Senate Bill 549

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced.**

Directs Oregon Health Authority to modify amounts of grants for school-based health centers for inflation.

Directs authority to select 10 school districts or education service districts to receive schoolbased health center planning grants. Directs Department of Education to select 10 school districts or education service districts to

Directs Department of Education to select 10 school districts or education service districts to receive grants to implement trauma-informed approaches.

Directs department to select 10 school districts or education service districts to receive grants to develop wraparound service delivery hubs in schools.

Declares emergency, effective July 1, 2023.

A BILL FOR AN ACT

2 Relating to schools; and declaring an emergency.

3 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

4 <u>SECTION 1.</u> (1) Grants awarded to school-based health centers by the Oregon Health

5 Authority under ORS 413.225 (4)(a) must be for a minimum of annual amount of \$66,000, ad-6 justed under subsection (2) of this section.

7 (2) To account for effects of inflation, the authority shall, by rule, annually adjust the
8 dollar amount specified in subsection (1) of this section based on the Consumer Price Index
9 for All Urban Consumers, West Region (All Items), as published by the Bureau of Labor
10 Statistics of the United States Department of Labor.

11 <u>SECTION 2.</u> In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropri-12 ated to the Oregon Health Authority, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, out of the 13 General Fund, the amount of \$936,000 to carry out the provisions of section 1 of this 2023 14 Act.

15 **SECTION 3.** (1) As used in this section:

(a) "School-based health center" has the meaning given that term in ORS 413.225.

(b) "School nurse model" means a model for providing school-based health services that
is in accord with guidance from the division of the Oregon Health Authority that addresses
adolescent health.

(2) The authority, in consultation with the Department of Education, shall select 10
 school districts or education service districts to receive planning grants for district planning
 and technical assistance. Each district receiving a grant, beginning on or after July 1, 2023,
 and concluding before July 1, 2025, shall:

(a) Evaluate the need for school-based health services in the community of the district;
 and

26 (b) Develop a school-based health services plan that addresses the need identified in

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1 paragraph (a) of this subsection.

2 (3) The authority shall contract with a nonprofit organization with experience in facili-3 tating school health planning initiatives and supporting school-based health centers in order 4 to facilitate and oversee the planning process and to provide technical assistance to grantees 5 to reduce costs and ensure better coordination and continuity statewide. To the greatest 6 extent practicable, the nonprofit organization shall engage with culturally specific organiza-7 tions, in the grantees' communities, that have experience providing culturally and linguis-8 tically specific services in schools or after-school programs.

9 (4) Each grantee shall solicit community participation in the planning process, including 10 the participation of the local public health authority, any federally qualified health centers 11 located in the district, a regional health equity coalition, if any, serving the district and every 12 coordinated care organization with members residing in the district.

(5) At the conclusion of the two-year planning process, each grantee shall receive funding
to operate a school-based health center or school nurse model in each respective grantee
school district or education service district.

16 <u>SECTION 4.</u> In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropri-17 ated to the Oregon Health Authority, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, out of the 18 General Fund, the amount of \$950,000 to carry out the provisions of section 3 of this 2023 19 Act.

20 <u>SECTION 5.</u> The Oregon Health Authority shall develop and implement a grant program 21 to issue grants to school districts and education service districts, to be used to increase and 22 improve school-based mental health services. The authority shall ensure that grants are 23 made for the benefit of schools both with and without school-based health centers, as defined 24 in ORS 413.225.

SECTION 6. In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropri ated to the Oregon Health Authority, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, out of the
 General Fund, the amount of \$5,980,000 to carry out the provisions of section 5 of this 2023
 Act.

29 <u>SECTION 7.</u> (1) The Department of Education shall select 10 school districts or education 30 service districts to receive grants to implement programs that use trauma-informed ap-31 proaches to improve educational outcomes.

(2) A school district or education service district may apply for a grant under this section
by submitting an application to the department that describes the district's needs for a grant
under this section and the district's plans for the use of the grant moneys.

(3) In selecting grant recipients, the department shall seek to distribute grant funding
 to maximize improvement of educational outcomes, with reference to factors including,
 without limitation, academic performance, graduation rates, absenteeism, failure rates and
 disciplinary incidents.

(4) The State Board of Education shall adopt rules necessary to carry out the provisions
of this section, including prescribing the timelines for submitting an application under this
section and the form and contents of the application.

42 (5) As used in this section, "trauma-informed approach" has the meaning given that term
43 in section 5, chapter 68, Oregon Laws 2016.

44 <u>SECTION 8.</u> In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropri-45 ated to the Department of Education, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, out of the SB 549

General Fund, the amount of \$5,000,000 to carry out the provisions of section 7 of this 2023 2 Act.

3 SECTION 9. (1) The Department of Education shall select 10 school districts or education service districts to receive grants to develop wraparound service delivery hubs in schools. 4

(2) A school district or education service district may apply for a grant under this section 5 by submitting an application to the department that describes the district's needs for a grant 6 under this section and the district's plans for the use of the grant moneys. 7

(3) In selecting grant recipients, the department shall seek to distribute grant funding 8 9 to maximize improvement of educational outcomes, with reference to factors including, without limitation, academic performance, graduation rates, absenteeism, failure rates and 10 disciplinary incidents. 11

12(4) The State Board of Education shall adopt rules necessary to carry out the provisions of this section, including prescribing the timelines for submitting an application under this 13 section and the form and contents of the application. 14

15 (5) As used in this section, "wraparound service delivery hub" means a central location for the delivery of comprehensive, holistic, child-centered and family-centered services for 16 children experiencing serious mental health or behavioral challenges. 17

18 SECTION 10. In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropriated to the Department of Education, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, out of the 19 General Fund, the amount of \$2,500,000 to carry out the provisions of section 9 of this 2023 20Act. 21

22SECTION 11. This 2023 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public 23peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2023 Act takes effect July 1, 2023. 24

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
