Re: <u>SB 160</u> – Reduce or waive certain public records request fees in the public interest – Comments

The League is directly affected by SB 160, which calls for percentage reductions for certain public records request fees. As described in our SB 417 testimony, the League supports fully accessible, responsive, and transparent government operations, from positions for the right to know, for efficiency in government and citizen access to information, and for balancing cybersecurity privacy and transparency needs. The League has advocated for public records law since 1993 in current records. Today's hearing roster has related League testimony, also see 2017 testimony for: HB 2101, HB 481, and SB 106.

SB 160 narrowly circumscribes public records request fee reductions, in numerous ways:

- Population restrictions limit: this only applies to <u>five of 36 Oregon counties</u> and <u>six of Oregon's</u>
 241 <u>municipalities</u>, per the Oregon Blue Book. This may be reasonable since cost is not addressed.
- **Timing**, this bill does not address reasonable request response timing, critical for elections information. Implementation does not take effect until 2027.
- **Media is not defined** in SB 160. Specific media definitions covered in SB 417 apply to the League, which has published candidate and ballot measure information to voters for over 100 years, qualifying as media per SB 417.

FROM SB 417:

- o "News media" or "news media entity" means: The publisher of a periodical that disseminates news, whether through print publication or through electronic dissemination.
- o (d) "Representative of the news media" means: (A) Any person that gathers information of potential interest to a segment of the public, uses editorial skill to turn information into a distinct work and who distributes that work to an audience.

We recommend features of this bill be considered in the context of other public records bills presented here, SB 417 and SB 510.
