Many years, many hours and a lot of money have been spent on the question of another bridge for our area. Former proposals have been soundly rejected for a number of reasons such as (but not limited to) 1) Vanishingly little if any public money to pay for NEW road construction, preference wisely being given to maintaining what we have. 2) Vanishingly few local residents who are willing to be taxed for something that is far from the top of lists of important issues to be tackled, and 3) the cost to existing farmland, ecosystems, parks, businesses and homes would be far greater than any gain would be.
