Community Crisis Response Team (CCRT)

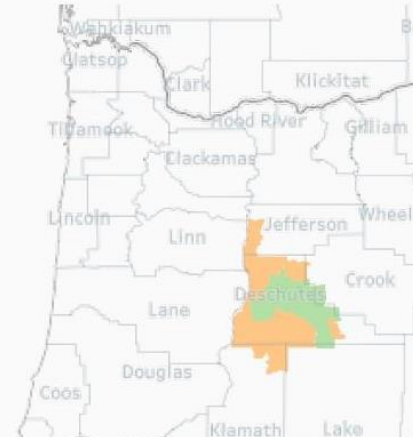
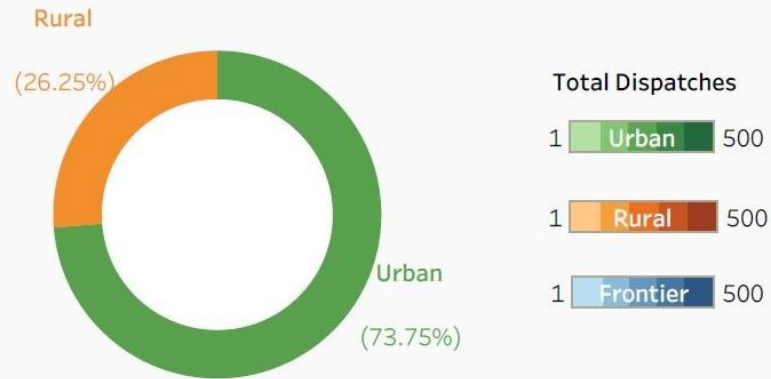
Deschutes County has operated a Mobile Crisis Team for nearly 20 years.

Community Crisis Response Team (CCRT) launched on May 1, 2023

Can respond to any location within the community without law enforcement (within certain guidelines)

Two person teams are dispatched from 911 and are directly connected into the police Computer Aided Dispatch System (CAD) and radio system

Total Dispatches by Zip Code and Rurality



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New Funding & Data

- 363k – ongoing funding from OHA
- 428K - one time funding from OHA – ends September 2025
- 328K – one time City of Bend Funding (ARPA) – ends August 2024



Grand total CCRT encounters: 1,103

- Percentage of CCRT CFS resolved via phone/consult: 71%
- Percentage of CCRT CFS resolved via face to face: 29%

Percentage of CCRT CFS resolved **without** law enforcement: 84%

Deschutes County Stabilization Center



- The Deschutes County Stabilization Center (DCSC) is a collaborative effort between Deschutes County Health Services (DCHS) and the Deschutes County Sheriff's Office (DCSO) to develop a 24/7 Crisis Stabilization Center with 23-Hour Respite
- Had a soft opening on **June 1st 2020**, a grand opening **July 1st 2020**, and have been in 24/7 continuous operation since **October 19th, 2020**





Funding

\$504,606 – Pacific Source Strategic Investment Dollars (Capital)

\$510,428 – WEBCO Dissolution Payment (Capital)

\$70,000 – Bend Police Department

\$620,000/annually – Deschutes County Sherriff's Office

\$700,000 – Bureau of Justice Assistance Grant

\$350,000 – SAMHSA (CCBHC Extension)

\$584,000 – Central Oregon Health Council

2.4 million (for 2 years) - IMPACTS Grant/Oregon Criminal Justice Commission

- Received it in 2020 and again in 2022.
- Currently set to expire June 30th, 2024

A portion of Deschutes County M110 funding supports 4 Recovery mentors



Impact and Data

From June 1st 2020 – September 30th 2023

- 11,308 total visits
 - Average of 9.2 visits per day
 - 1 in every roughly 18 residents for Deschutes County
- **18%** brought in by LE (average 4.7 min per drop off)
- **Approximately 30%** were diverted from the ED
- **122** people said they would have ended their life if the Stabilization Center were not here
- **40.2%** of visits include those with a co-occurring MH & SUDs;
21.9% of encounters had active intoxication upon arrival
- **80%** of those scheduled with follow up show for intake appointment
- **60% reduced recidivism** for those served by DCSC Forensic Diversion program
