Chair Dembrow and Members of the Senate Committee on Education,

In 1908, neighbors eager to educate their children in the Green Springs area about 20 miles east of Ashland Oregon, worked together to build a one-room schoolhouse along the Emigrant Trail. A path led to a "one-holer" out back. The school, named after nearby Beaver Creek, had two-seater desks, a wood stove, a water bucket and dipper, and a blackboard. Soon, it was remodeled to state standards, including an upgraded wood stove. The "little red schoolhouse" was built in 1930 at its current location.
