SUBJECT: Written Testimony on Medicaid (2022-2027) 1115 Waiver

Dear Chair Nosse and Members of the Committee:

Per your request, Oregon Health Authority (OHA) is providing a written update on the Medicaid 1115 Waiver. This correspondence provides a general update on the timeline for Health-Related Social Needs (HRSN) services rollout and focuses on next steps regarding Community Capacity Building and Health Related Social Needs (HRSN) service provider qualifications.

Background

Under the 2022-2027 1115 Waiver, Oregon is approved to provide certain HRSN benefits to eligible populations. HRSN services include supports related to housing, nutrition, and climate-related emergencies, as well as outreach and engagement activities. The timeline for rollout for these services is as follows:

- 1/1/2024-Climate change services (including air conditioners and air filters) will be available to eligible Oregon Health Plan (OHP) members
- 11/1/2024-Housing benefits available for eligible OHP members "at risk" for homelessness
- 1/1/2025-Nutrition benefits available for eligible members
- 2025/2026 (exact dates TBD) -Housing services launch for remaining eligible populations, including members experiencing homelessness

Community Capacity Building

Under the waiver, Oregon is allowed to spend up to \$119 million in community capacity building funding to support HRSN providers and partners in delivering HRSN services. Community Capacity Building funding can be used to support four discrete areas:

- Technology
- Developing operational practices
- Workforce development

• Outreach and education

OHA will distribute these funds to the Coordinated Care Organizations (CCOs), which in turn distribute to the community-based organizations & HRSN providers. There will be 2-3 rounds of Community Capacity Building Funding to which providers can apply. Dates have yet to be finalized, but implantation is slated to happen in the winter of 2023/2024.

HRSN Providers

Providers will need to register with either the CCO or fee-for-service program. However, they do not need to be enrolled as Medicaid providers. Service provider minimum qualifications are currently under discussion, and include:

- Strong community relationships with readiness to serve eligible populations
- Ability to provide culturally and linguistically responsive and trauma-informed service delivery
- Business licensing or accreditation that meets state and industry standards
- Ability to receive referrals, report on service delivery, and invoice for services
- History of responsible financial practices and compliance with all reporting, oversight, and business registration requirements
