The safety of members in my community is important to me, this is why I oppose HB2996. Allowing a person who has not been trained and tested regarding the effects of ionizing radiation not only increases health risks for patients but also to themselves as the dental assistant. Every other member of the dental team (dentists, dental hygienists) is required to pass a radiological safety and proficiency exam before they can expose patients to ionizing radiation, why should the dental assistant be the only exception? Those that are considering passing this bill should ask themselves if they are willing to sit in a dental chair and expose themselves to ionizing radiation at the hands of someone who doesn't know the power it can wield.
