There is created the Alcohol and Drug Policy Commission, which is charged with improving the **effectiveness** and **efficiency** of **state** and **local** alcohol and drug abuse prevention and treatment services.

What is Prevention

An active process of creating conditions that promote the well-being of individuals, families, and communities, and prevents behavioral health challenges from occurring or progressing.

The action of stopping something before it happens.


What is a Prevention Specialist

Prevention Specialist credentials requires a minimum of 150 hours of specialized training and the passing of a rigorous examination.

Credentialed prevention staff ensure that programs are delivering on their mission of ensuring public safety and well-being.

Oregon currently has 62 Certified Prevention Specialist. The recommended number for a state our size is 968.

The Cost of Substance Use Disorder

(2019) The current estimated economic cost of substance use disorder in the United States is approximately \$3.73 trillion annually, a figure that consumes the equivalent of the combined GDP of 45 of the 50 US States.

(This figure was tabulated before the current fentanyl crisis.)

The Cost of Substance Use Disorder

The rate of alcohol-related deaths (including acute and chronic causes) increased 30% from 2011 to 2020 and was responsible for over 2,500 deaths in 2020.

Excessive alcohol use costs the Oregon economy \$4.8 billion per year.

Oregon Substance Use Prevention Funding

Primary Prevention

SAMHSA requires that grantees spend no less than 20% of their SUBG allotment on substance use primary prevention strategies. These strategies are directed at individuals not identified to be in need of treatment.

That equates to just under \$4.2 million OR \$25 for every youth 17 and under

Oregon Substance Use Prevention Funding

Primary Prevention

In Wasco County we receive the minimum grant amount from the block grant. Some counties receive more based on their population. This funding source is the only stable funding that most counties receive to address primary substance use prevention.

Wasco County receives \$61,500 per year. That equates to \$10.86 for every youth 17 and under.

Since the inception of this program, there has been a 68% decline in juvenile referrals from our local middle school and no subsequent increase in recidivism.

- Legalization for adult consumption in the state of Oregon
- Increased number of marijuana stores and brew pubs
- Decrease in the perception of harm of same substances
- Increase of perception of peer use
- Decrease in the average age of onset
- Increased indication of self-medicating with above substances
- Lack of secure attachment within in the family unit
- Misperception of adult use of same substances
- Impact of social media/ technology and it's impact on the developing brain
- Lack of emotional literacy skills among care providers
