Summary of Revenue Changes

The Mental Health Regulatory Agency (MHRA) was established in 2018. MHRA's mission is to provide administrative and regulatory oversight of two boards that regulate mental health professions in Oregon: the Board of Licensed Professional Counselors and Therapists (BLPCT) and the Board of Psychology (BOP). MHRA is supported solely from Other Funds generated from licensing fees, applications, examinations, and other miscellaneous sources, including civil penalties and sales of publications.

The Education Subcommittee recommended budget includes a fee establishment for BLPCT to issue a limited permit for a professional counselor or marriage and family therapist who is licensed in another state to practice in Oregon for a limited amount of time. With the approval of the Subcommittee's recommended budget, MHRA's projected ending balance is equivalent to six months of operating expenses.

Summary of Education Subcommittee Action

MHRA performs budgeting, recordkeeping, staffing, contracting, procedure and policymaking, and performance and standard setting functions for both Boards. BLPCT and BOP maintain their own separate statutory authority to investigate complaints, enforce regulations, establish and collect fees, establish licensing criteria for education, training and examination, and establish practice standards, including the adoption of a code of ethics.

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The Subcommittee recommended a budget for MHRA of \$5,774,268 Other Funds and 15 positions (15.00 FTE). This is a 5.2 percent increase from 2021-23 Legislatively Approved Budget. The budget includes an increase of one position (1.00 FTE) from the 2021-23 Legislatively Approved Budget.

Board of Licensed Professional Counselors and Therapists

The mission of BLPCT is to protect the health and well-being of Oregon citizens by setting a strong ethical standard of practice through the regulation of counselors and marriage and family therapists. The Board consists of one program unit, which is divided into five core activities: applications, examinations, licensing, continuing education, and consumer protection. The Subcommittee recommended a budget of \$3,985,666 Other Funds and 15 positions (11.05 FTE). The Subcommittee recommended the following packages:

<u>Package 090: Analyst Adjustments</u>. This package includes adjustments totaling an expenditure limitation increase of \$291,410 Other Funds. The expenditure adjustments include an increase of \$3,616 Other Funds for board member stipends, which was not included in the 2023-25 base budget, and an increase of \$287,794 Other Funds to account for a cost reallocation that transfers 0.65 FTE from BOP to BLPCT. This package also decreases BLPCT fee revenue by \$377,835 to reflect various fee decreases anticipated in the 2023-25 biennium.

<u>Package 100: Administrative Specialist Position</u>. This package increases Other Funds expenditure limitation by \$136,787 for the BLPCT's portion of one permanent full-time Administrative Specialist Position (0.75 FTE) to assist in accounting and program support functions for the agency.

<u>Package 101: Investigator Position</u>. This package increases Other Funds expenditure limitation by \$134,297 for BLPCT's portion to continue the limited duration Investigator position (0.75 FTE) as a permanent full-time position. This position assists with the Board's growing investigation backlog by performing complaint investigations and investigation reporting and documentation.

<u>Package 102: Licensing</u>. This package increases revenue for BLPCT by an estimated \$156,500 Other Funds, to be collected upon the passage of House Bill 3300 (2023), which authorizes the Board to issue a limited permit and impose a fee for out-of-state providers seeking temporary licensure in Oregon. This package assumes a limited permit fee of \$100 per applicant and is effective January 1, 2024.

Board of Psychology

The mission of BOP is to promote, preserve, and protect the public health and welfare of Oregonians by ensuring the ethical and legal practice of psychology. The Board consists of one program unit, which is divided into five core activities: applications, examinations, licensing, continuing education, and consumer protection. The Subcommittee recommended a budget of \$1,788,602 Other Funds and zero positions (3.95 FTE). The Subcommittee recommended the following packages:

<u>Package 090: Analyst Adjustments</u>. This package includes adjustments totaling an expenditure limitation reduction of \$279,658 Other Funds. The expenditure adjustments include an increase of \$8,136 Other Funds for the board member stipends, which was not included in the 2023-25

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base budget, and a decrease of \$287,794 Other Funds to account for a cost reallocation that transfers 0.65 FTE from BOP to BLPCT. This package also decreases BOP fee revenue by \$344,576 to reflect various fee decreases anticipated in the 2023-25 biennium.

<u>Package 100: Administrative Specialist Position</u>. This package increases Other Funds expenditure limitation by \$45,632 for the BOP's portion of one permanent full-time Administrative Specialist Position (0.25 FTE) to assist in accounting and program support functions for the agency.

<u>Package 101: Investigator Position</u>. This package increases Other Funds expenditure limitation by \$44,765 for BOP's portion to continue the limited duration Investigator position (0.25 FTE) as a permanent full-time position. This position assists with the Board's growing investigation backlog by performing complaint investigations and investigation reporting and documentation.
