Dedication: We are committed to performing our work the best we can in support of our mission, our customers, our stakeholders, the public, and each other.


Leadership: We are committed to be a leader in the Oregon fire service, to lead our organization, and lead ourselves as individuals in our day to day work.

Oregon Fire Mutual Aid System





1. LOCAL RESPONSE

Initial attack by AHJ or nearby agencies.



2. LOCAL MUTUAL AID

Local agency agreements used to bring in partners from neighboring jurisdictions.



3. EXPANDED MUTUAL AID

Local agency agreements which may be county wide or inter-county used to bolser capability.



4. STATEWIDE MUTUAL AID

Conflagration or other state-level response by resources mobilized by the State Fire Marshal.



5. INTERSTATE MUTUAL AID

State-level agreements allowing resources from other states to respond.



OSFM 2023 Wildfire Season Mobilizations



- Seven (7) conflagrations
- 17 immediate response or pre-positioning assignments



OSFM Wildfire Season - by the Numbers


Conflagration outcomes


- 6,322 structures threatened
 - \$2.2 billion estimated value of protected residences
- Zero structures lost after OSFM Incident Management Teams assumed command.

OSFM Cost to date

- Over \$9.4 million on conflagrations
- Over \$3.0 million on immediate response and pre-positioning











OSFM Wildfire Programs Report


- OSFM reports biannually on our wildfire programs, the most recent copy was distributed in August 2023.
- \$81 million invested from one-time funds into fire service and communities.
- Launched Oregon's comprehensive defensible space education program.
 - 527 property assessments complete
 - 254 trained assessors from 54 different agencies




Fire Agency Classification & Composition

Firefighters by Classification



Percentage of Volunteer Firefighting Personnel by County





Governor's Fire Service Policy Council Update



- Subcommittee on Behavioral Health: To recommend actionable strategies to reduce the risk of and mitigate behavioral health issues on the fire service and its stakeholders.
- Subcommittee on Urban Search and Rescue: To develop recommendations for all hazards Urban Search and Rescue teams that are well trained and appropriately funded, with statewide response capability.
- Subcommittee on Rural Structural Fire Protection Review: Review the ORS Chapter relating to structural fire protection to craft a report to the Oregon Legislature speaking to refinements needed to address structural fire protection in Oregon.
