SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

[Prohibits energy utility from disconnecting service to residential customer for failure to pay amount owed for energy services.]

[Prohibits energy utility from seeking to collect from residential customer who spends six percent or more of household income on energy costs.]

[Requires energy utility to accept reasonable partial payment or payment plan for overdue amounts. Requires any partial payment or payment plan to be less than six percent of customer's household monthly income.]

[Permits energy utility to recover costs for overdue amounts in rates to all residential service customers.]

[Requires energy utility to provide Housing and Community Services Department with contact information for residential customers who have higher than average energy usage. Requires department to contact customers to help customers access programs and resources that may assist with reducing energy usage.]

Extends sunset for requirement that Public Utility Commission provide, through rates charged to all customers of electric companies, collection of moneys for low-income electric bill payment and crisis assistance.

Removes requirement that assistance be only for customers who lost income due to circumstances arising from disease caused by severe acute respiratory syndrome coronavirus 2 (SARS-CoV-2).

Reduces amount to be collected per calendar year from \$10 million to \$5 million.

4 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

5 **SECTION 1.** Section 3, chapter 536, Oregon Laws 2021, is amended to read:

Sec. 3. (1) In addition to the funds collected pursuant to [section 2 (1) of this 2021 Act] ORS

7 757.698 (1) and subject to the limitation set forth in [section 2 (1)(c) of this 2021 Act] ORS 757.698

8 (1)(c), the Public Utility Commission shall provide for, through rates charged to all customers of

9 electric companies, as defined in ORS 757.600, collection of [\$10] \$5 million per calendar year for

10 low-income electric bill payment and crisis assistance.

11 (2) Notwithstanding [section 2 (1) of this 2021 Act] **ORS 757.698** (1), the rates established by the 12 commission for low-income electric bill payment and crisis assistance may not be less than the rates 13 in effect on [the effective date of this 2021 Act] **January 1, 2022**.

(3) Notwithstanding [section 2 (3) of this 2021 Act] ORS 757.698 (3), for purposes of the addi tional amounts collected pursuant to this section, the Housing and Community Services Department
shall[:]
