## SENATE AMENDMENTS TO SENATE BILL 530

1 On page 1 of the printed bill, delete lines 4 through 24. 2 Delete pages 2 through 7 and insert: "SECTION 1. As used in sections 1 to 11 of this 2023 Act: 3 "(1) 'Biological carbon sequestration' means the removal of carbon from the atmosphere 4 5 by plants and microorganisms and storage of carbon dioxide in vegetation, such as grasslands, marshes or forests, or in soils and oceans. 6 7 "(2) 'Climate resilience' means the capability to anticipate, prepare for, respond to and recover from significant climate-related threats while minimizing damage to social well-8 9 being, the economy and ecosystem functions. 10 "(3) 'Environmental justice community' has the meaning given that term in ORS 182.535. 11 "(4) 'Natural and working lands' means: 12"(a) Lands: 13 "(A) Actively used by an agricultural owner or operator for an agricultural operation, 14 including but not limited to active engagement in farming or ranching; 15"(B) Producing forest products; 16 "(C) Consisting of forests, woodlands, grasslands, sagebrush steppes, deserts, freshwater 17 and riparian systems, wetlands, coastal and estuarine areas or the submerged and 18 submersible lands within Oregon's territorial sea and marine habitats associated with those 19 lands; 20 "(D) That are privately owned and that are eligible for special assessment under ORS 21chapter 308A; "(E) Used for recreational purposes, including, but not limited to, parks, trails, 2223greenbelts and other similar open space lands; or 24"(F) Consisting of trees, other vegetation and soils in urban and near-urban areas, in-25cluding, but not limited to, urban watersheds, street trees, park trees, residential trees and 26riparian habitats; and 27"(b) Lands described in paragraph (a) of this subsection that are: 28"(A) Held in trust by the United States for the benefit of any of the nine federally re-29cognized Indian tribes in this state; "(B) Held in trust by the United States for the benefit of individual members of any of 30 31 the nine federally recognized Indian tribes in this state; 32"(C) Within the boundaries of the reservation of any of the nine federally recognized In-33 dian tribes in this state; or "(D) Otherwise owned or controlled by any of the nine federally recognized Indian tribes 3435 in this state.

(5) 'Natural climate solution' means an activity that enhances or protects net biological 1 2 carbon sequestration on natural and working lands, while maintaining or increasing ecosystem resilience and human well-being. 3 4 "SECTION 2. The Legislative Assembly declares that it is the policy of this state to: "(1) Implement strategies to advance natural climate solutions to mitigate the future 5 impacts of climate change. 6 7 "(2) Invest in research to improve our understanding of: "(a) The effects of natural climate solutions on natural and working lands; 8 9 "(b) The climate, ecosystem and carbon benefits of products from natural and working lands; 10 11 "(c) The contributions of natural climate solutions to reducing greenhouse gas emissions, increasing net carbon sequestration and storage and strengthening climate resilience; and 12"(d) The cobenefits that communities and Indian tribes derive from natural climate sol-1314 utions. "(3) Incentivize and implement natural climate solutions by: 1516 "(a) Securing and leveraging federal and private investments in natural climate solutions on natural and working lands; 17 18 "(b) Prioritizing the use of existing programs; 19 "(c) Ensuring equitable benefits of climate mitigation for environmental justice commu-20nities, landowners and land managers; and 21"(d) Ensuring that a diversity of landowners and managers are able to voluntarily par-22ticipate in incentive-based programs for natural climate solutions and climate resilience 23through activities that may include, but are not limited to: "(A) Removing barriers for Indian tribes, environmental justice communities, landowners 24 25and land managers to engage in natural climate solutions or access funding to support na-26tural climate solutions; 27"(B) Identifying resources to provide incentives to land managers interested in voluntarily adopting practices that optimize natural climate solutions; 28 29"(C) Strengthening education, engagement and technical assistance efforts for land managers, Indian tribes and environmental justice communities; 30 "(D) Providing financial assistance for Indian tribes, local governments or nongovern-3132mental organizations for the purpose of entering into voluntary transactions with willing 33 landowners to acquire natural and working lands to enhance the local benefits of natural climate solutions; 34"(E) Increasing and deploying natural climate solutions in and around our urban and 35 built environment; and 36 "(F) Optimizing the social, health, ecological, climate resilience and economic benefits 37 38 of natural climate solutions, including: "(i) Reducing heat island effects; 39 40 "(ii) Improving air quality; 41 "(iii) Improving flood control; "(iv) Improving soil health and productivity; 42 43 "(v) Improving wildfire resilience and community protection; 44 "(vi) Improving drought resilience and response; "(vii) Improving stream health, wetland recovery and riparian functionality; 45

"(viii) Protecting and recovering drinking watersheds for enhanced water quality and 1  $\mathbf{2}$ quantity; "(ix) Maintaining or increasing short-term, mid-term and long-term fiber supplies; 3 4 "(x) Maintaining or increasing food supplies; "(xi) Increasing the climate resilience of fish, wildlife and their habitats; 5 6 "(xii) Improving protection for coastal communities from the impacts of storm surge; 7 and "(xiii) Improving public health. 8 "SECTION 3. (1) The Natural and Working Lands Fund is established in the State 9 Treasury, separate and distinct from the General Fund. Interest earned by the Natural and 10 11 Working Lands Fund shall be credited to the fund. Moneys in the Natural and Working Lands Fund are continuously appropriated to the Oregon Watershed Enhancement Board for 1213the purpose of transferring moneys to the funds described in subsection (2) of this section as directed by the Oregon Global Warming Commission under section 4 of this 2023 Act. 14 15(2) The board shall annually transfer moneys in the Natural and Working Lands Fund 16 to the following funds in accordance with section 4 of this 2023 Act: "(a) The Agriculture Natural Climate Solutions Fund established under section 12 of this 1718 2023 Act. 19 "(b) The Forestry Natural Climate Solutions Fund established under section 13 of this 2023 Act. 2021(c) The Watershed Natural Climate Solutions Fund established under section 14 of this 222023 Act. (d) The Fish and Wildlife Natural Climate Solutions Fund established under section 15 23of this 2023 Act. 2425"SECTION 4. (1)(a) The Oregon Global Warming Commission shall annually determine 26amounts to be allocated from the Natural and Working Lands Fund. The commission shall 27evaluate the following factors when determining amounts to allocate under this subsection: "(A) The expected ability of each agency to carry out programs or other activities under 2829this section; and "(B) The degree to which moneys allocated to the agency may be used to secure federal 30 funding or other sources of funding. 31"(b) Prior to determining the allocations under this subsection, the commission shall 3233 consult with the State Department of Agriculture, the State Forestry Department, the State Department of Fish and Wildlife and the Oregon Watershed Enhancement Board to deter-34mine each agency's proposed uses for moneys allocated from the Natural and Working Lands 35 Fund. 36 "(c) In accordance with the provisions of ORS chapter 183, the commission may adopt 37 38 rules for determining the amount of allocations to agencies as provided in this subsection. "(2) The Oregon Watershed Enhancement Board shall transfer moneys under section 3 39 40 of this 2023 Act when directed to do so by the commission in the amounts determined by the 41 commission. 42"(3) The State Department of Agriculture, the State Forestry Department and the Oregon Watershed Enhancement Board shall use moneys allocated from the Natural and 43 44 Working Lands Fund to establish and implement programs to: "(a) Provide incentives to help landowners, Indian tribes, land managers and environ-45

1 mental justice communities adopt practices that support natural climate solutions; and

2 "(b) Provide financial assistance for technical support for landowners, Indian tribes, land 3 managers and environmental justice communities for the adoption of natural climate sol-4 utions.

5 "(4) Of the moneys expended by each agency pursuant to subsection (3) of this section, 6 priority shall be given to expenditures for:

"(a) Technical assistance to environmental justice communities or Indian tribes; and

8 "(b) Incentives for programs or activities supported by an environmental justice com-9 munity or supported by a resolution of an Indian tribe, with priority given to those projects 10 or activities administered or proposed by an environmental justice community or an Indian 11 tribe.

12 "(5) The State Department of Fish and Wildlife shall use moneys allocated from the Na-13 tural and Working Lands Fund to promote natural climate solutions and mitigate the future 14 impacts of climate change by:

15 "(a) Conducting research to understand:

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16 "(A) The effects of natural climate solutions on natural and working lands;

"(B) The climate, ecosystem and carbon benefits of products from natural and working
lands;

19 "(C) The contributions of natural climate solutions to reducing greenhouse gas emissions,

20 increasing net carbon sequestration and storage and strengthening climate resilience; and

21 "(D) The cobenefits to communities and Indian tribes that derive from natural climate 22 solutions.

"(b)(A) Relying on existing programs where possible, securing federal matching funds or
 other sources of funding to support investments in natural climate solutions on natural and
 working lands.

"(B) In carrying out this paragraph, the department shall ensure the benefits of natural
 climate solutions are equitably distributed among landowners, Indian tribes, land managers
 and environmental justice communities.

29 "(6) The State Department of Agriculture, the State Forestry Department, the State 30 Department of Fish and Wildlife and the Oregon Watershed Enhancement Board, in consul-31 tation with the Oregon Global Warming Commission, may adopt rules as necessary to carry 32 out the programs described in this section. Rules adopted by agencies administering pro-33 grams for financial assistance or incentives may include, but need not be limited to, rules 34 establishing application procedures, eligibility criteria, maximum amounts for individual 35 grant awards and reporting requirements for grant recipients.

"(7) The Oregon Global Warming Commission, the State Department of Agriculture, the
 State Forestry Department, the State Department of Fish and Wildlife and the Oregon
 Watershed Enhancement Board shall jointly:

39 "(a) Coordinate, to the maximum extent practicable, on the development and implemen-40 tation of programs and activities related to natural climate solutions to reduce duplication 41 and overlapping or redundant efforts;

42 "(b) Review, at regular intervals, progress made in implementing natural climate sol43 utions and barriers to future implementation;

44 "(c) Identify opportunities for cross-agency coordination on natural climate solutions;
 45 and

1 "(d) Identify opportunities for leveraging natural climate solution capacities across 2 agencies.

3 "(8) The Oregon Global Warming Commission shall provide a summary of the uses of the 4 Natural and Working Lands Fund, and identify additional funding needs, in a report to the 5 committees of the Legislative Assembly related to the environment, in the manner provided 6 by ORS 192.245, no later than September 15 of each year.

7 "(9) The State Department of Energy shall provide staff support to the commission for 8 the purpose of carrying out the commission's responsibilities under this section. The de-9 partment may contract with a third party to provide staff support services described in this 10 subsection.

SECTION 5. (1) No later than December 1 of each even-numbered year, the Oregon Global Warming Commission, in consultation with the State Department of Energy, the State Department of Agriculture, the State Forestry Department, the State Department of Fish and Wildlife and the Oregon Watershed Enhancement Board, shall submit a report, in the manner provided by ORS 192.245, to the interim committees of the Legislative Assembly related to the environment and the Governor. The report shall include:

"(a) A list of projects funded by the Natural and Working Lands Fund during the previous
24 months and the amount expended for each project.

"(b) A summary of state, federal and private sources of funding for natural climate solutions projects funded by the Natural and Working Lands Fund established under section 3
of this 2023 Act.

"(c) An assessment of projects described in paragraphs (a) and (b) of this subsection in
light of the baseline and metrics adopted under section 6 of this 2023 Act.

"(d) A list of projects, grants or other activities that are planned for the upcoming cal endar year.

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"(e) A list of projects deployed in environmental justice communities.

27 "(2) Before finalizing the report under subsection (1) of this section, the commission shall 28 solicit public comment on the report and include a summary of comments received in the 29 final version of the report submitted to the Legislative Assembly and Governor.

30 "(3) The State Department of Energy shall provide staff support to the commission for 31 the purpose of preparing the report under this section. The department may contract with 32 a third party to provide staff support services described in this subsection.

33 "<u>SECTION 6.</u> (1) The State Department of Energy and the Oregon Global Warming 34 Commission shall, in coordination with the State Forestry Department, the State Depart-35 ment of Agriculture, the State Department of Fish and Wildlife, the Oregon Watershed En-36 hancement Board the Department of State Lands, the State Parks and Recreation 37 Department and the Department of Land Conservation and Development, and in consultation 38 with relevant federal agencies, establish and maintain:

"(a) A net biological carbon sequestration and storage baseline for natural and working
 lands;

41 "(b) Activity-based metrics in accordance with subsection (3) of this section; and

42 "(c) Community impact metrics in accordance with subsection (4) of this section.

43 "(2) The net biological carbon sequestration and storage baseline may use 1990 as a
44 baseline year if the department determines that there is adequate information to support
45 setting the baseline at that year.

1 "(3) Activity-based metrics shall be used to evaluate progress toward increasing net bi-2 ological carbon sequestration and storage in natural and working lands, as measured against 3 the net carbon sequestration and storage baseline. Activity-based metrics may include, but 4 need not be limited to, acres of lands for which certain management practices have been 5 adopted.

6 "(4) Community impact metrics shall be used to evaluate the positive and negative ef-7 fects, over time, of strategies for net biological carbon sequestration and storage in natural 8 and working lands on landowners, land managers and communities. Community impact 9 metrics may include, but need not be limited to:

"(a) Metrics to measure the effects of net biological carbon sequestration and storage
 strategies on jobs, local economies, environmental integrity and public health; and

"(b) Metrics to evaluate the accessibility of a diverse range of landowners to net biolog ical carbon sequestration and storage programs.

"(5) Before finalizing the net biological carbon sequestration and storage baseline, activity-based metrics and community impact metrics, the State Department of Energy and the commission shall make draft versions publicly available and receive comments from the public, state agencies and the advisory committee established under section 10 of this 2023 Act.

"(6) The State Department of Energy and the Oregon Global Warming Commission, in consultation with the State Forestry Department, the State Department of Agriculture, the Oregon Watershed Enhancement Board, the State Department of Fish and Wildlife, shall, no later than January 1, 2025, establish nonbinding biological carbon sequestration and storage goals for Oregon's natural and working lands and update those goals as new information becomes available.

25 "(7) The State Department of Energy may contract with a third party to assist the de-26 partment in performing its duties under this section.

27 "<u>SECTION 7.</u> (1) The State Department of Energy and the Oregon Global Warming 28 Commission, in coordination with the State Forestry Department, the State Department of 29 Agriculture, the Oregon Watershed Enhancement Board, the Department of State Lands, the 30 Department of Land Conservation and Development and federal land management partners, 31 shall develop a natural and working lands net biological carbon sequestration and storage 32 inventory. The inventory must:

"(a) Be based on the best available field-based and remote sensing data on biological
 carbon sequestration;

35 "(b) To the greatest extent possible, be developed using methods consistent with methods 36 used to assess greenhouse gas fluxes related to land use, land change and forestry for the 37 United States Environmental Protection Agency's Inventory of U.S. Greenhouse Gas Emis-38 sions and Sinks; and

"(c) Where feasible, utilize information from the environmental justice mapping tool de veloped under section 12, chapter 58, Oregon Laws 2022.

41 "(2) Before finalizing the inventory, the State Department of Energy and the commission
42 shall make a draft version publicly available and receive comments from the public, state
43 agencies and the advisory committee established under section 10 of this 2023 Act.

44 "(3) The State Department of Energy shall update the inventory and submit a report
 45 describing the inventory to the Oregon Global Warming Commission no later than December

1 1 of each even-numbered year.

2 "(4) The State Department of Energy may contract with a third party to assist the de-3 partment in performing its duties under this section.

4 "<u>SECTION 8.</u> (1) The State Department of Energy, in coordination with the Oregon 5 Global Warming Commission, shall study the workforce and training programs needed to 6 support adoption of natural climate solutions on natural and working lands.

"(2) The department shall provide the results of the study, and may include recommendations for legislation, in a report to the committees of the Legislative Assembly related to
the environment, in the manner provided under ORS 192.245, no later than September 15,
2024.

"(3) The department may contract with a third party to assist the department in performing its duties under this section.

"SECTION 9. Section 8 of this 2023 Act is repealed on January 2, 2025.

14 "<u>SECTION 10.</u> (1) The Oregon Global Warming Commission may appoint a natural and 15 working lands advisory committee to advise the commission in the performance of the 16 commission's duties under sections 1 to 11 of this 2023 Act. The commission shall seek rec-17 ommendations for committee members from industry and advocacy associations where ap-18 propriate.

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"(2) The advisory committee shall consist of at least 15 members appointed as follows:

"(a) One member with expertise in tribal culture, customs and government;

"(b) One local government representative from a county whose primary economic activity
is derived from the agriculture, forestry, fishing and hunting industries, as described by code
11 of the North American Industry Classification System;

24 "(c) One member with expertise in urban forestry or parks management;

"(d) Three members with experience in forestry or forest products, including one member
who is a private forest landowner with less than 5,000 acres of forestland;

"(e) Two members with expertise in agriculture, including one member who owns a small
family farming operation;

29 "(f) One member with expertise in livestock;

30 "(g) One member with expertise in blue carbon;

31 "(h) One member with expertise in environmental justice;

32 "(i) Two members with expertise in conservation or environmental management; and

33 "(j) Two members with expertise in landowner technical assistance.

34 "(3) The commission may appoint additional members as needed to provide additional 35 expertise or represent other interests.

36 "(4) The State Department of Energy shall provide staff support for the advisory com-37 mittee. The department may contract with a third party to provide staff support services 38 under this subsection.

39 "<u>SECTION 11.</u> The Oregon Global Warming Commission shall establish a process for 40 consultation with representatives of federally recognized Indian tribes in this state to advise 41 the commission on the performance of its duties under sections 1 to 11 of this 2023 Act, in-42 cluding the identification of opportunities to support indigenous practices and knowledge 43 from tribal nations to sequester and store carbon on natural and working lands.

44 "<u>SECTION 12.</u> (1) The Agriculture Natural Climate Solutions Fund is established in the
 45 State Treasury, separate and distinct from the General Fund. Interest earned by the Agri-

1 culture Natural Climate Solutions Fund shall be credited to the fund. Moneys in the fund are

2 continuously appropriated to State Department of Agriculture to:

3 "(a) Carry out the provisions of section 4 (3) of this 2023 Act; and

4 "(b) For the administrative expenses of the department in implementing section 4 of this
5 2023 Act, except that no more than 10 percent of moneys may be used for administrative
6 expenses.

"(2) The Agriculture Natural Climate Solutions Fund consists of moneys transferred to
 the fund under section 3 of this 2023 Act.

9 "<u>SECTION 13.</u> (1) The Forestry Natural Climate Solutions Fund is established in the 10 State Treasury, separate and distinct from the General Fund. Interest earned by the 11 Forestry Natural Climate Solutions Fund shall be credited to the fund. Moneys in the fund 12 are continuously appropriated to the State Forestry Department to:

"(a) Carry out the provisions of section 4 (3) of this 2023 Act; and

"(b) For the administrative expenses of the department in implementing section 4 of this
 2023 Act, except that no more than 10 percent of moneys may be used for administrative
 expenses.

"(2) The Forestry Natural Climate Solutions Fund consists of moneys transferred to the
 fund under section 3 of this 2023 Act.

19 "<u>SECTION 14.</u> (1) The Watershed Natural Climate Solutions Fund is established in the 20 State Treasury, separate and distinct from the General Fund. Interest earned by the 21 Watershed Natural Climate Solutions Fund shall be credited to the fund. Moneys in the fund 22 are continuously appropriated to the Oregon Watershed Enhancement Board to:

23 "(a) Carry out the provisions of section 4 (3) of this 2023 Act; and

"(b) For the administrative expenses of the board in implementing section 4 of this 2023
Act, except that no more than 10 percent of moneys may be used for administrative expenses.

"(2) The Watershed Natural Climate Solutions Fund consists of moneys transferred to
 the fund under section 3 of this 2023 Act.

29 "<u>SECTION 15.</u> (1) The Fish and Wildlife Natural Climate Solutions Fund is established in 30 the State Treasury, separate and distinct from the General Fund. Interest earned by the Fish 31 and Wildlife Natural Climate Solutions Fund shall be credited to the fund. Moneys in the fund 32 are continuously appropriated to the State Department of Fish and Wildlife to:

33 "(a) Carry out the provisions of section 4 (5) of this 2023 Act; and

"(b) For the administrative expenses of the department in implementing section 4 of this
 2023 Act, except that no more than 10 percent of moneys may be used for administrative
 expenses.

"(2) The Fish and Wildlife Natural Climate Solutions Fund consists of moneys transferred
 to the fund under section 3 of this 2023 Act.
