Improving Access to Justice

- Process cases quickly
- Geographically convenient
- Easier to understand and navigate
- Specialized for Pro Se (no lawyer) Defendants
- Specialized courts can give more attention to traffic safety, mental health, and addiction

Lifting Burden of State Circuit Courts

- We save Oregon Judicial Department money by reducing circuit court caseload
- We deposit money in State General Fund: Approximately 87 million since 2018 through fine allocations
- We lift the workload burden on the circuit court, so they can focus on pressing public safety matters

9 Tribal Courts


Characteristics

- Not part of the State of Oregon
 Judicial Department Circuit Court
 System

Judges

- Justices of the Peace are Elected
- Most Municipal Judges are Appointed by City Council
