## House Bill 3100

Sponsored by COMMITTEE ON AGRICULTURE, LAND USE, NATURAL RESOURCES, AND WATER (at the request of Representative Ken Helm)

A BILL FOR AN ACT

Relating to the integrated state water resources strategy; creating new provisions; and amending ORS 536.220.

## Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

SECTION 1. ORS 536.220 is amended to read:

536.220. (1) The Legislative Assembly recognizes and declares that:

- (a) The maintenance of the present level of the economic and general welfare of the people of this state and the future growth and development of this state for the increased economic and general welfare of the people thereof are in large part dependent upon a proper utilization and control of the water resources of this state, and such use and control is therefore a matter of greatest concern and highest priority.
- (b) A proper utilization and control of the water resources of this state can be achieved only through a coordinated, integrated state water resources policy, through plans and programs for the development of such water resources and through other activities designed to encourage, promote and secure the maximum beneficial use and control of such water resources, all carried out by a single state agency.
- (c) The economic and general welfare of the people of this state have been seriously impaired and are in danger of further impairment by the exercise of some single-purpose power or influence over the water resources of this state or portions thereof by each of a large number of public authorities, and by an equally large number of legislative declarations by statute of single-purpose policies with regard to such water resources, resulting in friction and duplication of activity among such public authorities, in confusion as to what is primary and what is secondary beneficial use or control of such water resources and in a consequent failure to utilize and control such water resources for multiple purposes for the maximum beneficial use and control possible and necessary.
  - (2) The Legislative Assembly, therefore, finds that:
- (a) It is in the interest of the public welfare that a coordinated, integrated state water resources policy be formulated and means provided for its enforcement, that plans and programs for the development and enlargement of the water resources of this state be devised and promoted and that other activities designed to encourage, promote and secure the maximum beneficial use and control of such water resources and the development of additional water supplies be carried out by a single

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state agency that, in carrying out its functions, shall give proper and adequate consideration to the
multiple aspects of the beneficial use and control of such water resources with an impartiality of
interest except that designed to best protect and promote the public welfare generally.
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- (b) The state water resources policy shall be consistent with the goal set forth in ORS 468B.155.
- (3)[(a)] The Water Resources Department shall develop an integrated state water resources strategy to implement the state water resources policy specified in subsection (2) of this section. The department shall design the strategy to meet Oregon's in-stream and out-of-stream water needs.
- [(b)] (4) The Water Resources Department shall work in close cooperation with the Department of Environmental Quality, the State Department of Agriculture, the Oregon Watershed Enhancement Board, and the State Department of Fish
- and Wildlife to develop the integrated state water resources strategy, in consultation with other state, local and federal agencies, with other states, with Indian tribes, with stakeholders and with
- [(c)] (5) The Water Resources Department, in close cooperation with the Department of Environmental Quality, the State Department of Agriculture and the State Department of Fish and Wildlife, shall develop data on an ongoing basis to forecast Oregon's in-stream and out-of-stream water needs, including but not limited to in-stream, [underground] ground water, human consumption, irrigated agriculture and water supply needs, for the purpose of developing and updating the integrated state water resources strategy-and informing recommended actions at multiple

- 43 <u>SECTION 2.</u> (1) The Integrated State Water Resources Strategy Advisory Committee is

updates to, the integrated state water resources strategy described in ORS 536.220 and assisting with the following as they relate to the integrated state water resources strategy: (a) Ensuring that recommended actions are implemented in a balanced manner that benefits in-stream and out-of-stream interests. (b) Providing a venue to proactively and collaboratively identify and resolve issues that —emerge during implementation of the integrated state water resources strategy. (c) Supporting implementation of priority recommended actions. (d) Promoting greater public participation. (e) Coordinating communication and outreach activities. (f) Promoting integration and coordination between sectors, as well as complementary 11 efforts at the state, regional, water basin and local scales. (g) Identifying opportunities for innovation. (h) Promoting interagency coordination. (i) Tracking implementation of the integrated state water resources strategy and identifying issues that would benefit from additional attention in future updates to the integrated state water resources strategy. (j) Identifying priorities for consideration in the biennial work plan described in ORS 18 **536.220 (8).** (2) The commission shall determine the number of members of the committee and ap-20 point members of the committee who represent a balance of in-stream and out-of-stream 21 interests and a balance of state-level and local-level organizations, including but not limited 22 to tribes, conservation groups, groups representing irrigation interests, groups representing 23 municipal interests, environmental justice organizations, local governments and state agen-24 cies. (3) Members of the committee shall serve terms of two years and may serve up to two consecutive terms. (4) The commission shall establish requirements concerning the operation of the committee. (5) The Water Resources Department shall provide staff support to the committee. 30
