Measure Description:

Establishes Endangered Missing Person Alert System.

Government Unit(s) Affected:

Department of State Police, Department of Human Services, Counties, Cities, Task Force/Committee/Workgroup, Department of Emergency Management, Higher Education Coordinating Commission, Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde, Confederated Tribes of Siletz, Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs, Burns Paiute Tribe, Confederated Tribes of Coos, Lower Umpqua and Siuslaw Indians, Confederated Tribes of Umatilla Indian Reservation, Coquille Indian Tribe, Cow Creek Band of Umpqua Indians, Klamath Tribes

Summary of Fiscal Impact:

Costs related to the measure are anticipated to be minimal - See explanatory analysis.

Analysis:

The measure establishes the Endangered Missing Person Alert System and directs the Superintendent of the Oregon State Police (OSP) to establish a task force, which is required to design, develop, and implement the system. OSP and the Oregon Department of Emergency Management (ODEM) shall provide administrative oversight to the system and may recommend modifications.

Oregon State Police anticipates the measure will have a minimal impact. Within current resources, OSP has the Amber Alert infrastructure available to assist with the design and implementation of the Endangered Missing Person Alert System. However, if the task force determines a different infrastructure is needed, OSP may need to return to the Legislature for additional resources.

Counties report the measure will have a minimal fiscal impact.

There is no fiscal impact for the Department of Human Services, Department of Emergency Management, Higher Education Coordinating Commission, or Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde, Confederated Tribes of Siletz, Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs, Burns Paiute Tribe, Confederated Tribes of Coos, Lower Umpqua and Siuslaw Indians, Confederated Tribes of Umatilla Indian Reservation, Coquille Indian Tribe, Cow Creek Band of Umpqua Indians, Klamath Tribes.

The Legislative Fiscal Office (LFO) requested, but has not received, fiscal impact information from cities. In absence of this information, the fiscal impact to cities is indeterminate. If fiscal impact information is provided by cities, LFO will issue a revised fiscal impact statement.
