




What Do We Know?

2/3 of youth who are homeless for <u>as</u> <u>little as</u>

3 months

go on to become homeless as adults.



The cost of one adult trapped in homelessness is

\$3.2-\$5 million

Data shows that for every \$2 million of investment, we can serve over 700 RHY youth.

So....

If just 50% of those youth for a three-year period <u>avoided homelessness as</u> <u>adults</u>, the state could save \$3.2 billion over the next 20-30 years.

Bottom Line for Legislators:

Fact #1:



Being homeless as a youth for as little as 3 months is the #1 indicator of long-term chronic adult homelessness

Fact #2:

As a result, the # of homeless adults will continue to grow in Oregon <u>UNLESS</u> we reduce the supply & cut off the pipeline of homeless youth into chronic long term adult homelessness.

Bottom Line:

We cannot fix or end adult homelessness until every community has the resources to establish an evidence-based system of interventions and supports for <u>youth</u> - - where our efforts are more likely to succeed.
