SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Requires [Higher Education Coordinating Commission, in collaboration with] Oregon Health Authority[,] to establish grant program for purpose of distributing moneys to institutions of higher education and organizations that administer training programs to develop training and instructional programs that prepare students to enter into behavioral health workforce. Appropriates moneys from General Fund to authority to carry out grant program. Establishes timelines for distributing funds to approved grant applicants.

Requires Higher Education Coordinating Commission, in collaboration with State Workforce and Talent Development Board, [and Oregon Health Authority, to establish grant program to award grants to local workforce development boards that promote workforce development in field of behavioral health] to establish behavioral health workforce development program to be administered by local workforce development boards.

Appropriates moneys from General Fund to Higher Education Coordinating Commission to carry out provisions related to [grant] workforce development programs. Establishes timelines for distributing funds to local workforce development boards for purposes of administering workforce development program.

Directs Higher Education Coordinating Commission and Oregon Health Authority to meet certain reporting requirements concerning use of grant funds and progress and outcomes of behavioral health workforce development programs.

Requires Oregon Health Authority to collect and report data regarding recipient use of incentives provided for recruitment and retention of behavioral health workforce and to collect data regarding grants awarded by authority to provide supervised clinical experience for certain behavioral health care providers.

Establishes oversight council to advise Oregon Health Authority in identifying and eliminating systemic barriers that influence funding, allocation of funding and policy choices with respect to behavioral health workforce.

Takes effect on 91st day following adjournment sine die.

4 SECTION 1. Sections 2 and 4 of this 2023 Act are added to and made a part of ORS 660.300

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- 6 <u>SECTION 2.</u> (1) As used in this section:
- 7 (a) "Community college" has the meaning given that term in ORS 341.005.
- 8 (b) "Institution of higher education" means:
- 9 (A) A public or private college or university.
- 10 (B) A community college.
- 11 (C) A nonprofit college or university.
- 12 (c) "Nonprofit college or university" means a college or university that is exempt from
- 13 federal income tax under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and that is accred-

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1	ited by a regional accrediting association or a national successor of the accrediting associ-
2	ation.
3	(d) "Training program" means a course of study that results in certification, licensure
4	or other credentials recognized in the field of behavioral health.
5	(e) "University" includes:
6	(A) A public university listed in ORS 352.002.
7	(B) Oregon Health and Science University.
8	(C) An Oregon-based private university, including out-of-state private universities that
9	have campuses located in Oregon.
10	(2) The Oregon Health Authority shall establish a grant program for the purpose of dis-
11	tributing moneys to institutions of higher education, and organizations that administer
12	training programs, to develop training and instructional programs that prepare students to
13	enter into the behavioral health workforce.
14	(3) Moneys awarded to a grant recipient under subsection (2) of this section may be used
15	for:
16	(a) Scholarships or other tuition assistance for students going into the field of behavioral
17	health.
18	(b) Developing pathways to employment opportunities in the field of behavioral health.

25	(A) Include a methodology for reviewing and approving grant applications;
26	(B) Establish grant application periods that enable the authority to distribute grant funds
27	in accordance with grant distribution requirements established under section 3 of this 2023
28	Act; and
29	(C) Require that any grant moneys awarded to an institution of higher education must
30	be used for training programs administered in this state.
31	(b) The authority shall award grants based on the ability of the applicant to use the grant
32	as required under subsection (3) of this section.
33	(5) A recipient of grant moneys under this section shall compile and submit information
34	to the Oregon Health Authority as deemed necessary by the authority to enable the author-
35	ity to meet the reporting requirements under sections 8 and 11 of this 2023 Act.
36	(6) The Oregon Health Authority may adopt any rules necessary for the implementation
37	and administration of this section.
38	SECTION 3. The Oregon Health Authority shall distribute the funds specifically appro-
39	priated to the authority under section 6 of this 2023 Act to approved institutions of higher
40	education, and organizations that administer training programs, at the conclusion of a grant
41	application period established under section 6 of this 2023 Act, but not later than July 1, 2024.
42	If unallocated funds remain at the conclusion of the grant acceptance period, the authority
43	may establish a supplemental grant period and distribute the unallocated funds no later than
44	July 1, 2025.

2 <u>SECTION 7.</u> In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropri-3 ated to the Higher Education Coordinating Commission, for the biennium beginning July 1, 4 2023, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$5,000,000, for carrying out the provisions of 5 section 4 of this 2023 Act.

6 <u>SECTION 8.</u> Not later than September 1 of each year the Oregon Health Authority shall 7 submit a report, in the manner provided by ORS 192.245, setting forth in detail the progress 8 and outcomes of the provisions of section 2 of this 2023 Act, to the interim committees of 9 the Legislative Assembly related to health.

10 <u>SECTION 9.</u> Not later than September 1 of each year, the Higher Education Coordinating 11 Commission shall submit a report, in the manner provided by ORS 192.245, setting forth in 12 detail the progress and outcomes of the provisions of section 4 of this 2023 Act, to the in-13 terim committees of the Legislative Assembly related to health.

SECTION 10. (1) The Higher Education Coordinating Commission shall annually submit to the interim committees of the Legislative Assembly related to health, no later than September 1 of each year, information related to grants awarded under section 4 of this 2023 Act and the use of grant funds. The commission shall include with the submitted information an anonymous and aggregated list of the students who received tuition assistance or scholarships funded by the grant moneys awarded to their institutions of higher education under section 4 of this 2023 Act, categorized by the students':

(1) The Oregon Health Authority shall annually submit to the interim committees of the Legislative Assembly related to health, no later than September 1 of each 32year, information related to grants awarded to institutions of higher education and organ-33 34 izations that administer training programs under section 2 of this 2023 Act and the use of grant funds. The authority shall include with the submitted information an anonymous and 35 aggregated list of the students who received tuition assistance or scholarships funded by the 36 37 grant moneys awarded to their institutions of higher education and organizations that ad-38 minister training programs under section 2 of this 2023 Act, categorized by the students':

(1) The Oregon Health Authority shall collect and report geographic data 4 and data described in ORS 413.164 and on the recipients of incentives under ORS 675.655. 5 (2) Any entity that contracts with the Oregon Health Authority to administer incentives 6 under ORS 675.655 shall collect and biannually report to the authority data described in ORS 7 413.164 on the recipients of the incentives. 8 9 (3) Each recipient of a grant under ORS 675.658 shall collect and biannually report to the Oregon Health Authority data described in ORS 413.164 on the associates or other individuals 10 receiving clinical supervision from the grantee. 11 12(4) The Oregon Health Authority shall prescribe by rule the form and manner for re-13 porting the data collected under this section. The authority shall enter data received under this section into the data system described in ORS 413.163. 14 15 (5) Data collected and reported under this section may be disclosed only in the aggregate and in a form that does not allow for the personal identification of individuals whose data is 16 disclosed. 17 18 SECTION 13. In addition to the requirements for data collection and reporting under section 12 of this 2023 Act, the Oregon Health Authority shall annually submit to the interim 19 committees of the Legislative Assembly related to health, not later than September 1 of each 20year, an anonymous and aggregated list of licensed providers that received grant moneys 2122under ORS 675.658 and the associates or other individuals receiving clinical supervision from 23the grantee, categorized by: 24 (1) Age; (2) Ethnicity: 2526(3) Gender; (4) **Race;** 27(5) Disability: 2829(6) Language spoken; 30 (7) Sexual orientation; 31 (8) County of residence; and (9) County in which the clinical supervision occurred. 32SECTION 14. (1) An oversight council is established to advise the Oregon Health Au-33 34 thority in carrying out ORS 675.650, 675.655 and 675.658. The council shall assist the authority 35 in identifying and eliminating systemic barriers that influence the funding, allocation of funding and policy choices with respect to the behavioral health workforce. The authority 36 37 shall provide the council with regular, ongoing updates on the implementation of ORS 38 675.650, 675.655 and 675.658 and other programs designed to expand access to behavioral health providers in this state, including information about deadlines for program applicants, 39 outreach plans and strategies to increase participation in the programs, application pro-40 cesses and the demographics of individuals receiving incentives or benefits. 41

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 - (2) The council consists of 19 members appointed as follows:
- (a) The Speaker of the House of Representatives shall appoint two members of the 43 council from among the members of the House of Representatives. 44
- (b) The President of the Senate shall appoint two members of the council from among 45

the members of the Senate. 1 2 (c) The Governor shall appoint: (A) Two representatives of county governments; 3 (B) One representative of community mental health programs; 4 (C) Two representatives of the federally recognized Indian tribes in this state; 5 (D) Two academic professionals with expertise in equity, behavioral health or workforce 6 7 development; (E) Two representatives of labor unions that represent professionals in the field of be-8 9 havioral health; 10 (F) Three individuals with practical experience in one or more of the following fields: (i) Treatment for substance use disorder, gambling addiction or other addictive behav-11 12iors; 13 (ii) Mental health treatment; (iii) Post-secondary or adult education; 14 (iv) Primary and secondary education; or 15 (v) Child care or early learning; and 16 (G) Three individuals who are one or more of the following: 17 18 (i) An individual who experiences racism or racial injustice; (ii) A resident of an area that is underserved in access to behavioral health treatment 19 or a resident of a rural area of this state; 20(iii) An advocate for equity or an equity professional; 2122(iv) A bilingual or non-English speaker; (v) An individual with life experience in seeking or receiving mental health care; 23(vi) An individual with life experience with substance use, problem gambling or addiction; 24 (vii) A culturally specific peer support worker or traditional health worker; 25(viii) An individual who has experienced challenges in joining or advancing in the behav-2627ioral health workforce; (ix) A student who has lived experiences with, or a demonstrated understanding of, issues 28facing Black or Indigenous communities or other communities of color; or 2930 (x) An individual with a disability. 31 (3) A majority of the voting members of the council constitutes a quorum for the trans-32action of business. (4) Official action by the council requires the approval of a majority of the voting mem-33 34 bers of the council. 35 (5) The council shall elect one of its members to serve as chairperson. (6) If there is a vacancy for any cause, the appointing authority shall make an appoint-36 37 ment to become immediately effective. 38 (7) The council shall meet at times and places specified by the call of the chairperson or of a majority of the voting members of the council. 39 (8) The council may adopt rules necessary for the operation of the council. 40 (9) The authority shall provide staff support to the council and shall make and publish 41 recordings of each meeting. 42 (10) Members of the Legislative Assembly appointed to the council are nonvoting mem-43 bers of the council and may act in an advisory capacity only. 44 (11) Members of the council who are not members of the Legislative Assembly are enti-45

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1 tled to stipends in amounts sufficient to compensate them for their time and for ancillary

2 costs, such as child care, necessary for them to attend the meetings and to reimbursement

3 for travel and other expenses reasonably incurred by them in carrying out their official du-

4 ties as provided in ORS 292.495.

5 (12) All agencies of state government, as defined in ORS 174.111, are directed to assist

6 the council in the performance of the duties of the council and, to the extent permitted by

7 laws relating to confidentiality, to furnish information and advice the members of the council

8 consider necessary to perform their duties.

9 <u>SECTION 15.</u> This 2023 Act takes effect on the 91st day after the date on which the 2023
10 regular session of the Eighty-second Legislative Assembly adjourns sine die.

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
