

House Bill 2583

Sponsored by Representative DIEHL (at the request of Nick Haskins, former Representative Raquel Moore-Green)
(Presession filed.)

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Changes term "physician assistant" to "physician associate."

Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

19 **SECTION 1.** ORS 677.097 is amended to read:

20 677.097. (1) In order to obtain the informed consent of a patient, a physician or [*physician as-*
21 *stant*] **physician associate** shall explain the following:

- 22 (a) In general terms the procedure or treatment to be undertaken;
23 (b) That there may be alternative procedures or methods of treatment, if any; and
24 (c) That there are risks, if any, to the procedure or treatment.
25

26 (2) After giving the explanation specified in subsection (1) of this section, the physician or
27 [*physician assistant*] **physician associate** shall ask the patient if the patient wants a more detailed
28 explanation. If the patient requests further explanation, the physician or [*physician assistant*] **phy-**
29 **sician associate** shall disclose in substantial detail the procedure, the viable alternatives and the
30 material risks unless to do so would be materially detrimental to the patient. In determining that
31 further explanation would be materially detrimental the physician or [*physician assistant*] **physician**

1 **associate** shall give due consideration to the standards of practice of reasonable medical or
 2 podiatric practitioners in the same or a similar community under the same or similar circumstances.

3 **SECTION 2.** ORS 677.135, as amended by section 16, chapter 45, Oregon Laws 2022, and section
 4 3, chapter 62, Oregon Laws 2022, is amended to read:

5 677.135. As used in ORS 677.135 to 677.141:

6 (1) “The practice of medicine across state lines” means:

7 (a) The rendering directly to a person of a written or otherwise documented medical opinion
 8 concerning the diagnosis or treatment of that person located within this state for the purpose of
 9 patient care by a physician or [*physician assistant*] **physician associate** located outside this state
 10 as a result of the transmission of individual patient data by telemedicine, as defined in section 14,
 11 chapter 45, Oregon Laws 2022, from within this state to that physician, the physician’s agent or a
 12 [*physician assistant*] **physician associate**; or

13 (b) The rendering of medical treatment directly to a person located within this state by a phy-
 14 sician or a [*physician assistant*] **physician associate** located outside this state as a result of the
 15 outward transmission of individual patient data by telemedicine from within this state to that phy-
 16 sician, the physician’s agent or a [*physician assistant*] **physician associate**.

17 (2) “The practice of medicine across state lines” does not include the practice of medicine by
 18 a person practicing in this state under section 1, chapter 62, Oregon Laws 2022.

19 **SECTION 3.** ORS 677.137 is amended to read:

20 677.137. (1) A person may not engage in the practice of medicine across state lines, claim qual-
 21 ification to engage in the practice of medicine across state lines or use any title, word or abbrevi-
 22 ation to indicate or to induce another to believe that the person is licensed to engage in the practice
 23 of medicine across state lines unless the person is licensed in accordance with ORS 677.139.

24 (2) ORS 677.135 to 677.141 do not apply to a physician or [*physician assistant*] **physician asso-**
 25 **ciate** engaging in the practice of medicine across state lines in an emergency, as defined by rule
 26 of the Oregon Medical Board.

27 (3) ORS 677.135 to 677.141 do not apply to a licensed physician or [*physician assistant*] **physician**
 28 **associate** located outside this state who:

29 (a) Consults with another physician or [*physician assistant*] **physician associate** licensed to
 30 practice medicine in this state; and

31 (b) Does not undertake the primary responsibility for diagnosing or rendering treatment to a
 32 patient within this state.

33 (4) ORS 677.135 to 677.141 do not apply to a licensed physician or [*physician assistant*] **physician**
 34 **associate** located outside this state who has an established physician-patient relationship with a
 35 person who is in Oregon temporarily and who requires the direct medical treatment by that physi-
 36 cian or [*physician assistant*] **physician associate**.

37 **SECTION 4.** ORS 677.139 is amended to read:

38 677.139. (1) Upon application, the Oregon Medical Board may issue to an out-of-state physician
 39 or [*physician assistant*] **physician associate** a license for the practice of medicine across state lines
 40 if the physician or [*physician assistant*] **physician associate** holds a full, unrestricted license to
 41 practice medicine in any other state of the United States, has not been the recipient of a profes-
 42 sional sanction by any other state of the United States and otherwise meets the standards for
 43 Oregon licensure under this chapter.

44 (2) In the event that an out-of-state physician or [*physician assistant*] **physician associate** has
 45 been the recipient of a professional sanction by any other state of the United States, the board may

1 issue a license for the practice of medicine across state lines if the board finds that the sanction
 2 does not indicate that the physician or [*physician assistant*] **physician associate** is a potential
 3 threat to the public interest, health, welfare and safety.

4 (3) A physician or [*physician assistant*] **physician associate** shall apply on a form provided by
 5 the board, accompanied by nonrefundable fees for the application and the license in amounts deter-
 6 mined by rule of the board. The board shall adopt necessary and proper rules to govern the renewal
 7 of licenses issued under this section.

8 (4) A license for the practice of medicine across state lines is not a limited license for purposes
 9 of ORS 677.132.

10 (5) A license for the practice of medicine across state lines does not permit a physician or
 11 [*physician assistant*] **physician associate** to practice medicine in this state except when engaging
 12 in the practice of medicine across state lines.

13 **SECTION 5.** ORS 677.141 is amended to read:

14 677.141. (1) A physician or [*physician assistant*] **physician associate** issued a license under ORS
 15 677.139:

16 (a) Is subject to all the provisions of this chapter and to all the rules of the Oregon Medical
 17 Board; and

18 (b) Has the same duties and responsibilities and is subject to the same penalties and sanctions
 19 as any other physician or [*physician assistant*] **physician associate** licensed under this chapter.

20 (2) A physician or [*physician assistant*] **physician associate** issued a license under ORS 677.139
 21 may not:

22 (a) Act as a dispensing physician as defined in ORS 677.010;

23 (b) Administer controlled substances for the treatment of intractable pain to a person located
 24 within this state;

25 (c) Provide written documentation for purposes of ORS 475C.783;

26 (d) Employ a [*physician assistant*] **physician associate** as defined in ORS 677.495 to treat a
 27 person located within this state; or

28 (e) Assert a lien for services under ORS 87.555.

29 (3) A physician or [*physician assistant*] **physician associate** licensed under ORS 677.139 shall
 30 comply with all patient confidentiality requirements of this state, except as those requirements are
 31 expressly prohibited by the law of any other state of the United States where a person's medical
 32 records are maintained.

33 **SECTION 6.** ORS 677.235 is amended to read:

34 677.235. (1) The Oregon Medical Board consists of 14 members appointed by the Governor and
 35 subject to confirmation by the Senate in the manner provided in ORS 171.562 and 171.565. All
 36 members of the board must be residents of this state. Of the members of the board:

37 (a) Seven must have the degree of Doctor of Medicine;

38 (b) Two must have the degree of Doctor of Osteopathic Medicine;

39 (c) One must have the degree of Doctor of Podiatric Medicine;

40 (d) One must be a [*physician assistant*] **physician associate** licensed under ORS 677.512 or a
 41 retired [*physician assistant*] **physician associate**; and

42 (e) Three must be members of the public who represent health consumers.

43 (2)(a)(A) Board members required to possess the degree of Doctor of Medicine may be selected
 44 by the Governor from a list of three to five candidates for each member described in subsection
 45 (1)(a) of this section whose term expires in that year, submitted by the Oregon Medical Association

1 not later than February 1.

2 (B) Board members required to possess the degree of Doctor of Osteopathic Medicine may be
 3 selected by the Governor from a list of three to five candidates for each member described in sub-
 4 section (1)(b) of this section whose term expires in that year, submitted by the Osteopathic Physi-
 5 cians and Surgeons of Oregon, Inc., not later than February 1.

6 (C) The board member required to possess the degree of Doctor of Podiatric Medicine may be
 7 selected by the Governor from a list of three to five candidates for the member described in sub-
 8 section (1)(c) of this section whose term expires in that year, submitted by the Oregon Podiatric
 9 Medical Association not later than February 1.

10 (D) The board member required to be a [*physician assistant*] **physician associate** licensed under
 11 ORS 677.512 or a retired [*physician assistant*] **physician associate** may be selected by the Governor
 12 from a list of three to five candidates for the member described in subsection (1)(d) of this section
 13 whose term expires in that year, submitted by the Oregon Society of Physician Assistants not later
 14 than February 1.

15 (b) Members who are physicians and the member who is a [*physician assistant*] **physician as-**
 16 **sociate** or a retired [*physician assistant*] **physician associate** must have been in the active practice
 17 of their profession for at least five years immediately preceding their appointment.

18 (c)(A) A public member may not be otherwise eligible for appointment to the board.

19 (B) A public member, or the spouse, domestic partner, child, parent or sibling of a public mem-
 20 ber, may not be a licensed health care professional in this state.

21 (d)(A) In selecting the members of the board, the Governor shall strive to balance the repre-
 22 sentation on the board according to geographic areas of this state and ethnicity.

23 (B) Of the members described in subsection (1)(a) to (d) of this section, at least one member must
 24 be appointed from each federal congressional district.

25 (3)(a) The term of office of each board member is three years, but a member serves at the
 26 pleasure of the Governor. The terms must be staggered so that no more than five terms end each
 27 year. A term begins on March 1 of the year the member is appointed and ends on the last day of
 28 February of the third year after the member is appointed. A member may not serve more than two
 29 consecutive terms.

30 (b) If a vacancy occurs on the board, another qualifying member possessing the same profes-
 31 sional degree, license or retired status or fulfilling the same public capacity as the person whose
 32 position has been vacated shall be appointed as provided in this section to fill the unexpired term.

33 (c) A board member shall be removed immediately from the board if, during the member's term,
 34 the member:

35 (A) Is not a resident of this state;

36 (B) Has been absent from three consecutive board meetings, unless at least one absence is ex-
 37 cused; or

38 (C) Is not a current licensee or a retired licensee whose license was in good standing at the time
 39 of retirement, if the board member was appointed to serve on the board as a licensee.

40 (4) Members of the board are entitled to compensation and expenses as provided in ORS 292.495.
 41 The board may provide by rule for compensation to board members for the performance of official
 42 duties at a rate that is greater than the rate provided in ORS 292.495.

43 (5)(a) The chairperson shall select at least one but no more than three former board members
 44 to serve as emeritus board members. A person selected to serve as an emeritus board member is
 45 subject to approval by the Governor.

1 (b) A person may serve as an emeritus board member for up to three years after the date on
2 which the person's term as a board member ended.

3 (c) An emeritus board member serves at the pleasure of the Governor.

4 (d) The board shall publish a list of emeritus board members on a website maintained by the
5 board.

6 (e) If a board member will be absent from a meeting of the board and has provided notice to the
7 chairperson or executive director of the board in advance of the member's absence, an emeritus
8 board member who holds the same degree or professional license, or who fulfills the same public
9 capacity, as the absent member may take the place of the absent member during the absence.

10 **SECTION 7.** ORS 677.495, as amended by section 10, chapter 349, Oregon Laws 2021, is
11 amended to read:

12 677.495. As used in ORS 677.495 to 677.535, unless the context requires otherwise:

13 (1) "Collaboration" means, as indicated by the patient's condition, community standards of care
14 and a [*physician assistant's*] **physician associate's** education, training and experience:

15 (a) Consultation between the [*physician assistant*] **physician associate** and a physician or
16 podiatric physician; or

17 (b) Referral by the [*physician assistant*] **physician associate** to a physician or podiatric physi-
18 cian.

19 (2) "Collaboration agreement" means a written agreement that describes the manner in which
20 the [*physician assistant*] **physician associate** collaborates with physicians or podiatric physicians,
21 that does not assign supervisory responsibility to, or represent acceptance of legal responsibility by,
22 a physician or podiatric physician for the care provided by the [*physician assistant*] **physician as-**
23 **sociate** and that is signed by the [*physician assistant*] **physician associate** and the physician,
24 podiatric physician or [*physician assistant's*] **physician associate's** employer.

25 (3) "Employer" means:

26 (a) An entity that is organized to deliver health care services in this state in accordance with
27 ORS 58.375 or 58.376 and that employs a physician or podiatric physician;

28 (b) A group medical practice that is part of a health system; or

29 (c) A physician or podiatric physician who employs a [*physician assistant*] **physician associate**

30 .
31 (4) "Physician" means a physician licensed under ORS 677.100 to 677.228.

32 (5) [*Physician assistant*] "Physician associate" means a person who is licensed in accordance
33 with ORS 677.505 to 677.525.

34 (6) "Podiatric physician" means a podiatric physician and surgeon licensed under ORS 677.805
35 to 677.840.

36 **SECTION 8.** ORS 677.500 is amended to read:

37 677.500. It is the intent of the Legislative Assembly in requiring the licensure of [*physician as-*
38 *assistants*] **physician associates** to encourage appropriate use of [*physician assistants*] **physician as-**
39 **sociates** in the delivery of health care services to the extent of a [*physician assistant's*] **physician**
40 **associate's** education and experience.

41 **SECTION 9.** ORS 677.505 is amended to read:

42 677.505. (1) ORS 677.495 and 677.505 to 677.525 are not intended to alter or affect ORS chapter
43 678, regarding the practice of nursing; ORS chapter 679, regarding the practice of dentistry; ORS
44 680.010 to 680.205, regarding the practice of dental hygienists and auxiliaries; or ORS 683.010 to
45 683.340, regarding the practice of optometry.

1 (2) ORS 677.495 and 677.505 to 677.525 do not require an employee of a person licensed to
 2 practice medicine under this chapter, or of a medical clinic or hospital to be licensed under ORS
 3 677.495 and 677.505 to 677.525, unless the employee is practicing as a *[physician assistant]* **physician**
 4 **associate** in which case the individual shall be licensed under ORS 677.495 and 677.505 to 677.525.

5 **SECTION 10.** ORS 677.510, as amended by section 11a, chapter 349, Oregon Laws 2021, is
 6 amended to read:

7 677.510. (1) A *[physician assistant]* **physician associate** is responsible for the care provided by
 8 the *[physician assistant]* **physician associate** if the *[physician assistant]* **physician associate** is
 9 acting as an employee.

10 (2) A *[physician assistant]* **physician associate** shall engage in collaboration with the appropri-
 11 ate health care provider as indicated by the condition of the patient, the standard of care and the
 12 *[physician assistant's]* **physician associate's** education, experience and competence. The degree of
 13 collaboration must be determined at the *[physician assistant's]* **physician associate's** primary lo-
 14 cation of practice. The determination may include decisions made by a physician, podiatric physician
 15 or employer with whom the *[physician assistant]* **physician associate** has entered into a collab-
 16 oration agreement, or the group or hospital service and the credentialing and privileging systems
 17 of the *[physician assistant's]* **physician associate's** primary location of practice.

18 (3)(a) A *[physician assistant]* **physician associate** may not provide care unless the *[physician*
 19 *assistant]* **physician associate** has entered into a collaboration agreement signed by a physician,
 20 podiatric physician or employer. The collaboration agreement must include:

21 (A) The *[physician assistant's]* **physician associate's** name, license number and primary location
 22 of practice;

23 (B) A general description of the *[physician assistant's]* **physician associate's** process for col-
 24 laboration with physicians or podiatric physicians;

25 (C) If the *[physician assistant]* **physician associate** has fewer than 2,000 hours of post-graduate
 26 clinical experience, a plan for the minimum number of hours per month during which the *[physician*
 27 *assistant]* **physician associate** will collaborate, both in person and through technology, with a
 28 specified physician or podiatric physician; and

29 (D) The performance assessment and review process, as described in subsection (5) of this sec-
 30 tion.

31 (b) The *[physician assistant]* **physician associate**, or physician, podiatric physician or employer
 32 with whom the *[physician assistant]* **physician associate** has entered into the collaboration agree-
 33 ment, is responsible for tracking the hours described in paragraph (a) of this subsection.

34 (4) The collaboration agreement must be kept on file at the *[physician assistant's]* **physician**
 35 **associate's** primary location of practice and made available to the Oregon Medical Board upon re-
 36 quest.

37 (5) Performance assessments and reviews of a *[physician assistant]* **physician associate** may be
 38 completed by the *[physician assistant's]* **physician associate's** employer in accordance with a per-
 39 formance assessment and review process established by the employer.

40 (6) A *[physician assistant]* **physician associate** shall submit to the board every 36 months doc-
 41 umentation of completion of:

42 (a) A one-hour pain management education program approved by the board and developed based
 43 on recommendations of the Pain Management Commission; or

44 (b) An equivalent pain management education program, as determined by the board.

45 **SECTION 11.** Section 9, chapter 550, Oregon Laws 2011, is amended to read:

1 **Sec. 9.** Notwithstanding the amendments to ORS 677.097, 677.495, 677.500, 677.510, 677.512,
 2 677.515, 677.535 and 677.545 by sections 1 to 8, [of this 2011 Act] **chapter 550, Oregon Laws 2011:**

3 (1) A [physician assistant] **physician associate** practicing under a practice description approved
 4 by the Oregon Medical Board under ORS 677.510 as in effect immediately before [the operative date
 5 of the amendments to ORS 677.510 by section 3 of this 2011 Act] **January 1, 2012**, may continue to
 6 practice in accordance with the practice description and is not required to enter into a practice
 7 agreement under ORS 677.510.

8 (2) A [physician assistant] **physician associate** licensed under ORS 677.512 as in effect imme-
 9 diately before [the operative date of the amendments to ORS 677.512 by section 4 of this 2011 Act]
 10 **January 1, 2012**, may renew the [physician assistant's] **physician associate's** license without
 11 meeting the requirements of ORS 677.512 (2)(c) and (d).

12 **SECTION 12.** ORS 677.511 is amended to read:

13 677.511. (1)(a) A [physician assistant] **physician associate** may register with the Oregon Medical
 14 Board for authority to dispense prescription drugs.

15 (b) Notwithstanding paragraph (a) of this subsection, and except as permitted under ORS 677.515
 16 (4), a [physician assistant] **physician associate** may not dispense controlled substances classified in
 17 Schedule I or II under the federal Controlled Substances Act, 21 U.S.C. 811 and 812, as modified
 18 under ORS 475.035.

19 (2) A registration under this section must include any information required by the board by rule.

20 (3) Prescription drugs dispensed by a [physician assistant] **physician associate** must be per-
 21 sonally dispensed by the [physician assistant] **physician associate**, except that nonjudgmental dis-
 22 pensing functions may be delegated to staff assistants when the accuracy and completeness of the
 23 prescription is verified by the [physician assistant] **physician associate**.

24 (4) The [physician assistant] **physician associate** shall maintain records of the receipt and dis-
 25 tribution of prescription drugs. The records must be readily accessible for inspection by the board
 26 upon request of the board.

27 (5) The [physician assistant] **physician associate** shall ensure that a prescription drug dispensed
 28 by the [physician assistant] **physician associate** is labeled in compliance with the requirements of
 29 ORS 677.089 (3).

30 (6) The board has disciplinary authority regarding a [physician assistant] **physician associate**
 31 who has prescription drug dispensing authority.

32 **SECTION 13.** ORS 677.512 is amended to read:

33 677.512. (1) A person seeking licensure as a [physician assistant] **physician associate** shall
 34 complete an application form provided by the Oregon Medical Board and submit the form to the
 35 board, accompanied by nonrefundable fees for the application and for the license in amounts deter-
 36 mined by rule of the board.

37 (2) The board may issue a license to a [physician assistant] **physician associate** who:

38 (a) Submits an application as required by the board by rule;

39 (b) Pays the application fee established by the board by rule;

40 (c) Has completed an educational program accredited by a nationally recognized accreditation
 41 organization for [physician assistant] **physician associate** educational programs;

42 (d) Has passed the initial national examination required of [physician assistants] **physician as-**
 43 **sociates** to become nationally certified;

44 (e) Is mentally and physically able to engage safely in practice as a [physician assistant] **physi-**
 45 **cian associate**;

1 (f) Has not been disciplined by a [*physician assistant*] **physician associate** licensing board in
 2 another state, unless the board considers the discipline and determines that the person is competent
 3 to practice as a [*physician assistant*] **physician associate**; and

4 (g) Is of good moral character as determined by the board.

5 (3) The board may issue a license by reciprocity to a person who is licensed as a [*physician*
 6 *assistant*] **physician associate** in another state and meets the requirements of subsection (2)(c) and
 7 (d) of this section.

8 (4)(a) The board shall adopt necessary and proper rules to govern the renewal of licenses issued
 9 under this section.

10 (b) If the board requires a licensee to complete continuing education in order to renew a license
 11 issued under this section, the board shall allow a licensee to meet those requirements by providing
 12 the board with documentation of military training or experience that is substantially equivalent to
 13 the continuing education required by the board.

14 **SECTION 14.** ORS 677.515, as amended by section 12, chapter 349, Oregon Laws 2021, is
 15 amended to read:

16 677.515. (1) A [*physician assistant*] **physician associate** may provide any medical service, in-
 17 cluding prescribing and administering controlled substances in Schedules II through V under the
 18 federal Controlled Substances Act:

19 (a) That is within the scope of practice of the [*physician assistant*] **physician associate**; and

20 (b) For which the [*physician assistant*] **physician associate** has obtained informed consent as
 21 provided in ORS 677.097, if informed consent is required.

22 (2) This chapter does not prohibit a student enrolled in a program for educating [*physician as-*
 23 *stants*] **physician associates** approved by the Oregon Medical Board from rendering medical ser-
 24 vices if the services are rendered in the course of the program.

25 (3) The degree of autonomous judgment that a [*physician assistant*] **physician associate** may
 26 exercise shall be determined at the [*physician assistant's*] **physician associate's** primary location
 27 of practice by the community standards of care and the [*physician assistant's*] **physician associate's**
 28 education, training and experience.

29 (4) The board may not limit the privilege of administering, dispensing and prescribing pre-
 30 scription drugs to population groups federally designated as underserved, or to geographic areas of
 31 the state that are federally designated health professional shortage areas, federally designated
 32 medically underserved areas or areas designated as medically disadvantaged and in need of primary
 33 health care providers by the Director of the Oregon Health Authority or the Office of Rural Health.

The judge shall inform the person arrested and charged and the victim, or parent or guardian of the victim, of the availability of counseling under the circumstances described in subsection (7) of this section.

(b) Notwithstanding the provisions of ORS 433.045, if the district attorney files a petition under subsection (1) of this section, the court shall order the person charged to submit to testing if the court determines there is probable cause to believe that:

(A) The person charged committed the crime; and

(B) The victim has received a substantial exposure, as defined by rule of the Oregon Health Authority.

(3) Notwithstanding the provisions of ORS 433.045, upon conviction of a person for any crime

1 in which the court determines from the facts that the transmission of body fluids from one person

15 limited to necessary personnel.

16 (e) The data is limited to elements required for analysis and meets the criteria in 45 C.F.R.
17 164.514(e) for a limited data set.

18 (f) The investigator is a party to the data use agreement as provided by 45 C.F.R. 164.514(e) for
19 limited data set recipients.

20 (6) Research conducted in accordance with this section is rebuttably presumed to comply with
21 ORS 192.535 and 192.539.

22 (7)(a) Notwithstanding ORS 192.535, a person may use a DNA sample or genetic information
23 obtained, with blanket informed consent, before June 25, 2001, for genetic research.

24 (b) Notwithstanding ORS 192.535, a person may use a DNA sample or genetic information obtained
25 without specific informed consent and derived from a biological specimen or clinical individually
26 identifiable health information for anonymous research or coded research if an institutional
27 review board operating under subsection (1)(b) of this section:

28 (A) Waives or alters the consent requirements pursuant to the Federal Policy for the Protection

30 (B) Waives authorization pursuant to the federal Health Insurance Portability and Accountability

9 433.815. (1) Educational training on the treatment of allergic responses, as required by ORS
10 433.800 to 433.830, shall be conducted by a physician, [*physician assistant*] **physician associate** or

37 from the total value of the consideration.

38 (6) "Judge" means a person licensed by the Superintendent of State Police who is at cageside
39 or ringside during an unarmed combat sports event and who has the responsibility of scoring the
40 bout of the competitors in the event.

41 (7) "Manager" means a person licensed by the superintendent who does any of the following:

42 (a) By contract or agreement undertakes to represent the interests of a professional unarmed
43 combat sports competitor in procuring or arranging the conduct of an unarmed combat sports event
44 in which the professional unarmed combat sports competitor is a participant.

45 (b) Receives or is entitled to receive more than 10 percent of the contracted portion of the gross

1 purse of a professional unarmed combat sports competitor for services related to the unarmed com-
2 bat sports competitor's participation in an unarmed combat sports event.

3 (c) Is an officer, director or stockholder of a corporation that receives or is entitled to receive
4 more than 10 percent of the contracted portion of the gross purse of a professional unarmed combat
5 sports competitor for services relating to the unarmed combat sports competitor's participation in
6 an unarmed combat sports event.

7 (d) Directs or controls the professional activities of a professional unarmed combat sports com-
8 petitor.

9 (e) Attends to the professional unarmed combat sports competitor at cageside or ringside or
10 purports to be the manager of a professional unarmed combat sports competitor.

11 (8) "Matchmaker" means a person licensed by the superintendent who is employed by or asso-
12 ciated with a promoter in the capacity of booking and arranging unarmed combat sports events be-
13 tween unarmed combat sports competitors and for whose activities in this regard the promoter is
14 legally responsible.

15 (9) "Medical personnel" means a physician licensed under ORS chapter 677 or a [*physician as-*

34 kwon do, karate, kenpo karate, judo, sumo, jujitsu, Brazilian jujitsu, submission wrestling, kung fu,
35 submission grappling or other martial art where the intent is for the competitor to win by points
36 only and where that martial art is exhibited independently.

37 (17) "Unarmed combat sports competitor" means an individual licensed by the superintendent
38 who competes in an unarmed combat sports event.

 7 warehouseman or employee of the carrier or warehouseman.
 8 (5) “Board” means the State Board of Pharmacy.
 9 (6) “Controlled substance”:
 10 (a) Means a drug or its immediate precursor classified in Schedules I through V under the fed-
 11 eral Controlled Substances Act, 21 U.S.C. 811 to 812, as modified under ORS 475.035. The use of the
 12 term “precursor” in this paragraph does not control and is not controlled by the use of the term
 13 “precursor” in ORS 475.752 to 475.980.
 14 (b) Does not include:
 15 (A) The plant Cannabis family Cannabaceae;
 16 (B) Any part of the plant Cannabis family Cannabaceae, whether growing or not;
 17 (C) Resin extracted from any part of the plant Cannabis family Cannabaceae;
 18 (D) The seeds of the plant Cannabis family Cannabaceae;
 19 (E) Any compound, manufacture, salt, derivative, mixture or preparation of a plant, part of a
 20 plant, resin or seed described in this paragraph; or

 28 (8) “Deliver” or “delivery” means the actual, constructive or attempted transfer, other than by

 31 (9) “Device” means instruments, apparatus or contrivances, including their components, parts
 32 or accessories, intended:
 33 (a) For use in the diagnosis, cure, mitigation, treatment or prevention of disease in humans or

 36 (10) “Dispense” means to deliver a controlled substance to an ultimate user or research subject

 39 (11) “Dispenser” means a practitioner who dispenses.
 40 (12) “Distributor” means a person who delivers.
 41 (13) “Drug” means:
 42 (a) Substances recognized as drugs in the official United States Pharmacopoeia, official
 43 Homeopathic Pharmacopoeia of the United States or official National Formulary, or any supplement
 44 to any of them;
 45 (b) Substances intended for use in the diagnosis, cure, mitigation, treatment or prevention of

1 disease in humans or animals;

2 (c) Substances (other than food) intended to affect the structure or any function of the body of
3 humans or animals; and

4 (d) Substances intended for use as a component of any article specified in paragraph (a), (b) or
5 (c) of this subsection; however, the term does not include devices or their components, parts or ac-
6 cessories.

7 (14) “Electronically transmitted” or “electronic transmission” means a communication sent or
8 received through technological apparatuses, including computer terminals or other equipment or
9 mechanisms linked by telephone or microwave relays, or any similar apparatus having electrical,
10 digital, magnetic, wireless, optical, electromagnetic or similar capabilities.

11 (15) “Manufacture” means the production, preparation, propagation, compounding, conversion
12 or processing of a controlled substance, either directly or indirectly by extraction from substances
13 of natural origin, or independently by means of chemical synthesis, or by a combination of extraction
14 and chemical synthesis, and includes any packaging or repackaging of the substance or labeling or
15 relabeling of its container, except that this term does not include the preparation or compounding
16 of a controlled substance:

17 (a) By a practitioner as an incident to administering or dispensing of a controlled substance in
18 the course of professional practice; or

19 (b) By a practitioner, or by an authorized agent under the practitioner’s supervision, for the
20 purpose of, or as an incident to, research, teaching or chemical analysis and not for sale.

21 (16) “Person” includes a government subdivision or agency, business trust, estate, trust or any

- (c) A chemical extraction process using the hydrocarbon-based solvent carbon dioxide, provided that the process does not involve the use of high heat or pressure; or

9 (b) “Compensable injury” does not include:

10 (A) Injury to any active participant in assaults or combats that are not connected to the job
 11 assignment and that amount to a deviation from customary duties;

12 (B) Injury incurred while engaging in or performing, or as the result of engaging in or per-
 13 forming, any recreational or social activities primarily for the worker’s personal pleasure; or

14 (C) Injury the major contributing cause of which is demonstrated to be by a preponderance of
 15 the evidence the injured worker’s consumption of alcoholic beverages or cannabis or the unlawful
 16 consumption of any controlled substance, unless the employer permitted, encouraged or had actual
 17 knowledge of such consumption.

18 (c) A “disabling compensable injury” is an injury that entitles the worker to compensation for
 19 disability or death. An injury is not disabling if no temporary benefits are due and payable, unless
 20 there is a reasonable expectation that permanent disability will result from the injury.

21 (d) A “nondisabling compensable injury” is any injury that requires medical services only.

22 (8) “Compensation” includes all benefits, including medical services, provided for a compensable
 23 injury to a subject worker or the worker’s beneficiaries by an insurer or self-insured employer pur-
 24 suant to this chapter.

25 (9) “Department” means the Department of Consumer and Business Services.

26 (10) “Dependent” means any of the following individuals who, at the time of an accident, de-
 27 pended in whole or in part for the individual’s support on the earnings of a worker who dies as a
 28 result of an injury:

29 (a) A parent of a worker or the parent’s spouse or domestic partner;

30 (b) A grandparent of a worker or the grandparent’s spouse or domestic partner;

31 (c) A grandchild of a worker or the grandchild’s spouse or domestic partner;

32 (d) A sibling or stepsibling of a worker or the sibling’s or stepsibling’s spouse or domestic
 33 partner; and

34 (e) Any individual related by blood or affinity whose close association with a worker is the
 35 equivalent of a family relationship.

36 (11) “Director” means the Director of the Department of Consumer and Business Services.

37 (12)(a) “Doctor” or “physician” means a person duly licensed to practice one or more of the
 38 healing arts in any country or in any state, territory or possession of the United States within the
 39 limits of the license of the licensee.

40 (b) Except as otherwise provided for workers subject to a managed care contract, “attending
 41 physician” means a doctor, physician or [*physician assistant*] **physician associate** who is primarily
 42 responsible for the treatment of a worker’s compensable injury and who is:

43 (A) A physician licensed under ORS 677.100 to 677.228 by the Oregon Medical Board, or a
 44 podiatric physician and surgeon licensed under ORS 677.805 to 677.840 by the Oregon Medical
 45 Board, an oral and maxillofacial surgeon licensed by the Oregon Board of Dentistry or a similarly

1 licensed doctor in any country or in any state, territory or possession of the United States; or

2 (B) For a cumulative total of 60 days from the first visit on the initial claim or for a cumulative
3 total of 18 visits, whichever occurs first, to any of the medical service providers listed in this sub-
4 paragraph, a:

5 (i) Doctor or physician licensed by the State Board of Chiropractic Examiners for the State of
6 Oregon under ORS chapter 684 or a similarly licensed doctor or physician in any country or in any
7 state, territory or possession of the United States;

8 (ii) [*Physician assistant*] **Physician associate** licensed by the Oregon Medical Board in accord-
9 ance with ORS 677.505 to 677.525 or a similarly licensed [*physician assistant*] **physician associate**
10 in any country or in any state, territory or possession of the United States; or

11 (iii) Doctor of naturopathy or naturopathic physician licensed by the Oregon Board of
12 Naturopathic Medicine under ORS chapter 685 or a similarly licensed doctor or physician in any
13 country or in any state, territory or possession of the United States.

14 (c) Except as otherwise provided for workers subject to a managed care contract, “attending
15 physician” does not include a physician who provides care in a hospital emergency room and refers
16 the injured worker to a primary care physician for follow-up care and treatment.

17 (d) “Consulting physician” means a doctor or physician who examines a worker or the worker’s
18 medical record to advise the attending physician or nurse practitioner authorized to provide
19 compensable medical services under ORS 656.245 regarding treatment of a worker’s compensable
20 injury.

21 (13)(a) “Employer” means any person, including receiver, administrator, executor or trustee, and
22 the state, state agencies, counties, municipal corporations, school districts and other public corpo-
23 rations or political subdivisions, that contracts to pay a remuneration for the services of any
24 worker.

25 (b) Notwithstanding paragraph (a) of this subsection, for purposes of this chapter, the client of
26 a temporary service provider is not the employer of temporary workers provided by the temporary
27 service provider.

28 (c) As used in paragraph (b) of this subsection, “temporary service provider” has the meaning
29 for that term provided in ORS 656.850.

30 (d) For the purposes of this chapter, “subject employer” means an employer that is subject to
31 this chapter as provided in ORS 656.023.

32 (14) “Insurer” means the State Accident Insurance Fund Corporation or an insurer authorized
33 under ORS chapter 731 to transact workers’ compensation insurance in this state or an assigned
34 claims agent selected by the director under ORS 656.054.

35 (15) “Consumer and Business Services Fund” means the fund created by ORS 705.145.

36 (16) “Incapacitated” means an individual is physically or mentally unable to earn a livelihood.

37 (17) “Medically stationary” means that no further material improvement would reasonably be
38 expected from medical treatment or the passage of time.

39 (18) “Noncomplying employer” means a subject employer that has failed to comply with ORS
40 656.017.

41 (19) “Objective findings” in support of medical evidence are verifiable indications of injury or
42 disease that may include, but are not limited to, range of motion, atrophy, muscle strength and
43 palpable muscle spasm. “Objective findings” does not include physical findings or subjective re-
44 sponses to physical examinations that are not reproducible, measurable or observable.

45 (20) “Palliative care” means medical service rendered to reduce or moderate temporarily the

1 intensity of an otherwise stable medical condition, but does not include those medical services ren-
2 dered to diagnose, heal or permanently alleviate or eliminate a medical condition.

3 (21) "Party" means a claimant for compensation, the employer of the injured worker at the time

39 (27) "Wages" means the money rate at which the service rendered is recompensed under the

41 housing, lodging or similar advantage received from the employer, and includes the amount of tips

- 29 (A) Occupational therapist, as defined in ORS 675.210;
- 30 (B) Certified registered nurse anesthetist, as defined in ORS 678.245;
- 31 (C) Chiropractic physician, as defined in ORS 684.010;
- 32 (D) Clinical nurse specialist, as defined in ORS 678.010;
- 33 (E) Naturopathic physician, as defined in ORS 685.010;
- 34 (F) Nurse practitioner, as defined in ORS 678.010;
- 35 (G) Physician, as defined in ORS 677.010;
- 36 (H) [*Physician assistant*] **Physician associate**, as defined in ORS 677.495;
- 37 (I) Physical therapist, as defined in ORS 688.010; and
- 38 (J) Physical therapist assistant, as defined in ORS 688.010.

39 (2) In collaboration with the Oregon Health Authority, a board shall adopt rules to require a
40 licensee regulated by the board to report to the board, upon reauthorization to practice, the
41 licensee's completion of any continuing education regarding suicide risk assessment, treatment and
42 management.

43 (3) A licensee shall report the completion of any continuing education described in subsection
44 (2) of this section to the board that regulates the licensee.

45 (4)(a) A board shall document completion of any continuing education described in subsection

1 (2) of this section by a licensee regulated by the board. The board shall document the following data:

40 (H) Local correctional facilities and juvenile detention facilities as those terms are defined in
41 ORS 169.005, regional correctional facilities as defined in ORS 169.620, youth correction facilities
42 as defined in ORS 420.005, youth care centers as defined in ORS 420.855, and Department of Cor-
43 rections institutions as defined in ORS 421.005; or

44 (I) Public and nonprofit community health clinics.

45 (b) Adults who are homebound.

1 (c) Students or enrollees of nursery schools and day care programs and their siblings under 18
 2 years of age, Job Corps and similar employment training facilities, primary and secondary schools,
 3 including private schools and public charter schools, and persons entitled to benefits under the
 4 Women, Infants and Children Program.

5 (d) Patients in hospitals, medical clinics, medical offices or offices operated or staffed by
 6 naturopathic physicians, nurse practitioners, [*physician assistants*] **physician associates** or
 7 midwives.

8 (e) Patients whose income is less than the federal poverty level.

9 (f) Other populations that the Oregon Board of Dentistry determines are underserved or lack
 10 access to dental hygiene services.

11 (2) Unless different criteria for referral of a patient or resident to a dentist are included in an

(4) “Credential” means the recognition awarded to an individual who meets the requirements of a credentialing organization.

(5) “Credentialing organization” means a nationally recognized organization that issues credentials through testing or evaluations that determine that a person meets defined standards for training and competence in a medical imaging modality.

(6) “Diagnostic medical sonography” means the use of nonionizing high frequency sound waves with specialized equipment to direct the sound waves into areas of the human body to generate images for the assessment and diagnosis of various medical conditions.

(7) “Graduate” means an individual who has completed the didactic and clinical education at an approved school, including documented clinical proficiency, but who has not met all requirements for credentialing by a credentialing organization.

(8) “Hybrid imaging or radiation therapy equipment” means equipment that combines more than one medical imaging modality into a single device.

1 (9)(a) "Ionizing radiation" means alpha particles, beta particles, gamma rays, X-rays, neutrons,
2 high-speed electrons, high-speed protons or other particles capable of producing ions.

3 (b) "Ionizing radiation" does not include nonionizing radiation.

4 (10) "License" means a license issued by the board to practice one or more of the medical im-
5 aging modalities.

6 (11) "Licensed nurse practitioner" means a nurse practitioner licensed in Oregon.

7 (12) "Licensed physician" means a physician or surgeon licensed in Oregon.

8 (13) "Licensed [*physician assistant*] **physician associate**" means a [*physician assistant*] **physi-
9 cian associate** licensed in Oregon.

10 (14) "Limited X-ray machine operator" means a person who performs diagnostic X-ray proce-

17 (16) "Magnetic resonance imaging" means the process by which certain nuclei, when placed in
18 a magnetic field, absorb and release energy in the form of radio waves that are analyzed by a
19 computer thereby producing an image of human anatomy and physiological information.

20 (17)(a) "Medical imaging" means the use of specialized equipment for the production of visual
21 representations of human anatomy, tissues or organs.

22 (b) "Medical imaging" includes but is not limited to X-ray, single photon emission, positron
23 emission technology, ultrasound, magnetic fields, visible light and radio waves.

24 (18) "Medical imaging licensee" means a person other than a limited X-ray machine operator
25 who holds a valid license and operates medical imaging equipment for diagnostic or therapeutic
26 purposes under the supervision of a licensed physician.

27 (19) "Medical imaging modality" means:

28 (a) Diagnostic medical sonography and all its subspecialties;

29 (b) Magnetic resonance imaging and all its subspecialties;

32 (e) Radiography and all its subspecialties.

33 (20) "Nonionizing radiation" includes radiation such as radiofrequency or microwaves, visible,

35 (21) "Nuclear medicine technology" means the specialized equipment that measures radiation
36 emitted by radionuclides, including counters and cameras that form medical images for interpreta-
37 tion by a physician, or assists in therapeutic use of radionuclides.

38 (22) "Radiation therapy" means the use of ionizing radiation on a human being for therapeutic
39 purposes.

40 (23) "Radiographer" means a person other than a licensed physician who performs a compre-
41 hensive set of diagnostic radiographic procedures under the supervision of a licensed physician us-
42 ing external ionizing radiation to produce radiographic, fluoroscopic or digital images.

43 (24) "Radiography" means the use of ionizing radiation to produce radiographic, fluoroscopic or
44 digital images of human anatomy for diagnostic purposes.

45 (25) "Radiologist" means a person licensed to practice medicine in the State of Oregon who is

1 certified by or board eligible for certification by the American Board of Radiology, the American
 2 Osteopathic Association, the Royal College of Radiologists or the Royal College of Physicians and
 3 Surgeons of Canada.

4 (26) "Student" means an individual enrolled in:

- 5 (a) An approved school; or
- 6 (b) A limited X-ray machine operator course of study.

7 (27) "Supervision" means the act of monitoring and reviewing the performance of medical im-
 8 aging licensees or limited X-ray machine operators through regular inspections of work produced,
 9 regardless of whether the supervising individual is continuously physically present during the use
 10 of medical imaging equipment or X-ray equipment.

13 (a) "Fluoroscopy" means a technique for generating X-ray images and for presenting the X-ray

11 (b) "Licensee" means a person that holds a valid and unexpired license issued under this section.

12 (c) "Pharmaceutical product" means a medication that may be legally dispensed only with a
 13 valid prescription from a health care provider.

14 (d) "Pharmaceutical representative" means a person that markets or promotes pharmaceutical
 15 products to health care providers.

16 (2)(a) A person may not engage in business as a pharmaceutical representative without first
 17 obtaining a license, unless the person engages in business as a pharmaceutical representative in this
 18 state for fewer than 15 days during each calendar year.

19 (b) As a condition of applying for and receiving a license under this section, an applicant shall
 20 complete a professional education course that the Director of the Department of Consumer and
 21 Business Services specifies by rule.

22 (3)(a) An applicant for a license to engage in business as a pharmaceutical representative shall
 23 submit to the director on a form and with the contents the director specifies by rule:

- 24 (A) The applicant's full name, residence address, residence telephone number, business address
 25 and business telephone number;
- 26 (B) A description of the business in which the applicant will engage;
- 27 (C) A license fee of \$750;
- 28 (D) Documentation that shows that the applicant has completed the professional education
 29 course described in subsection (2)(b) of this section; and
- 30 (E) Any other information the director reasonably requires.

31 (b) Except as provided in subsection (8) of this section, the director shall issue a license to an
 32 applicant or renew a license for a licensee unless the director determines that the applicant or
 33 licensee has not complied with the requirements of paragraph (a) of this subsection.

34 (c) A license the director issues under this section is valid until the end of the calendar year
 35 in which the director issues the license.

36 (d) A licensee may not transfer a license the director issues under this section.

37 (e) A licensee shall report to the director in writing any changes to the information the licensee
 38 submitted under paragraph (a) of this subsection, and any material changes the licensee made in the
 39 licensee's business operations, within four days after the change in the information occurs. The di-
 40 rector by rule may specify changes that constitute material changes in the licensee's business op-
 41 erations.

42 (4) A licensee may renew a license by submitting an application as provided in subsection (3)(a)
 43 of this section, except that in lieu of the documentation required under subsection (3)(a)(D) of this
 44 section, the applicant must submit documentation that shows that the applicant during the previous
 45 year completed at least five hours of continuing education in accordance with requirements the di-

1 rector specifies by rule.

2 (5)(a) The director shall specify by rule the contents of a course of professional education nec-
3 essary to complete an application for a license under this section and the contents of a course of
4 continuing education necessary to renew a license under this section. The education may include
5 training in:

6 (A) Ethics;

7 (B) Pharmacology;

8 (C) Laws and rules that apply to pharmaceutical marketing; and

9 (D) Any other subjects related to pharmaceutical marketing that the director deems necessary.

10 (b) The director may designate and publish a list of persons that provide professional education
11 that meets the director's specifications under this section. An applicant or a licensee may not re-
12 ceive professional education from the applicant's or licensee's employer.

13 (6)(a) At the director's request or at intervals the director specifies by rule, a licensee shall
14 provide to the director the following information:

15 (A) Documentation that shows that the licensee has completed education required under this
16 section;

17 (B) A list of health care providers within this state that the licensee contacted since the
18 director's last request or during the previous calendar year, as appropriate;

19 (C) The number of times the licensee contacted each health care provider;

20 (D) The location and duration of the licensee's contact with each health care provider;

29 (a) Engage in any deceptive or misleading marketing of a pharmaceutical product, including
30 knowingly concealing, suppressing, omitting, misrepresenting or misstating material facts concerning
31 or related to a pharmaceutical product;

32 (b) Use a title or designation that could reasonably lead a health care provider or an employee
33 of a health care provider to believe that the licensee is a health care provider if the licensee is not
34 licensed as a health care provider or otherwise authorized to provide health care services; or

35 (c) Attend an examination of a patient without the patient's consent.

36 (8)(a) The director may suspend or revoke a license for a violation of a provision of this section
37 and, in addition to and not in lieu of a suspension or revocation, may impose a civil penalty in an
38 amount not less than \$1,000 and not more than \$3,000 for each violation. Each day during which a
39 violation continues constitutes a separate violation. The director shall impose any civil penalties in
40 accordance with ORS 183.745.

41 (b) The director may not reinstate a license that the director suspended or revoked until the
42 licensee has remedied all violations and has paid all applicable fees and civil penalties the director
43 imposed.

44 (c) The director may not for a period of two years after revoking a license under this section

3 694.042. (1) In addition to any other rights and remedies the purchaser may have, including
4 rights under ORS 646A.460 to 646A.476, the purchaser of a hearing aid shall have the right to
5 rescind the transaction if:

6 (a) The purchaser for whatever reason consults with a physician licensed under ORS chapter
7 677 to practice medicine who specializes in diseases of the ear or with a [*physician assistant*] **phy-**
8 **sician associate** licensed under ORS 677.505 to 677.525 who specializes in diseases of the ear, or
9 consults with an audiologist not licensed under this chapter and not affiliated with anyone licensed
10 under this chapter and with a physician licensed under ORS chapter 677 to practice medicine or
11 with a [*physician assistant*] **physician associate** licensed under ORS 677.505 to 677.525, subsequent
12 to purchasing the hearing aid, and the physician or [*physician assistant*] **physician associate** advises
13 such purchaser against purchasing or using a hearing aid and in writing specifies the medical reason
14 for the advice;

15 (b) The seller, in dealings with the purchaser, failed to adhere to the practice standards listed
16 in ORS 694.142, or failed to provide the statement required by ORS 694.036;

17 (c) The fitting of the hearing instrument failed to meet current industry standards; or

18 (d) The licensee fails to meet any standard of conduct prescribed in the law or rules regulating
19 fitting and dispensing of hearing aids and this failure affects in any way the transaction which the
20 purchaser seeks to rescind.

21 (2) The purchaser of a hearing aid shall have the right to rescind the transaction, for other than
22 the seller's breach, as provided in subsection (1)(a), (b), (c) or (d) of this section only if the purchaser
23 returns the product and it is in good condition less normal wear and tear and gives written notice
24 of the intent to rescind the transaction by either:

25 (a) Returning the product with a written notice of the intent to rescind sent by certified mail,
26 return receipt requested, to the licensee's regular place of business; or

27 (b) Returning the product with a written notice of the intent to rescind to an authorized repre-
28 sentative of the company from which it was purchased.

29 (3) The notice described in subsection (2) of this section shall state that the transaction is can-
30 celed pursuant to this section. The notice of intent to rescind must be postmarked:

31 (a) Within 30 days from the date of the original delivery; or

2 (b) "Covered practitioner" means a chiropractic physician, physician or [*physician assistant*]
 3 **physician associate** licensed under ORS chapter 677, nurse practitioner, optometrist, dentist, dental
 4 hygienist or naturopath.

5 (c) "Disposition of a claim" means:

6 (A) A judgment or award against the covered practitioner by a court, a jury or an arbitrator;

7 (B) A withdrawal or dismissal of the claim; or

8 (C) A settlement of the claim.

9 (d) "Reporter" means:

10 (A) A primary insurer;

11 (B) A public body required to defend, save harmless and indemnify an officer, employee or agent
 12 of the public body under ORS 30.260 to 30.300;

13 (C) An entity that self-insures or indemnifies for claims alleging professional negligence on the
 14 part of a covered practitioner; or

15 (D) A health maintenance organization as defined in ORS 750.005.

16 (2) Within 30 days after receiving notice of a claim, a reporter shall report the claim to the
 17 appropriate board, as follows:

18 (a) The Oregon Medical Board if the covered practitioner is a physician or [*physician*
 19 *assistant*] **physician associate** licensed under ORS chapter 677;

20 (b) The Oregon State Board of Nursing if the covered practitioner is a nurse practitioner;

21 (c) The Oregon Board of Optometry if the covered practitioner is an optometrist;

22 (d) The Oregon Board of Dentistry if the covered practitioner is a dentist or dental hygienist;

23 (e) The Oregon Board of Naturopathic Medicine if the covered practitioner is a naturopath; or

24 (f) The State Board of Chiropractic Examiners if the covered practitioner is a chiropractic

 6 practitioner.

7 (7) A person that reports in good faith concerning any matter required to be reported under this
 8 section is immune from civil liability by reason of making the report.

9 **SECTION 136.** ORS 742.420 is amended to read:

10 742.420. As used in ORS 742.420 to 742.440:

11 (1) “Discount medical plan” means a contract, agreement or other business arrangement be-
 12 tween a discount medical plan organization and a plan member in which the organization, in ex-
 13 change for fees, service or subscription charges, dues or other consideration, offers or purports to
 14 offer the plan member access to providers and the right to receive medical and ancillary services
 15 at a discount from providers.

16 (2) “Discount medical plan organization” means a person that contracts on behalf of plan mem-
 17 bers with a provider, a provider network or another discount medical plan organization for access
 18 to medical and ancillary services at a discounted rate and determines what plan members will pay
 19 as a fee, service or subscription charge, dues or other consideration for a discount medical plan.

20 (3) “Licensee” means a discount medical plan organization that has obtained a license from the
 21 Director of the Department of Consumer and Business Services in accordance with ORS 742.426.

22 (4) “Medical and ancillary services” means, except when administered by or under contract with
 23 the State of Oregon, any care, service, treatment or product provided for any dysfunction, injury or
 24 illness of the human body including, but not limited to, care provided by a physician, naturopathic
 25 physician, [*physician assistant*] **physician associate** or nurse practitioner, inpatient care, hospital
 26 and surgical services, emergency and ambulance services, audiology services, dental care services,
 27 vision care services, mental health services, substance abuse counseling or treatment, chiropractic
 28 services, podiatric care services, laboratory services, home health care services, medical equipment
 29 and supplies or prescription drugs.

30 (5) “Plan member” means an individual who pays fees, service or subscription charges, dues or
 31 other consideration in exchange for the right to participate in a discount medical plan.

32 (6)(a) “Provider” means a person that has contracted or otherwise agreed with a discount med-
 33 ical plan organization to provide medical and ancillary services to plan members at a discount from
 34 the person’s ordinary or customary fees or charges.

35 (b) “Provider” does not include:

36 (A) A person that, apart from any agreement or contract with a discount medical plan organ-

1 742.504. Every policy required to provide the coverage specified in ORS 742.502 shall provide
 2 uninsured motorist coverage that in each instance is no less favorable in any respect to the insured
 3 or the beneficiary than if the following provisions were set forth in the policy. However, nothing
 4 contained in this section requires the insurer to reproduce in the policy the particular language of
 5 any of the following provisions:

6 (1)(a) Notwithstanding ORS 30.260 to 30.300, the insurer will pay all sums that the insured or
 7 the heirs or legal representative of the insured is legally entitled to recover as damages from the
 8 owner or operator of an uninsured vehicle because of bodily injury sustained by the insured caused
 9 by accident and arising out of the ownership, maintenance or use of the uninsured vehicle. Deter-
 10 mination as to whether the insured, the insured's heirs or the insured's legal representative is le-
 11 gally entitled to recover such damages, and if so, the amount thereof, shall be made by agreement
 12 between the insured and the insurer, or, in the event of disagreement, may be determined by arbi-
 13 tration as provided in subsection (10) of this section.

14 (b) No judgment against any person or organization alleged to be legally responsible for bodily
 15 injury, except for proceedings instituted against the insurer as provided in this policy, shall be
 16 conclusive, as between the insured and the insurer, on the issues of liability of the person or or-
 17 ganization or of the amount of damages to which the insured is legally entitled.

18 (2) As used in this policy:

19 (a) "Bodily injury" means bodily injury, sickness or disease, including death resulting therefrom.

20 (b) "Hit-and-run vehicle" means a vehicle that causes bodily injury to an insured arising out of
 21 physical contact of the vehicle with the insured or with a vehicle the insured is occupying at the
 22 time of the accident, provided:

23 (A) The identity of either the operator or the owner of the hit-and-run vehicle cannot be ascer-
 24 tained;

25 (B) The insured or someone on behalf of the insured reported the accident within 72 hours to
 26 a police, peace or judicial officer, to the Department of Transportation or to the equivalent depart-
 27 ment in the state where the accident occurred, and filed with the insurer within 30 days thereafter
 28 a statement under oath that the insured or the legal representative of the insured has a cause or
 29 causes of action arising out of the accident for damages against a person or persons whose identities
 30 are unascertainable, and setting forth the facts in support thereof; and

31 (C) At the insurer's request, the insured or the legal representative of the insured makes avail-
 32 able for inspection the vehicle the insured was occupying at the time of the accident.

33 (c) "Insured," when unqualified and when applied to uninsured motorist coverage, means:

34 (A) The named insured as stated in the policy and any person designated as named insured in
 35 the schedule and, while residents of the same household, the spouse of any named insured and rel-
 36 atives of either, provided that neither the relative nor the spouse is the owner of a vehicle not de-
 37 scribed in the policy and that, if the named insured as stated in the policy is other than an
 38 individual or spouses in a marriage who are residents of the same household, the named insured
 39 shall be only a person so designated in the schedule;

40 (B) Any child residing in the household of the named insured if the insured has performed the
 41 duties of a parent to the child by rearing the child as the insured's own although the child is not
 42 related to the insured by blood, marriage or adoption; and

43 (C) Any other person while occupying an insured vehicle, provided the actual use thereof is with
 44 the permission of the named insured.

45 (d) "Insured vehicle," except as provided in paragraph (e) of this provision, means:

1 (A) The vehicle described in the policy or a newly acquired or substitute vehicle, as each of
 2 those terms is defined in the public liability coverage of the policy, insured under the public liability
 3 provisions of the policy; or

4 (B) A nonowned vehicle operated by the named insured or spouse if a resident of the same
 5 household, provided that the actual use thereof is with the permission of the owner of the vehicle
 6 and the vehicle is not owned by nor furnished for the regular or frequent use of the insured or any
 7 member of the same household.

8 (e) "Insured vehicle" does not include a trailer of any type unless the trailer is a described ve-
 9 hicle in the policy.

10 (f) "Occupying" means in or upon or entering into or alighting from.

11 (g) "Phantom vehicle" means a vehicle that causes bodily injury to an insured arising out of a
 12 motor vehicle accident that is caused by a vehicle that has no physical contact with the insured or
 13 the vehicle the insured is occupying at the time of the accident, provided:

14 (A) The identity of either the operator or the owner of the phantom vehicle cannot be ascer-
 15 tained;

16 (B) The facts of the accident can be corroborated by competent evidence other than the testi-
 17 mony of the insured or any person having an uninsured motorist claim resulting from the accident;
 18 and

19 (C) The insured or someone on behalf of the insured reported the accident within 72 hours to
 20 a police, peace or judicial officer, to the Department of Transportation or to the equivalent depart-
 21 ment in the state where the accident occurred, and filed with the insurer within 30 days thereafter
 22 a statement under oath that the insured or the legal representative of the insured has a cause or
 23 causes of action arising out of the accident for damages against a person or persons whose identities
 24 are unascertainable, and setting forth the facts in support thereof.

25 (h) "State" includes the District of Columbia, a territory or possession of the United States and
 26 a province of Canada.

27 (i) "Stolen vehicle" means an insured vehicle that causes bodily injury to the insured arising
 28 out of a motor vehicle accident if:

29 (A) The vehicle is operated without the consent of the insured;

30 (B) The operator of the vehicle does not have collectible motor vehicle bodily injury liability
 31 insurance;

32 (C) The insured or someone on behalf of the insured reported the accident within 72 hours to
 33 a police, peace or judicial officer or to the equivalent department in the state where the accident
 34 occurred; and

35 (D) The insured or someone on behalf of the insured cooperates with the appropriate law
 36 enforcement agency in the prosecution of the theft of the vehicle.

37 (j) "Sums that the insured or the heirs or legal representative of the insured is legally entitled
 38 to recover as damages" means the amount of damages that:

39 (A) A claimant could have recovered in a civil action from the owner or operator at the time
 40 of the injury after determination of fault or comparative fault and resolution of any applicable de-
 41 fenses;

42 (B) Are calculated without regard to the tort claims limitations of ORS 30.260 to 30.300; and

43 (C) Are no larger than benefits payable under the terms of the policy as provided in subsection
 44 (7) of this section.

45 (k) "Uninsured vehicle," except as provided in paragraph (L) of this provision, means:

1 (A) A vehicle with respect to the ownership, maintenance or use of which there is no collectible
2 motor vehicle bodily injury liability insurance, in at least the amounts or limits prescribed for bodily
3 injury or death under ORS 806.070 applicable at the time of the accident with respect to any person
4 or organization legally responsible for the use of the vehicle, or with respect to which there is
5 collectible bodily injury liability insurance applicable at the time of the accident but the insurance
6 company writing the insurance denies coverage or the company writing the insurance becomes vol-
7 untarily or involuntarily declared bankrupt or for which a receiver is appointed or becomes insol-
8 vent. It shall be a disputable presumption that a vehicle is uninsured in the event the insured and
9 the insurer, after reasonable efforts, fail to discover within 90 days from the date of the accident,
10 the existence of a valid and collectible motor vehicle bodily injury liability insurance applicable at
11 the time of the accident.

12 (B) A hit-and-run vehicle.

13 (C) A phantom vehicle.

14 (D) A stolen vehicle.

15 (E) A vehicle that is owned or operated by a self-insurer:

16 (i) That is not in compliance with ORS 806.130 (1)(c); or

17 (ii) That provides recovery to an insured in an amount that is less than the sums that the in-
18 sured or the heirs or legal representative of the insured is legally entitled to recover as damages
19 for bodily injury or death that is caused by accident and that arises out of owning, maintaining or
20 using an uninsured vehicle.

21 (L) "Uninsured vehicle" does not include:

22 (A) An insured vehicle, unless the vehicle is a stolen vehicle;

23 (B) Except as provided in paragraph (k)(E) of this subsection, a vehicle that is owned or oper-
24 ated by a self-insurer within the meaning of any motor vehicle financial responsibility law, motor
25 carrier law or any similar law;

26 (C) A vehicle that is owned by the United States of America, Canada, a state, a political sub-
27 division of any such government or an agency of any such government;

28 (D) A land motor vehicle or trailer, if operated on rails or crawler-treads or while located for
29 use as a residence or premises and not as a vehicle;

30 (E) A farm-type tractor or equipment designed for use principally off public roads, except while
31 actually upon public roads; or

32 (F) A vehicle owned by or furnished for the regular or frequent use of the insured or any
33 member of the household of the insured.

34 (m) "Vehicle" means every device in, upon or by which any person or property is or may be
35 transported or drawn upon a public highway, but does not include devices moved by human power
36 or used exclusively upon stationary rails or tracks.

37 (3) This coverage applies only to accidents that occur on and after the effective date of the
38 policy, during the policy period and within the United States of America, its territories or pos-
39 sessions, or Canada.

40 (4)(a) This coverage does not apply to bodily injury of an insured with respect to which the in-
41 sured or the legal representative of the insured shall, without the written consent of the insurer,
42 make any settlement with or prosecute to judgment any action against any person or organization
43 who may be legally liable therefor.

44 (b) This coverage does not apply to bodily injury to an insured while occupying a vehicle, other
45 than an insured vehicle, owned by, or furnished for the regular use of, the named insured or any

1 relative resident in the same household, or through being struck by the vehicle.

2 (c) This coverage does not apply so as to inure directly or indirectly to the benefit of any
 3 workers' compensation carrier, any person or organization qualifying as a self-insurer under any
 4 workers' compensation or disability benefits law or any similar law or the State Accident Insurance
 5 Fund Corporation.

6 (d) This coverage does not apply with respect to underinsured motorist benefits unless:

7 (A) The limits of liability under any bodily injury liability insurance applicable at the time of
 8 the accident regarding the injured person have been exhausted by payment of judgments or settle-
 9 ments to the injured person or other injured persons;

10 (B) The described limits have been offered in settlement, the insurer has refused consent under
 11 paragraph (a) of this subsection and the insured protects the insurer's right of subrogation to the
 12 claim against the tortfeasor;

13 (C) The insured gives credit to the insurer for the unrealized portion of the described liability
 14 limits as if the full limits had been received if less than the described limits have been offered in
 15 settlement, and the insurer has consented under paragraph (a) of this subsection; or

16 (D) The insured gives credit to the insurer for the unrealized portion of the described liability
 17 limits as if the full limits had been received if less than the described limits have been offered in
 18 settlement and, if the insurer has refused consent under paragraph (a) of this subsection, the insured
 19 protects the insurer's right of subrogation to the claim against the tortfeasor.

20 (e) When seeking consent under paragraph (a) or (d) of this subsection, the insured shall allow
 21 the insurer a reasonable time in which to collect and evaluate information related to consent to the
 22 proposed offer of settlement. The insured shall provide promptly to the insurer any information that
 23 is reasonably requested by the insurer and that is within the custody and control of the insured.
 24 Consent will be presumed to be given if the insurer does not respond within a reasonable time. For
 25 purposes of this paragraph, a "reasonable time" is no more than 30 days from the insurer's receipt
 26 of a written request for consent, unless the insured and the insurer agree otherwise.

27 (5)(a) As soon as practicable, the insured or other person making claim shall give to the insurer
 28 written proof of claim, under oath if required, including full particulars of the nature and extent of
 29 the injuries, treatment and other details entering into the determination of the amount payable
 30 hereunder. The insured and every other person making claim hereunder shall submit to examinations
 31 under oath by any person named by the insurer and subscribe the same, as often as may reasonably
 32 be required. Proof of claim shall be made upon forms furnished by the insurer unless the insurer fails
 33 to furnish the forms within 15 days after receiving notice of claim.

34 (b) Upon reasonable request of and at the expense of the insurer, the injured person shall submit
 35 to physical examinations by physicians, naturopathic physicians, [*physician assistants*] **physician**
 36 **associates** or nurse practitioners selected by the insurer and shall, upon each request from the
 37 insurer, execute authorization to enable the insurer to obtain medical reports and copies of records.

(b) Within 20 days after an owner executes documents necessary to transfer any rights under an insurance policy or, if the insured is terminally ill, within 20 days after an owner entering any agreement, option, promise or any other form of understanding, expressed or implied, to transfer the policy for value, the life settlement provider shall give written notice to the insurer that issued the insurance policy that the policy has or will become a settled policy. The notice must be accompanied by the documents required by paragraph (c) of this subsection.

(c) The life settlement provider shall deliver a copy of the medical release required under paragraph (a)(B) of this subsection, a copy of the owner's application for the life settlement contract, the notice required under paragraph (b) of this subsection and a request for verification of coverage to the insurer that issued the life policy that is the subject of the life transaction. The Director of the Department of Consumer and Business Services shall develop and approve a form for the request for verification.

(d) The insurer shall respond to a request for verification of coverage submitted on an approved form by a life settlement provider or life settlement broker within 30 calendar days of the date the request is received and shall indicate whether, based on the medical evidence and documents provided, the insurer intends to pursue an investigation at this time regarding the validity of the insurance contract or possible fraud. The insurer shall accept a request for verification of coverage made on a form approved by the director. The insurer shall accept an original or facsimile or electronic copy of such request and any accompanying authorization signed by the owner. Failure by the insurer to meet its obligations under this subsection is a violation of the Insurance Code.

(e) Prior to or at the time of execution of the life settlement contract, the life settlement pro-

1 vider shall obtain a witnessed document in which the owner consents to the life settlement contract,
2 represents that the owner has a full and complete understanding of the life settlement contract, that
3 the owner has a full and complete understanding of the benefits of the life insurance policy, ac-
4 knowledges that the owner is entering into the life settlement contract freely and voluntarily and,
5 for persons with a terminal illness or chronic illness or condition, acknowledges that the insured
6 has a terminal illness or chronic illness and that the terminal illness or chronic illness or condition
7 was diagnosed after the life insurance policy was issued.

8 (f) If a life settlement broker performs any of the activities required of the life settlement pro-
9 vider, the provider is deemed to have fulfilled the requirements of this section that were performed
10 by the broker.

11 (2) All medical information solicited or obtained by any licensee is privileged and confidential
12 under ORS 705.137.

13 (3)(a) All life settlement contracts entered into in this state must provide the owner with an
14 absolute right to rescind the contract before the earlier of 60 calendar days after the date upon
15 which the life settlement contract is executed by all parties or 30 calendar days after the life
16 settlement proceeds have been sent to the owner under subsection (5) of this section.

17 (b) The life settlement provider may condition rescission upon the owner both giving notice and
18 repaying to the life settlement provider within the rescission period all proceeds of the settlement
19 and any premiums, loans and loan interest paid by or on behalf of the life settlement provider in
20 connection with or as a consequence of the life settlement.

21 (c) If the insured dies during the rescission period, the life settlement contract is deemed to have
22 been rescinded, subject to repayment within 60 calendar days of the death of the insured to the life
23 settlement provider or purchaser of all life settlement proceeds and any premiums, loans and loan
24 interest that have been paid by the life settlement provider or purchaser.

25 (d) In the event of any rescission, if the life settlement provider has paid commissions or other
26 compensation to a life settlement broker in connection with the rescinded transaction, the life
27 settlement broker shall refund all such commissions and compensation to the life settlement provider
28 within five business days following receipt of written demand from the life settlement provider. The
29 demand must be accompanied by either the owner's notice of rescission if rescinded at the election
30 of the owner, or the notice of the death of the insured if rescinded by reason of the death of the
31 insured within the applicable rescission period.

32 (4) The life settlement purchaser shall have the right to rescind a life settlement contract within
33 three days after the disclosures mandated by ORS 744.354 (7) are received by the purchaser.

34 (5)(a) The life settlement provider shall instruct the owner to send the executed documents re-
35 quired to effect the change in ownership, assignment or change in beneficiary directly to an inde-
36 pendent escrow agent selected by the provider.

37 (b) Within three business days after the date the escrow agent receives the document, or from
38 the date the life settlement provider receives the documents, if the owner erroneously provides the
39 documents directly to the provider, the provider shall pay or transfer the proceeds of the life
40 settlement into an escrow or trust account maintained in a state or federally chartered financial
41 institution whose deposits are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation.

42 (c) Upon payment of the settlement proceeds into the escrow account, the escrow agent shall
43 deliver the original change in ownership, assignment or change in beneficiary forms to the life
44 settlement provider or related provider trust or other designated representative of the life settle-
45 ment provider. Upon the escrow agent's receipt of the acknowledgment of the properly completed

1 transfer of ownership, assignment or designation of beneficiary from the insurance company, the
 2 escrow agent shall pay the settlement proceeds to the owner.

3 (6) Failure to pay the owner the full contract amount for the life settlement contract within the
 4 time set forth under subsection (5) of this section renders the life settlement contract voidable by
 5 the owner until the time full payment is tendered to and accepted by the owner. Funds are deemed
 6 sent by a life settlement provider to an owner as of the date that the escrow agent either releases
 7 funds for wire transfer to the owner or places a check for delivery to the owner via the United
 8 States Postal Service or another nationally recognized delivery service.

9 (7)(a) Contacts with the insured for the purpose of determining the health status of the insured
 10 by the life settlement provider or life settlement broker after the life settlement has occurred may
 11 be made only by the life settlement provider or broker licensed in this state or its authorized rep-
 12 resentatives and are limited to once every three months for insureds with a life expectancy of more
 13 than one year, and to no more than once per month for insureds with a life expectancy of one year
 14 or less.

15 (b) The limitations set forth in this subsection do not apply to any contacts with an insured for
 16 reasons other than determining the insured's health status.

17 **SECTION 145.** ORS 744.367 is amended to read:

18 744.367. (1) A person may not enter into a life settlement contract at any time prior to the ap-
 19 plication or issuance of a policy that is the subject of a life settlement contract or within a five-year
 20 period commencing with the date of issuance of the insurance policy or certificate. However, this
 21 five-year restriction does not apply if the owner certifies to the life settlement provider that any one
 22 or more of the following conditions has been met within the five-year period:

 25 ered under the prior policy is at least 60 months. The time covered under a group policy is calcu-

28 (b) The owner submits independent evidence to the life settlement provider that one or more of
 29 the following conditions have been met within the five-year period:

30 (A) The owner or insured is terminally ill or chronically ill;

31 (B) The owner's spouse dies;

32 (C) The owner divorces the owner's spouse;

33 (D) The owner retires from full-time employment;

34 (E) The owner becomes physically or mentally disabled and a physician, naturopathic physician
 35 licensed under ORS chapter 685, [*physician assistant*] **physician associate** licensed under ORS
 36 677.505 to 677.525 or nurse practitioner licensed under ORS 678.375 to 678.390 determines that the
 37 disability prevents the owner from maintaining full-time employment; or

38 (F) A final order, judgment or decree is entered by a court of competent jurisdiction, on the
 39 application of a creditor of the owner, adjudicating the owner bankrupt or insolvent, or approving
 40 a petition seeking reorganization of the owner or appointing a receiver, trustee or liquidator to all
 41 or a substantial part of the owner's assets; or

42 (c) The owner enters into a life settlement contract more than two years after the date of issu-
 43 ance of a policy and, with respect to the policy, at all times prior to the date that is two years after
 44 policy issuance, the following conditions are met:

45 (A) Policy premiums have been funded exclusively with unencumbered assets, including an in-

1 terest in the life insurance policy being financed only to the extent of its net cash surrender value,
 2 provided by, or full recourse liability incurred by, the insured or a person closely related to the in-
 3 sured by blood or law or a party having a lawful substantial economic interest in the continued life,
 4 health and bodily safety of the person insured, or a trust established primarily for the benefit of such
 5 parties;

6 (B) There is no agreement or understanding with any other person to guarantee any such li-
 7 ability or to purchase or stand ready to purchase the policy, including through an assumption or
 8 forgiveness of the loan; and

9 (C) Neither the insured nor the policy has been evaluated for settlement.

10 (2) Copies of the independent evidence described in subsection (1)(b) of this section and docu-
 11 ments required by ORS 744.364 (1) must be submitted to the insurer when the life settlement pro-
 12 vider or other party entering into a life settlement contract with an owner submits a request to the
 13 insurer for verification of coverage. The copies must be accompanied by a letter of attestation from
 14 the life settlement provider that the copies are true and correct copies of the documents received
 15 by the life settlement provider.

16 (3) If the life settlement provider submits to the insurer a copy of the owner's or insured's cer-
 17 tification described in and the documents required by ORS 744.364 (1) when the provider submits a
 18 request to the insurer to effect the transfer of the policy or certificate to the life settlement pro-

 28 confirming that the change has been effected or specifying the reasons why the requested change
 29 cannot be processed. The insurer may not unreasonably delay effecting change of ownership or
 30 beneficiary and may not otherwise seek to interfere with any life settlement contract lawfully en-

6 (j) Failing, after payment of a claim, to inform insureds or beneficiaries, upon request by them,

8 (k) Delaying investigation or payment of claims by requiring a claimant or the claimant's phy-
 9 sician, naturopathic physician, [*physician assistant*] **physician associate** or nurse practitioner to

12 (L) Failing to promptly settle claims under one coverage of a policy where liability has become

16 (n) Any of the practices described in ORS 746.233.

17 (2) No insurer shall refuse, without just cause, to pay or settle claims arising under coverages
 18 provided by its policies with such frequency as to indicate a general business practice in this state,
 19 which general business practice is evidenced by:

20 (a) A substantial increase in the number of complaints against the insurer received by the De-
 21 partment of Consumer and Business Services;

22 (b) A substantial increase in the number of lawsuits filed against the insurer or its insureds by
 23 claimants; or

24 (c) Other relevant evidence.

23 **sociate** giving the statement must set forth reasons in the statement why use of a child safety sys-
24 tem, safety belt or safety harness by the person would be impractical or harmful to the person by
25 reason of physical condition, medical problem or body size.

31 **ciate** to the Department of Transportation that the applicant is a person with a disability or a
32 certificate, signed and dated within six months preceding the date of application, by a licensed
33 optometrist that the applicant is a person with a disability because of loss of vision or substantial
34 loss of visual acuity or visual field beyond correction;

35 (2) The state-issued licensing number of the licensed physician, certified nurse practitioner, li-
36 censed [*physician assistant*] **physician associate** or licensed optometrist who signed the certificate
37 described in subsection (1) of this section; and

38 (3) The number of a driver license, driver permit, identification card or parking identification
39 card issued to the applicant by the department.

42 form of a placard to a person who is visiting from a foreign country if the person presents to the
43 department either a valid driver license or other grant of driving privileges from the foreign country
44 or a passport or visa showing that the person is a visitor to the United States and presents one of
45 the following:

1 (a) A valid disabled person parking permit issued by the country that issued the visitor’s pass-
 2 port or visa;

3 (b) A certificate from an official of the agency that issues disabled person parking permits in the
 4 country that issued the visitor’s passport or visa certifying that the person holds a valid disabled
 5 person parking permit; or

6 (c) A certificate from a licensed physician, a licensed nurse practitioner or a licensed [*physician*

29 (ii) Align primary care reimbursement by all purchasers of care; and

43 (b) Health care consumers;

44 (c) Experts in primary care contracting and reimbursement;

45 (d) Independent practice associations;

- 1 (e) Behavioral health treatment providers;
- 2 (f) Third party administrators;
- 3 (g) Employers that offer self-insured health benefit plans;
- 4 (h) The Department of Consumer and Business Services;
- 5 (i) Carriers;
- 6 (j) A statewide organization for mental health professionals who provide primary care;
- 7 (k) A statewide organization representing federally qualified health centers;

- 10 (n) A statewide professional association for physicians;
- 11 (o) A statewide professional association for nurses; and
- 12 (p) The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services.

 28 or naturopathic physician.

- 31 (B) Oregon Board of Naturopathic Medicine;
- 32 (C) Oregon Board of Optometry;
- 33 (D) Oregon Medical Board;
- 34 (E) Oregon State Board of Nursing; and
- 35 (F) State Board of Pharmacy.

36 (2) A health care practitioner may practice, without compensation and in connection with a

 16 shall provide to the appropriate health professional regulatory board proof, as determined sufficient

 19 practitioner is authorized to practice.

20 (6)(a) The coordinating organization or other entity that uses the services of a health care
 21 practitioner shall confirm with the health care practitioner's licensing agency that the health care

23 (A) Authorized to practice the health care profession claimed by the health care practitioner;

24 (B) In good standing; and

25 (C) Not subject to any active disciplinary actions.

26 (b) The coordinating organization or other entity shall maintain:

27 (A) Records of the information described in paragraph (a) of this subsection related to a health
 28 care practitioner for two years after the termination of the health care practitioner's practice in this

30 (B) Records of patients to whom a health care practitioner provided services, in compliance with
 31 all patient confidentiality requirements of this state, except as those requirements are expressly

 34 for actual incurred travel costs associated with the health care practitioner's practice under this

36 (7) A hospital or other health care facility may not use the services of a health care practitioner
 37 in order to meet staffing needs during a labor dispute at the hospital or facility.

38 (8)(a) A health professional regulatory board may adopt by rule a duration longer than 30 days
 39 each calendar year during which a health care practitioner may practice under subsection (2) of this
 40 section.

41 (b) A health professional regulatory board may adopt other rules necessary to carry out this
 42 section, including rules requiring a health care practitioner to receive approval of and confirmation
 43 from the health professional regulatory board that the health care practitioner is authorized to
 44 practice under this section.

45 (9) This section does not create a private right of action against a health professional regulatory

1 board or limit the liability of a health professional regulatory board under any other provision of
