The Mental Health Regulatory Agency (MHRA) was created in 2018 to **protect the public from harm** by providing administrative and regulatory oversight to two regulated boards that oversee mental health professions in the State:

- Oregon Board of Psychology
- Oregon Board of Licensed Professional Counselors and Therapists

Licensing

- Determine qualifications for licensure (education, exam, experience)
- Issue and renew licenses
- Continuing education
- Forms, fees, and consumer outreach


Compliance


- Code of Ethics / Statutes /Administrative Rules
- Investigate complaints (unethical / unprofessional / unlicensed practice)
- Board review and vote on enforcement action
- Settlements / Contested Case Hearings / Appeals






Major Changes & Projects


- 2017-19
 - MHRA established (2018)
 - Continued work towards implementation and streamlining of operations
- 2019-21
 - New Licensing System (Database)
 - Online Applications, Tracking, Renewal, Fee Payment, Complaint Form
 - Automated email notices and reminders
 - Efficiency, Accuracy, & Service timeliness
- 2021-23
 - Continued Development of Licensing System
 - Diversity Study / Addressing Barriers to Licensure

Budget Drivers & Risks

- 100% Other Funds. Major drivers:
 - Personal Services: Staffing (60%)
 - Attorney General Legal Costs (12%)
 - Professional Services (9%)
- Risks:
 - Case Fluctuation
 - Limited Staffing & Impact of Turnover

- Creates New Position: Administrative Specialist
- Stand-alone administrative position to carry out the accounting and other program support functions such as accounts payable and receivable, board and committee meeting coordination, travel arrangements, and scheduling

- Limited Duration for 2021-23
- Continued Need for 2023-25

Licensing


- Supports Legislative Concept #0350
- New Limited Permit, Fee: \$100
- Estimated \$156,500 Revenue for BLPCT in 2023-25

Proposed Legislation


LC 0350: Licensing (BLPCT)

- Remove "annual" from Renewal Statute
 - Allows Board to move to two-year renewal cycle
 - Reduce confusion and opportunities for tardiness
 - Reduce licensee and staff burden
- Adds a new Limited Permit option
 - Allows limited practice in Oregon for out-of-state providers
 - Avoid behavioral health service gaps and discontinuity of care
