
2023-25 Governor's Budget

DOJ Expenditures by Division - \$845 million




2023-25 Governor's Budget



- **Grand Jury Recordation repository** was put into production to provide county District Attorney offices a secure storage location for audio transcripts of closed grand jury proceedings in support of SB505 (2017 Legislative session).
- **Deployed a workspace reservation system** allowing staff the ability to self-reserve shared in-office workspaces for a hybrid workforce.
- Made significant progress on the initiation and planning stages of our Legal Tools Program (POP #135) that will replace multiple antiquated legacy systems used to manage the Department's legal caseload.

- Organized and trained attorney personnel.
 - Conducted 30 CLE trainings.
 - Training is required by labor contract and Oregon State Bar.

Operations



- **Downsized warehouse space** in Salem as rent costs have increased.
 - Consolidated all warehouse space under one roof with multi-tier racking installed to improve efficiency and coverage with less transporting between locations.
 - Worked with several divisions to modernize over 100 offices/cubicles with adjustable height desks, monitor arms, and uniform work areas to facilitate hoteling/office sharing.
- Facility Safety/Security Installed 63 additional cameras and now all DOJ facilities have cameras installed and active 24/7 for security (over 100 cameras currently installed).
- Procurement
 - **ASD procurement processes** are 98% digitized/automated.
 - Continuing to work with DAS to implement OregonBuys system and met with other agencies to gain additional knowledge on processes.
 - Trained new Organization Administrator.

Factors Affecting Workload

- DOJ Program needs and priorities based on both client needs and state/federal regulations.
- Staffing levels to respond to project and technology needs.
- Transition to new personnel systems.
- Rapid rate of technology change and constantly morphing information security requirements.
- To ensure a Healthy Workforce, various safety protocols continue.
- Regulatory requirements Leave Laws, Affordable Care Act, Internal Revenue Service (IRS Safeguards), Office of Child Support Enforcement (OCSE), Automated Clearing House (ACH), Criminal Justice Information System (CJIS), Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA), and Payment Card Industry (PCI).



Program Efficiencies



DOJ Warehouse

- Consolidating to one central climate-controlled warehouse with racking has reduced transportation costs and allowed us to be much more efficient.
- Organized and inventoried boxes and furniture This has made it much easier for all Operations staff to be able to know where items are located when warehouse staff are offsite.

DOJ Office Footprint

- Working on reducing the Department footprint in the future with hoteling/office sharing.
- Continuing work to reduce office space in the coming biennium by 20,000 to 40,000 sq/ft per expiring leases and moving to smaller more efficient office space which will save significant money for the foreseeable future.

Program Efficiencies (Cont.)

- Automated and streamlined key systems by moving to web-based applications. (Going digital wherever possible.)
- Continued enhancement of security technologies and processes to improve management and automated alerts for vulnerabilities and security event analysis.
- **Performing 24/7 Continuous Patching** of desktops and laptops to increase security, reduce risk, and minimize areas of vulnerability.

POP # 115 – Core Agency Support Services Staffing

- **Purchasing** State agencies are being delegated a certain level of purchasing authority by DAS if the agency has Procurement Specialist 3 positions. (DOJ has none and is requesting two positions.)
- Operations DOJ has a filled position that has been limited duration for multiple biennia even after previous requests to make it permanent.
- **Accounting** Two Accountant positions to support grant tracking and compliance and to support the increase in financial activity for the agency.
- **Human Resources** One HR Analyst 2 position to keep up with the increase in the number of DOJ employees over the years.

The Legal Tools Program is a multi-biennia modernization effort to improve the legal technology landscape of the Department of Justice (DOJ) through the replacement and consolidation of legacy systems and improvement of associated business processes.

The scope of Legal Tools **includes**:

- 1. Replacement of legacy case management and associated time and billing management systems.
- **2. Decommissioning** of legacy systems.
- 3. Modification or replacement of ancillary systems related to case management workflows.
- **4. Redesigning** of business process related to the implementation of new systems.



State v. Harden (Polk County)


- Quinlyn Harden is the son of the owner and operator of Stinky Feet Daycare in Independence.
- Over the course of at least a decade, he repeatedly sexually abused children who attended the daycare.
- Mr. Harden was convicted by a non-unanimous jury of 29 felony counts and sentenced to 54.5 years in prison.
- The conviction and sentence was overturned under the Ramos decision.
- On retrial, he was convicted of all counts and resentenced for the same term.

Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC)

- Nationwide law enforcement network engaged in investigating the online sexual exploitation of children.
- The National Center for Missing and Exploited Children (NCMEC) sends each task force reports of online exploitation in their jurisdiction. The reports are known as "cybertips."
- In 2022, Oregon ICAC received 7,247 cybertips.



Organized Crime Section: Financial Crimes

State v. Abedin, (Marion County)

- The Oregon Health Authority (OHA) notified ODOJ that an OHA employee may have fraudulently submitted multiple invoices for payment by OHA.
- Our investigation showed that the employee initiated a complex scheme that involved the use of multiple stolen identities, forgeries, several falsified documents, the creation of two false internet domains, registration of a fake business, and opened bank accounts in another person's name to facilitate and conceal her embezzlement of \$1,496,720.08.
- ODOJ recovered nearly all of the embezzled funds.
- A Marion County Grand Jury indicted the employee on multiple felony charges, including aggravated first-degree theft and aggravated identity theft.
