Community organizations and Tribal Governments with experience in youth workforce development apply for OCC grants


> Community partnerships strengthen the work accomplished by pooling resources, strengths, and expertise

OUTCOMES

- Provided training, practicum, and credentials for 279 young adult participants, now ready to join the wildfire workforce
- Completed 36,709 hours of priority community wildfire protection work
- Protected hundreds of structures and thousands of acres across 41 different zip codes(approximately 9.7% of Oregon zip codes)
