It is also critical to note that some of our students who are in need of repairs are in the lowest family income bracket and are dealing with financial stresses causing basic needs and food insecurity.

Considering the potentially high cost and long wait time, it may be easier for me to discard my damaged device and purchase a new one. Unfortunately, this contributes to E-waste, the fastest-growing waste stream in the world, and climate pollution caused by the manufacturing process for devices such as cell phones and laptops.

The Right to Repair Bill would provide all consumers with access to repair information, tools, and replacement parts, allowing them to fix their own devices and extend their lifespan. This bill would not only help students save money, but it would also promote sustainability by reducing the need for new electronics to be produced.

Overall, I strongly believe that the Right to Repair Bill is a necessary step toward creating a more sustainable, accessible, and affordable electronic repair system. I urge you to support this bill and take action to ensure that individuals have the right to repair their own devices.
