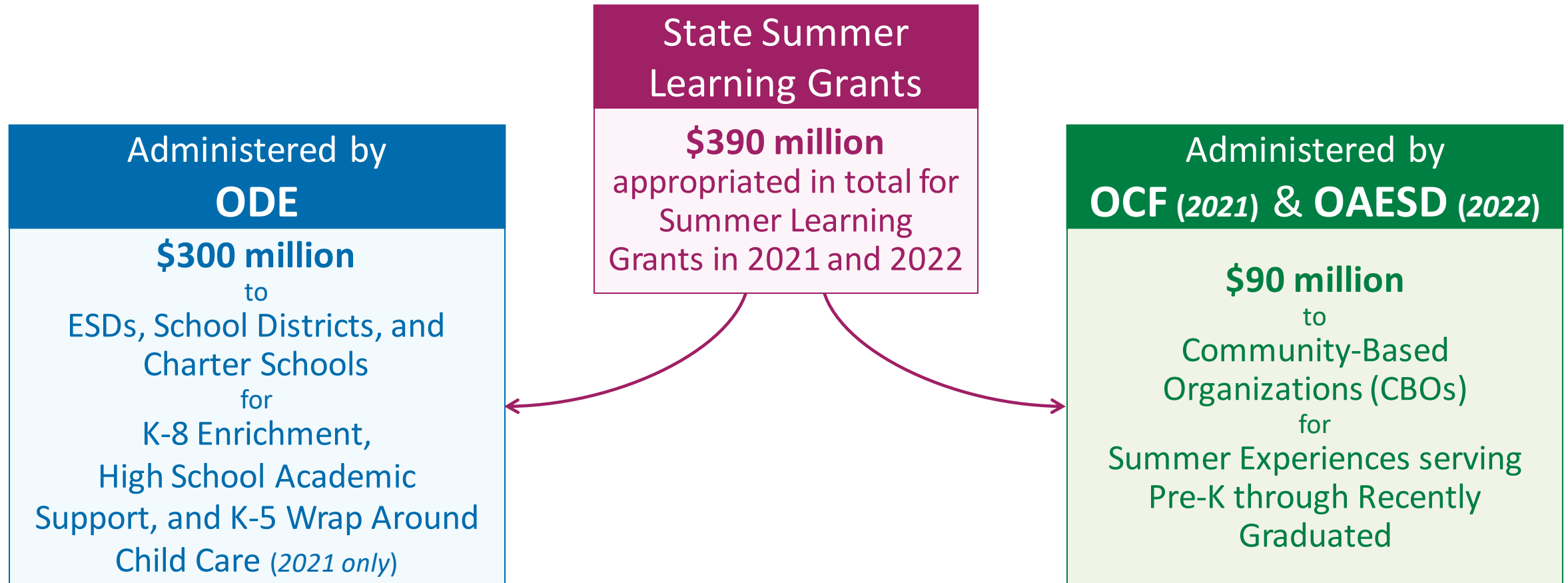

# Current Summer Learning Funds

## SUMMER LEARNING FUNDING STREAMS



### **21ST CENTURY COMMUNITY LEARNING CENTERS (21ST CCLC), TITLE IV-B**

The 21st CCLC grant is the only federal funding source dedicated exclusively to the creation of high-quality afterschool and summer learning programs for K-12 students in Title I-A eligible schools. The grant requires significant partnerships between school districts and community-based programs.

### **STUDENT SUCCESS ACT (SSA) SUMMER PROGRAM**

SSA Summer is a state funded grant program designed to provide high-quality summer learning for incoming Kindergarten - 9th grade students, with priority given to historically underserved focal student groups.

### **MIGRANT EDUCATION (TITLE I-C) SUMMER PROGRAMS**

Migrant Education Summer Programs support high-quality and culturally specific summer learning for migrant children in order to reduce the educational disruption that results from the mobility experienced by their families.

### **ELEMENTARY AND SECONDARY SCHOOL EMERGENCY RELIEF (ESSER)**

ESSER I, II, and III funds are federal funds established to assist school districts with addressing the impacts of COVID-19. 20% of all ESSER III funds (for school districts and state set aside) are directed to support unfinished learning, including summer programs. ODE utilized the designated summer portion of the set-aside to fund a Jumpstart Kindergarten Program grant.

# 21st CCLC: Evidence of Effectiveness

- **Statistically Significant Findings** compared to a matched comparison student group who did not receive 21st CCLC services:
  - a) 21st CCLC students **exceeded comparison students in both math and English language arts (ELA) performance on the state assessment.**
  - b) 21st CCLC students **attended school at a significantly higher rate,**
- **Graduation Rates** trended higher for 21st CCLC students than comparison students who did not attend the program.
- **School Day Teachers** report notable improvements in 21st CCLC students' academic performance and engagement.
- **Student Survey Data** reveals the majority feel academically supported, a sense of belonging, safe at the program, and overall satisfaction with programming.
- **Caregiver Survey Data** reveals the 21st CCLC program has a positive influence on their child's academic performance, motivation, problem solving, and supported positive relationships.

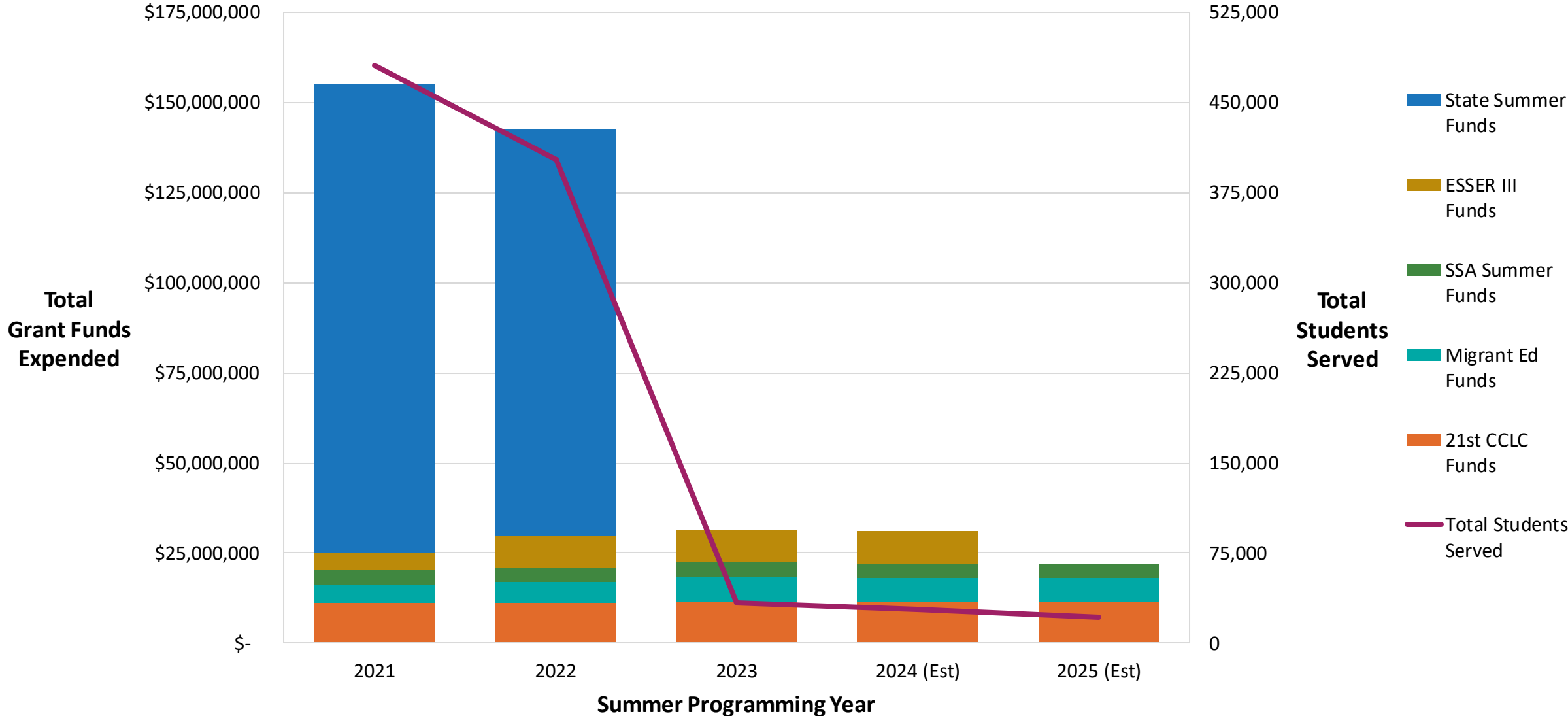
