The Oregon Alliance is supportive of HB2651 and ask that any amendments related to this legislation specifically name nonprofit providers of Behavior Rehabilitation Services as eligible for these funds. Nonprofit providers are effective, cost-effective, have lower overheads and better client engagement than many government-based services, particularly for children, youth and families who are wary or afraid to engage with formal systems.
