Role of the Chair:

- Will encourage full and safe participation by members in all aspects of the process and assist in the process of building consensus;
- Will ensure all participants abide by the expectations for the decision-making process and respectful behavior;
- Will work with LPRO staff to develop meeting agendas, meeting presentations, and ensure an efficient decision-making process; and
- Will serve as liaison between the Task Force and the legislature

Requirement:

- Task Force must elect one of its members to serve as chairperson





House Bill 4153: How We Got Here

2024 Short Session

- February 7: Joint Committee on Information Management and Technology holds Public Hearing
- February 14: Joint Committee on Information Management and Technology holds Work Session, refers bill to Ways and Means as amended
- February 28: Subcommittee on General Government holds Work Session, refers bill to full Ways and Means committee
- March 1: Ways and Means passes measure
- March 4: House passes [HB 4153](#) (52-0-2-6)
- March 6: Ways and Means passes measure
- March 6: Senate passes [HB 4153](#) (26-3-0-1)
- March 27: [HB 4153](#) signed by Governor Kotek



House Bill 4153: Key Provisions

82nd OREGON LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY-2024 Regular Session

House Bill 4153

Sponsored by Representative NGUYEN D, Senator WOODS; Representatives BYNUM, CHAIKI, FAHEY, PHAM H, RESCHKE, WALTERS, Senators CAMPOS, PATTERSON, WAGNER (Pre-session filed.)

CHAPTER

AN ACT

Relating to artificial intelligence; and declaring an emergency.

Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

SECTION 1. (1) The Task Force on Artificial Intelligence is established.
(2) The task force consists of 14 members appointed as follows:
(a) The President of the Senate shall appoint one member from among members of the Senate.
(b) The Speaker of the House of Representatives shall appoint one member from among members of the House of Representatives.
(c) The President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall jointly appoint:
(A) Three members who represent business leagues, including trade or professional associations.
(B) Two members who represent public universities listed in ORS 352.002.
(C) One member who represents local governments.
(D) One member who represents consumer advocacy groups.
(E) One member who has expertise in ethics and technology.
(F) One member who is from the Legislative Fiscal Office.
(d) The Chief Justice of the Supreme Court shall appoint one member who is from the Judicial Department.
(e) One member shall be the Attorney General or a designee of the Attorney General.
(f) One member shall be the State Chief Information Officer or a designee of the State Chief Information Officer.


House Bill 4153: Task Force Charge

- The task force shall examine and identify terms and definitions related to artificial intelligence that are used in technology-related fields and may be used for legislation.
- The task force shall begin its work by examining the terms and definitions used by the United States government and relevant federal agencies.
- The terms and definitions identified by the task force for use in legislation must align as closely as possible with terms and definitions used in federal rules.



House Bill 4153: Stakeholder Engagement

- The task force shall seek input from a broad range of stakeholders, including stakeholders from institutions of higher education, consumer advocacy groups and small, medium and large businesses affected by artificial intelligence policies.




House Bill 4153: LPRO and Agency Roles

- Legislative Policy and Research Office (LPRO) is directed to provide **staff support**, including logistical and administrative assistance.
- All agencies of state government, as are directed to assist the task force in the performance of the duties of the task force and, to the extent permitted by laws relating to confidentiality, to furnish information and advice the members of the task force consider necessary to perform their duties.



House Bill 4153: Task Force Report



- **December 1, 2024:** The task force shall submit a report and shall include recommendations for terms and definitions that may be used for state legislation, to an interim committee of the Legislative Assembly related to information management and technology no later than December 1, 2024.
