Oregon's Fire Service – serving and protecting our state

Oregon's fire service is comprised of rural fire protection districts and fire departments.

A rural fire protection district (RFPD) is created as a Special District under Oregon statute. RFPD's are governed by an elected Board of Directors in their jurisdiction and are subject to the requirements for fire service at the local, state and national level. An RFPD does not necessarily have to be based in a 'rural' community. In Oregon you can find a RFPD in urban and rural areas of the state.

A fire department is a city or county based fire agency. They operate under the jurisdiction of their local governmental leadership.

Oregon's fire service provides a wide variety of services – including:

- Vehicle extrication
- Fire/injury prevention
- Wildfire response and conflagration response for structural defense and defense of lives
- Basic Life Support

- Ambulance transport services

In Oregon there are over **3000** fire districts and departments protecting Oregonians

94% of Oregon's fire service registers as a volunteer or career/volunteer (combination) district or department.

543,536 incidents including:

a fire every 30 minutes.

a structure fire every 1 hour, 49 minutes. a house fire every 6 hours, 9 minutes. a vehicle fire every 3 hours, 27 minutes

an outside fire every 53 minutes.

On average, fire in Oregon resulted in:

estimated property loss of \$576,000 every day. one civilian death every 5 days. one civilian injury every 3 days. one firefighter injury every 5 days.
