





#### Civil & Small Claims Filings Projected to Increase


Circuit courts provide a forum for people to resolve a broad range of civil cases:

- Torts
- Contract and business disputes
- Civil Rights Violations
- Small claims cases
- Statutory and regulatory violations
- Procedural matters such as contempt



#### Landlord Tenant Filings Just Above Pre-Pandemic Level

- Forecast for Landlord Tenant filings will depend on Oregon's focus on housing and behavioral health this legislative session
- Filings decreased 67% in 2020 due to eviction moratorium
- Moratorium on non-payment cases ended in June 2021




#### Families & Domestic Violence Victims Need Timely Court Access




High rates of self-represented litigants


- More litigants need facilitation services, iForms, and translated materials.
- Economic and social stressors remain high for many families.
- Families' needs are time sensitive.
- Most cases continue long after initial judgment (i.e., enforcement and modifications).





## \$1.2 Billion in Assets Under Conservatorship




## Civil Cases are Taking Longer to Resolve

- Courts are struggling with delays, backlogs, and growing workload in criminal cases (set asides, Ramos cases, unrepresented individuals).
- Criminal cases have taken priority for court resources creating a growing problem in civil time to disposition.
- Court work is slowed by high staff turnover rates, recruitment challenges, and insufficient judicial resources.


# General Principles



## Civil Filing Fees

meeting people where they're at

- Statutory fees for receiving court services @
   https://www.courts.oregon.gov/pages/fees.aspx
- Paid in advance -- law requires payment at time of filing
- Waiver and deferrals available for low-income individuals
- 99.5% collection rate
- Amounts collected are distributed to the General Fund or other dedicated sources



## Impact of Pandemic

OJD Actions to Minimize Impact of Fines and Fees on Oregonians



- Encouraged courts to waive or suspend fines, fees and costs for persons with limited financial resources (Chief Justice Order 20-006 amended).
- Suspended imposition of late fees on unpaid judgments over 30 days (Chief Justice Order 20-010).
- Suspended ordering driver license suspensions for failure to pay fine within 30 days. HB 4210 later repealed the court's authority to suspend licenses for failure to pay effective 10/1/20.
- Suspended delinquency notices, collection fees, and collection referrals on unpaid judgments over 40 days.
- Suspended issuing new garnishments on delinquent accounts already assigned to DOR or PCFs for collection.

#### How Courts & Third Parties Collect

#### **OJD Actions to Resume Collection Activity**

- OJD authorized new garnishments to resume in limited circumstances where ability to pay could be established.
- In response to statutory changes and the additional flexibility provided by House Bill (HB) 2176, OJD lowered the payment plan fee to \$25 (Chief Justice Order 21-043).
- OJD restructured the statewide automated collections process, allowing people a full year to pay in full (rather than 60 days).




#### Collections and Revenue Over Time

#### Contributing Factors to Revenue Trends


- Revenues projected to increase as civil filings, violations, and collection activity return to pre-COVID levels.
- Violations delayed during
   COVID were processed in 2022,
   80% are paid in full within a year.
- Since passage of SB 48, security posted is down 30% (\$8M) from 2021.




## Amounts Imposed & Paid by Case Type


