## Celebrating Results

It's widely known that Oregon's Bottle Bill, often heralded as one of the nation's most innovative environmental policy achievements, delivers outstanding outcomes for Oregonians. Our redemption rate leads the nation, we enjoy a major reduction in litter along our beaches, rivers, roadsides and special places, and our clean recyclable material facilitates high-quality domestic recycling outcomes. What is less known is that Oregon's Bottle Bill created a unique industry-stewardship model, with the beverage industry actually serving as the operator of the system.

The beverage industry in Oregon is proud of the role it plays, helping provide the most convenient and successful container redemption system in the United States. We're also proud of the partnerships we have formed at the community level, helping over 5,600 nonprofits across Oregon raise over \$5 million each year through our BottleDrop Give program. The 2023 Annual Report is a testament to the beverage industry's commitment as stewards of the program and OBRC's efforts to go the extra mile to deliver results for the environment, consumers, local communities, grocery retail partners, and beverage distributor members.

The data in this report is impressive: Over 2 billion containers redeemed, \$208.8 million paid out to Oregonians and nonprofits in container refunds, and a preliminary OBRC redemption rate of over 90%. But behind those staggering numbers is the heart of our system: The 520 employees across Oregon who demonstrate daily resilience, commitment, and drive to ensure that Oregon's Bottle Bill remains a source of pride and inspiration for decades to come.

## 2023 by the Numbers

For the second straight year, Oregonians redeemed and recycled over 2 billion containers through Oregon's Bottle Bill and, for the first time since 2019, OBRC's preliminary redemption rate crested 90%. That's a direct result of the convenience provided through a statewide network of return options. Individuals and nonprofits received over \$208 million in refunds in 2023, and Oregonians everywhere enjoyed the outstanding environmental and recycling outcomes the system helps deliver.

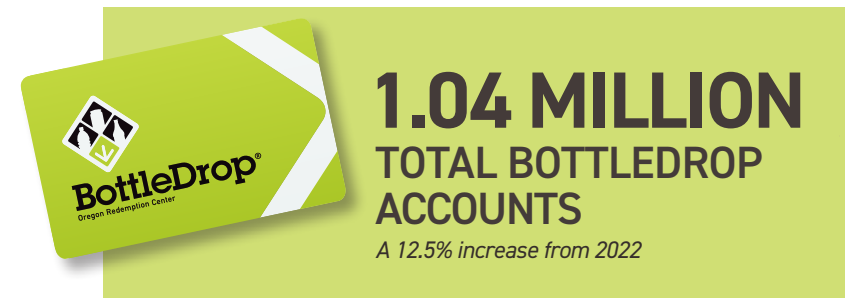
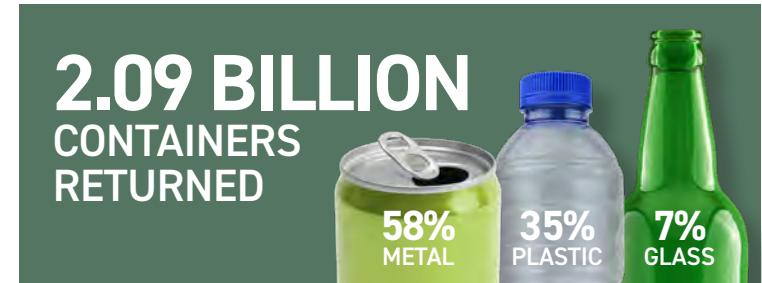

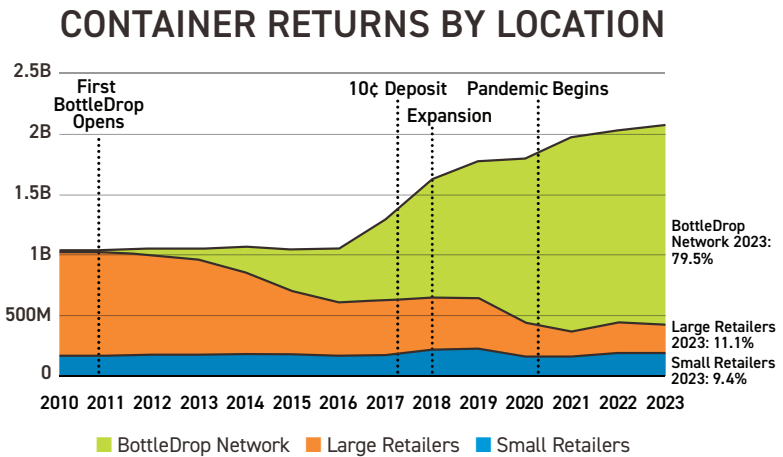

# Growing the BottleDrop Network

2023 was a year of expansion for the BottleDrop network. Longtime access priorities were realized by bringing the BottleDrop network to Crook, Wasco, and Curry Counties for the first time, with new Green Bag drop locations deployed at Erickson's Thriftway in Prineville, Fred Meyer in The Dalles, and Fred Meyer in Brookings. Yamhill County also received its first full-service BottleDrop Redemption Center in McMinnville, which opened in September. The BottleDrop network reached another milestone during 2023, eclipsing 100 total Green and Blue Bag drop off locations across Oregon for the first time, before ending the year at 99 locations.

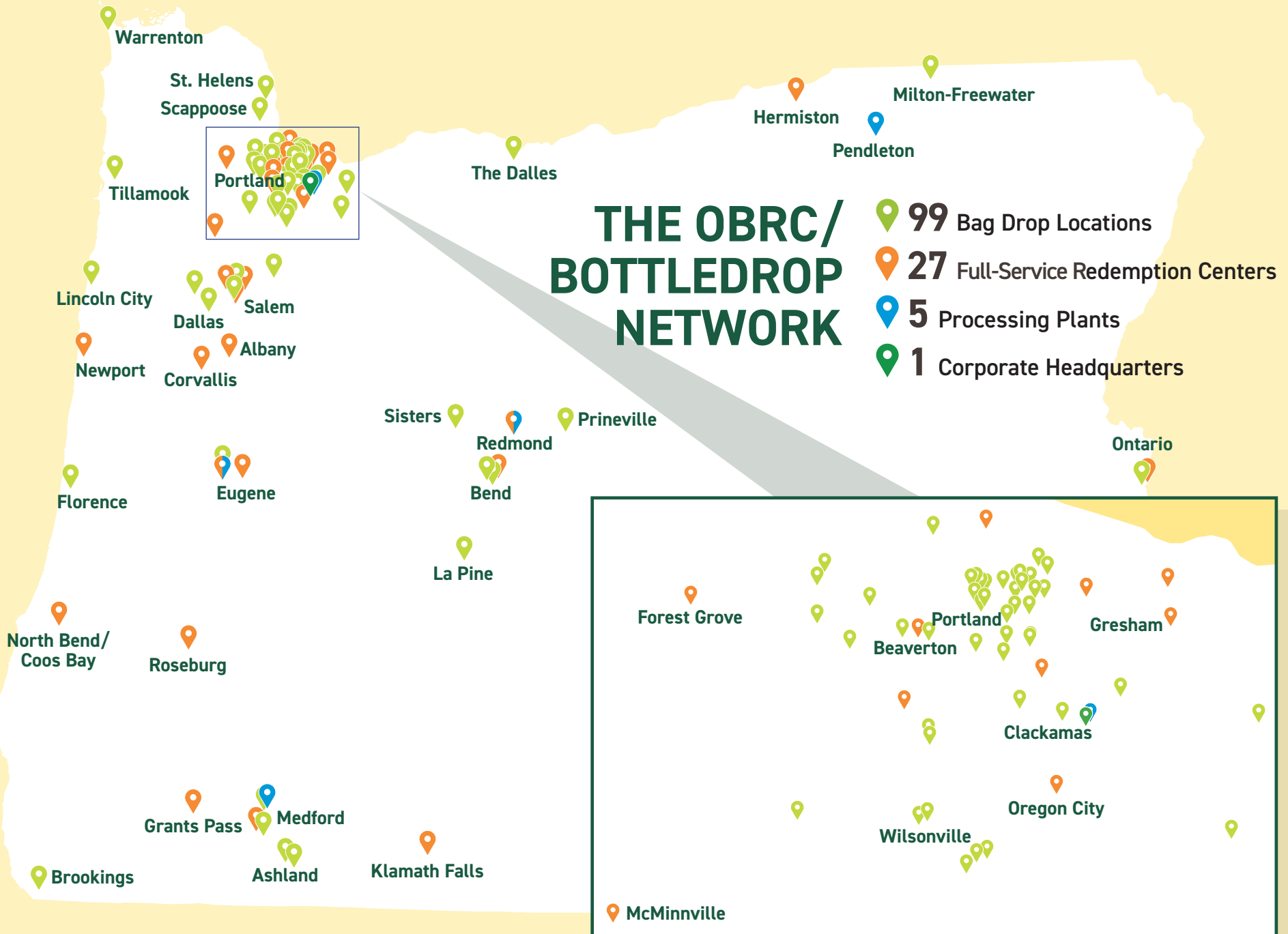

## Creating Positive Change Across Oregon

The Bottle Bill has long united Oregonians who work together to dramatically reduce litter and greatly boost recycling outcomes. That means more recyclable containers are redeemed for high-quality domestic recycling. From the beginning, it has helped protect Oregon's ocean, beaches, roadsides, and special places. Over the years, the Bottle Bill has also become a critical piece of the state's social infrastructure, as Oregonians put container refunds to work supporting local nonprofits and community groups. OBRC is proud to partner with groups across Oregon to provide additional support through OBRC's Containers for Change program, the OBRC Emergency Fund, and the BottleDrop Fund at the Oregon Community Foundation.

**Children's Forest of Central Oregon**, boosting access to the NatureHoods program, a free outdoor program for kindergarten – second grade students in Central Oregon.

**Clatsop County Master Gardener Association**, providing public education, outreach, and environmental conservation in Clatsop County.

**Columbia Gorge Discovery Center**, furthering the reach of education programs and enhancing the visitor experience in the Columbia Gorge.

**Columbia Slough Watershed Council**, enhancing access to outdoor spaces, providing environmental education and protecting North Portland's natural areas.

**Elakha Alliance**, working to restore sea otter populations on the Oregon Coast.

**Everyone Village**, partnering with a safe rest village in Eugene to provide alternative container redemption and vocational rehabilitation services.

**Oregon Bee Project**, supporting pollinator research to enhance bee habitats in Oregon.

**Oregon Environmental Council**, facilitating conversations in the Umatilla Basin to decrease contamination and enhance the quality of groundwater in the area.

**Rimrock Recycling**, helping boost recycling efforts in Harney County by supporting local volunteers.

The BottleDrop Fund awards larger grants to support nonprofits working to build community, protect the environment and help vulnerable people.



## Oregonians Unite to Help “Sister State” Hawaii

*OBRC’s Emergency Fund helped raise \$100,000 to support Maui wildfire relief in 2023*

In August 2023, the Hawaiian Island of Maui was devastated by wildfires, quickly spread by hurricane winds, that claimed more than 100 lives, destroyed property, and ravaged thousands of acres of natural areas. Having adopted the nation’s most recent Bottle Bill, Hawaii is a “sister state” to Oregon in employing a deposit return system to reduce litter and improve recycling outcomes.

As Oregonians sought ways to help those impacted by the nation’s deadliest wildfire in more than 100 years, OBRC announced that it would match donations up to \$25,000 from its Emergency Fund to help support Maui United Way’s wildfire relief efforts. The cooperative encouraged Oregonians to make container donations at BottleDrop Redemption Centers and invited BottleDrop account holders – 1 million at the time – to make donations to the Maui United Way directly from their online accounts.

The campaign generated \$75,000 in customer donations in less than a month. That meant that \$100,000 was sent to Maui United Way to help provide immediate support for families and local nonprofits offering disaster relief in the area.

This wasn’t the first time OBRC and Oregonians returning their containers teamed up to help others in need. Originally launched in 2020, the OBRC

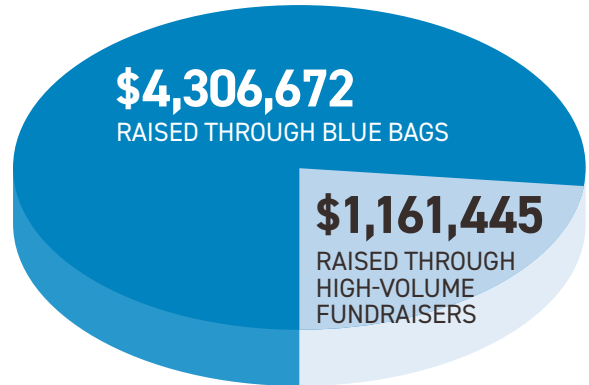

Emergency Fund aims to help communities and neighbors during times of crisis, often through matching campaigns or calls to action that provide opportunities for BottleDrop account holders and Oregonians to leverage the full redemptive power of their containers.

The Emergency Fund was first activated at the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic and raised \$200,000 for the Oregon Food Bank to help individuals and families experiencing food insecurity. The fund has also been activated to raise money for other important causes, such as supporting firefighters during devastating wildfires, funding warming and cooling shelters during extreme weather, and supporting humanitarian relief services being provided to Ukrainians through the Portland-based nonprofit Mercy Corps.

# Giving Back to Great Oregon Causes

When it comes to partnerships, OBRC is in good company. With well over 5,000 community nonprofits across the state raising funds through BottleDrop Give, OBRC helps support the efforts and causes that matter most to Oregonians. Be it the local parent-teacher association, animal rescue, town festival, food provider, environmental group, or youth or senior service provider, BottleDrop Give is part of the tightly knit community fabric that enriches lives and families across Oregon.

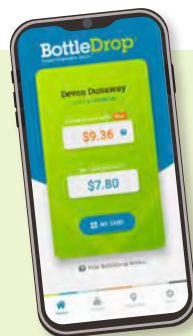

## Making Every Dime Count

Container redemption is about more than just the dime. Oregon’s Bottle Bill boosts community organizations across the state, helps keep Oregon beautiful by reducing litter and waste, reaches new heights through creative partnerships and continues to improve through relentless innovation.



In 2023, BottleDrop account holders transferred more than **\$472,972** to **4,528** Oregon College Savings Plan accounts. Oregon is the only place in the world where people can directly save for education through container redemption.



A growing number of account holders continued to download and use the BottleDrop mobile app, making accessing Green Bag accounts easier on the go. Since the mobile app launched in 2021, it has been downloaded over **420,000** times.



**218,856** BottleDrop account holders took advantage of BottleDrop Plus in 2023, making their redemption dollars stretch farther by getting an extra 20% added to their funds to shop with in-store credit at participating retailers. That’s a **9.7% increase from 2022**.



BottleDrop account holders made **3,554** online donations, totaling **\$182,437**, directly from their Green Bag accounts to support BottleDrop Give nonprofits in 2023.

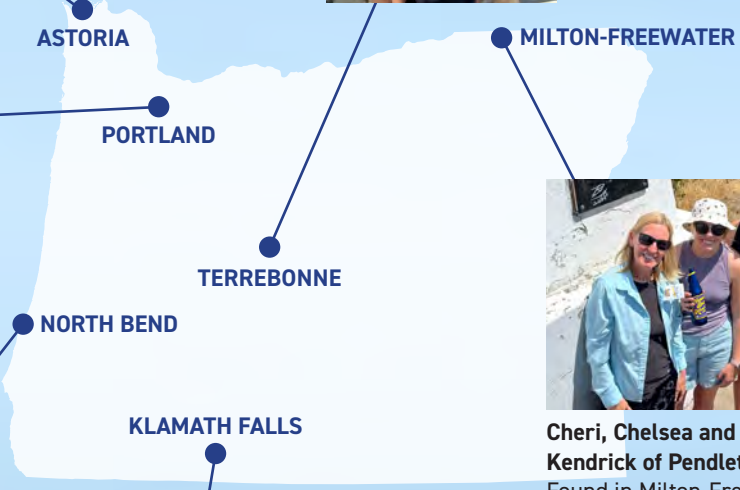

## Never Too Young to Make an Impact

When Levi Roberts was just nine years old, he was diagnosed with Type 1 Diabetes (T1D). He spent four long days in the hospital, learning about and preparing for his big lifestyle changes ahead. Throughout the difficult days in St. Charles Hospital in Bend, one program in particular, the Child Life Specialists, brought cheer. On top of providing emotional support for the family, the caretakers also brought toys for Levi and other kids in the hospital system. These moments were small joys that made a huge impact.

After being discharged, Levi wanted to give back. So, he turned to his BottleDrop Green Bag account and his community connections. He partnered with Sarah Burke, a family friend and neighbor, to help gather as many bottles and cans as possible. By placing a sign in Sarah's office inviting coworkers to bring in redeemable containers for charity, the Roberts began receiving bags filled with containers.

"A part of our healing process was thinking in the mindset of, 'How can we help others who are also going through a hard time?' It really shifts your perspective on what you're going through, and it was also a way for us to grapple with and accept his diagnosis in a way," said Levi's mother, Crystal, as she recounted the transition for their family. "When you're in despair, it feels really good when someone reaches out to help you, so we just wanted to pay that forward."

Cut to the summer of 2023, Levi is now entering middle school. Adapted to his new lifestyle with T1D, Levi is also a young philanthropist and strong advocate for juvenile diabetes. With bottles and cans, Levi has raised over \$650 for the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation of Oregon and Southwest Washington (JDRF), Toys for Tots, Child Life Specialists at St. Charles Hospital, and the Humane Society of the Ochocos through BottleDrop.

Serendipitously, Levi and his family also won the Zone 4 Hidden Bottle Hunt in July (learn more on page 10!) after participating each of the past three years. Without hesitation, they directed their \$1,000 prize donation to JDRF. Levi's unique BottleDrop fundraising efforts show what's possible when Oregonians put the BottleDrop network to work and help enrich their communities.

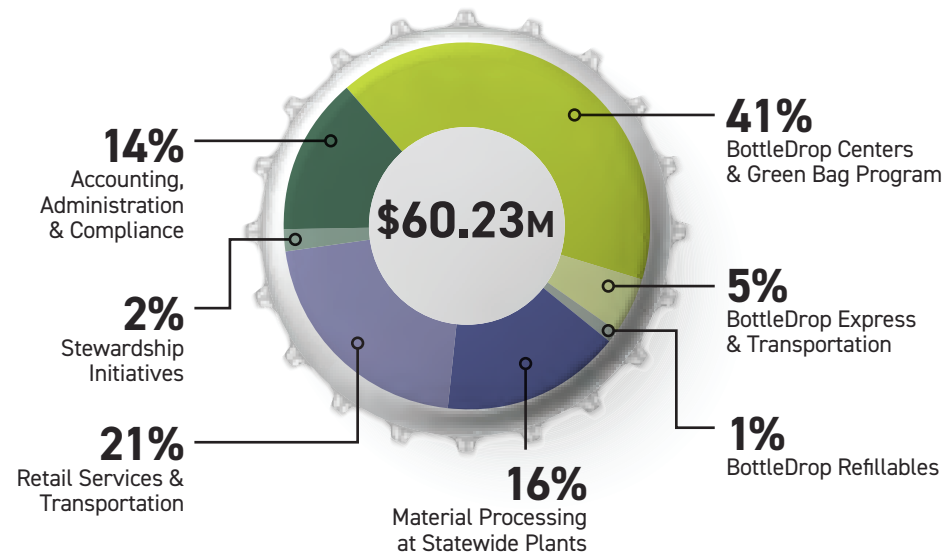

## Big Returns. Zero Tax Dollars.

Oregonians who redeem their containers responsibly get to enjoy the system's strong environmental and recycling outcomes at almost no cost – and at no taxpayer expense. That's because Oregon's Bottle Bill is an advanced form of Extended Producer Responsibility, where OBRC serves as the operational steward on behalf of the beverage industry and invests the value of unclaimed refunds directly into the operation and expansion of the network. Additionally, beverage distributors make significant financial contributions to cover the remaining costs of the program.

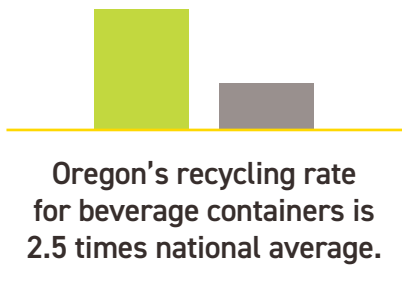
## Access + Efficiency = Outcomes

The past year was one of milestones for OBRC, especially when it came to recycling outcomes.

For starters, in August the number of Green Bag account holders hit and then surpassed 1 million. That's not only a big feat, but a testament to the popularity, convenience and accessibility the Green Bag program offers. With around 100 (and growing) Green and Blue Bag drop locations around the state, it's more convenient than ever for Oregonians to return beverage containers and receive their refunds. BottleDrop account holders dropped off a record 12.05 million bags in 2023.

Perhaps even more impressive, the Container Recycling Institute, the nation's leading nonpartisan national beverage container recycling think tank, announced in August that, for the second straight year, Oregon had the highest redemption rate in the United States.

Oregon's redemption rate crested 85.5% in 2022, with the next closest state, Maine, coming in at 78%. That trend continues in the 2023 data, with OBRC's preliminary redemption rate coming in at a staggering 90.5%. Nationally, the average recycling rate for beverage containers is only 35%, which shows the dramatic increase in performance made possible through deposit return systems. But we know there's more to it than that.



Not only does Oregon's nationally recognized system get results, but it remains extremely popular with consumers. A recent statewide survey conducted by DHM Research shows that 86% of Oregonians are familiar with the Bottle Bill, and 94% of them agree that it's good for Oregon.

In 1971, the Oregon Legislature created an industry-responsibility model while launching Oregon's Bottle Bill, entrusting the beverage industry with the stewardship responsibility to create and operate the redemption program. With decades of experience refining the system over time, the beverage industry has created the most convenient redemption options for consumers anywhere in the United States, the most efficient program for industry, and continues to achieve nation-leading recycling results. OBRC is proud to serve Oregonians across the state, as well as our beverage distributor and grocery retailer members and participants.

## An Unrelenting Focus on Quality

### *Separating Truth from Noise about Beverage Container Recycling in Oregon*

When it comes to contemporary conversations about consumer recycling, skepticism often prevails. It's no wonder, with recent media stories chronicling instances of recyclable material being shipped overseas and ultimately finding its way into the ocean or material being collected curbside as "recycling" but ultimately being sent to a landfill instead.

Too often, that leaves consumers frustrated and confused. Fortunately, thanks to beverage industry stewardship in Oregon, when it comes to beverage containers collected and redeemed through the Bottle Bill, Oregonians can have confidence that their material is being recycled domestically and maintains its Grade-A quality throughout the process.

It's no secret in recycling policy circles that Bottle Bills dramatically increase the amount of material that makes its way back for recycling. According to the recent "50 States of Recycling" report, 9 of the 10 states with the best recycling rates all have one thing in common: They've adopted Oregon-style redemption programs for beverage containers. What is less known is that these systems also protect the quality of the material more than other recycling streams, producing much better recycling outcomes.

In Oregon, all material collected through OBRC's statewide network is recycled in the United States. Plastic containers go to a recycling facility in St. Helens, glass goes to bottle manufacturing facilities in the West, and aluminum is shipped by rail to recycling facilities in the Midwest and the South, which are home to aluminum smelters and can manufacturers.

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Glass, plastic and aluminum beverage containers enter an OBRC Material Separation Unit.

With Oregon's pioneering Bottle Bill leading the way, Bottle Bill states account for 47% of all packaging recycled, despite only comprising 27% of the U.S. population. Not only does that mean less litter and vastly more material recovered, but it facilitates more circular outcomes, with 34% of material recycled into a new version of the same product, versus only 7% "closed-loop" recycling occurring in states without these programs.

Get more back. Keep it clean. Process it close to home. Give it another life. That's the Oregon way.
