

**HB 3076 A STAFF MEASURE SUMMARY**

**WHAT THE MEASURE DOES:**

Extends safe surrender period for anonymously leaving infant at authorized facility to 60 days from infant's date of birth. Directs Department of Human Services to design to inform the public of authorized facilities and safe surrender and requires authorized facilities to post and maintain signs.

*FISCAL: Minimal fiscal impact*

*REVENUE: No revenue impact*

**ISSUES DISCUSSED:**

**EFFECT OF AMENDMENT:**

No amendment.

**BACKGROUND:**

Oregon law (ORS 418.017) authorizes a parent to lawfully and anonymously leave their infant child at an authorized facility, such as birthing clinics, doctor offices, fire departments, hospitals, police stations, and sheriff offices, with the intention of permanently surrendering parental custody. This practice is known as "safe surrender," which Oregon enacted in 2001 with Senate Bill 199, "A Safe Place for Newborns" Law. This allows a birth parent (mother or father) to leave a newborn infant at an authorized facility. As long as the baby is 30 days old or younger, is handed to someone working there and shows no signs of abuse, there are no legal consequences for making this choice. From the point at which the child is transferred, the Department of Human Services becomes responsible for the child's well-being due to the child being considered abandoned.

House Bill 3076 A extends the period of safe surrender from 30 days to 60 days and requires facilities to display signage that explains safe surrender provisions.
