


Eligibility and Prioritization

We are prioritizing distribution to individuals in need who are prone to negative health impacts from heat events, extreme heat, and poor air quality due to wildfire smoke.

CBOs identify eligible people



CBOs issue/deliver devices to eligible people and assist w/install if needed



CBOs report all distributions to OHA for invoicing and reimbursements



Program Implementation Timeline

April – Create OARs and Purchase devices

May - Coordinate with Tribal liaisons for climate supports

June - Contracts for distribution/pre-stage devices

June/July - Proactive outreach to identify eligible

individuals



2024 Summer Goals

- Establish a network of participating organizations capable of delivering climate devices in anticipation of, or in response to a heat event/emergency or poor air quality from wildfire smoke.
- Identify Oregonians with a need for cooling or clean air devices and provide supports.
- Increase health equity and access to life-saving equipment for eligible populations in Oregon.
