House Bill 2459

Sponsored by Representative NOSSE (Presession filed.)

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Appropriates moneys to Oregon Business Development Department to distribute to Oregon cultural organizations in response to negative impact of COVID-19 pandemic on organization finances. Declares emergency, effective on passage.

4	SECTION 1. There is appropriated to the Oregon Business Development Department, for						
5	the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$50,150,000 for						
6	the purpose of carrying out the provisions of section 2 of this 2023 Act.						
7	SECTION 2. After withholding \$150,000 from the moneys appropriated under section 1 of						
8	this 2023 Act for its costs in administering this section and section 3 of this 2023 Act, the						
9	Oregon Business Development Department shall distribute \$22,567,995.51 as follows:

(b) "Oregon cultural organization" means a public or private entity, whether operated 7 for profit or as a nonprofit organization, that: 8

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(A) Has its business headquarters, and operates primarily, in this state;

(B) Operates primarily for the purpose of producing, promoting or presenting the arts, 10 culture, humanities, heritage or live cultural entertainment, other than adult entertainment, 11 12to the public; and

13 (C)(i) Operates as a public facility, performing arts organization, museum, historical site, visual arts organization, county fairgrounds, cultural entity within a federally recog-14 15 nized Indian tribe based in Oregon or community event organization; or

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(ii) Produces cultural projects or programs for the public.

(2) The Oregon Business Development Department shall use \$27,432,004.49 of the mon-1718 eys appropriated under section 1 of this 2023 Act to develop and implement a program for awarding grants directly to Oregon cultural organizations. 19

(3) To be eligible for a grant, an Oregon cultural organization must demonstrate to the 20department's satisfaction that, at any time during fiscal year 2020 through fiscal year 2023, 2122the organization experienced a significant loss in earned revenue because of statewide man-23dates, or guidance of the Oregon Health Authority, in response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

(4)(a) The department shall prescribe the form and process by which Oregon cultural 2425organizations may apply for and be awarded grants under the program.

(b) The department may require applicants to demonstrate need, as described in sub-2627section (6) of this section, in the form of:

(A) The organization's federal tax returns for the periods to which the application re-28lates; or 29

30 (B) Financial documentation, including, but not limited to, audited financial statements 31 or financial statements that have been approved by a certified public accountant.

(5) The department may consult with the Trust for Cultural Development Board in re-32viewing applications and awarding grants. 33

34 (6) The department shall develop an equitable funding allocation so that grant moneys 35 shall be awarded, subject to subsections (7) and (8) of this section, with priority given to applicants who have experienced the greatest proportional loss, as measured by the ratio of 36 37 an applicant's total lost earned revenue to the applicant's total earned revenue for each fis-38 cal year, beginning with fiscal year 2019, to which the application relates.

(7) Subject to subsection (8) of this section, the department shall develop award allo-39 cation options that take into account an equitable percentage of an applicant's fiscal size and 40 lost earned revenue and available funding. 41

(8) Under consultation with the Trust for Cultural Development Board, the department 42 shall award grant moneys proportionately among the geographic regions of this state, as 43 defined by the department, based on the relative population of, and the number of eligible 44 applications received from Oregon cultural organizations located in, each region. Regions 45

but not limited to, membership, admission tickets, rentals, exhibitions, merchandise, food

(B) "Earned revenue" does not include donations, federal, state or local governmental

SECTION 3. (1) As used in this section:

grants, or returns on investments.

1 may be defined according to the service areas of cultural coalitions operating under the 2 auspices of the board and grant moneys may be distributed through the cultural coalitions.

3 (9) Before awarding grants, the department may withhold an amount, not to exceed five
4 percent of the total amount appropriated under section 1 of this 2023 Act, to reimburse the
5 department for the actual costs of developing and implementing the program.

6 (10) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, this section shall apply to any grant 7 moneys that the department awards to an Oregon cultural organization on or after the ef-8 fective date of this 2023 Act in response to the negative impact of the COVID-19 pandemic 9 on the organization's earned revenue.

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SECTION 4. (1) Section 3 of this 2023 Act becomes operative on January 1, 2024.

(2) The Oregon Business Development Department may take any action before the operative date specified in subsection (1) of this section that is necessary for the department to exercise, on and after the operative date specified in subsection (1) of this section, all the powers, duties and functions conferred on the department under section 3 of this 2023 Act.

15 <u>SECTION 5.</u> This 2023 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public 16 peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2023 Act takes effect 17 on its passage.

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
