My name is James Anderson, I am a member of SEIU Local 503 and an ODOT worker out of Klamath Falls. I am writing to provide public comment on ODOT's budget and how it impacts workers who show up every day to ensure Oregonians can move safely on our highways.

With the budget crisis, we have been hearing lots about the major projects in metro areas and how they are finding ways to see them through. We understand the importance of those projects and needs of the large metro areas but the small rural areas are feeling forgotten about and that their needs are some how less important.

I believe our ODOT shop is probably the same as most with concerns about the budget. We feel the community is feeling the impact already and has great concerns of highway safety and especially in winter the ability to get to and from medical facilities, grocery stores, work etc. Local Emergency Services also have the same concerns during winter months and how it affects their responses to emergencies.
