I am a resident of Springfield and I am writing to urge you to vote no on House Bill 2996. This bill, if passed, would forbid the Oregon Board of Dentistry from requiring dental assistants to pass a radiological proficiency exam before taking dental x-rays.

House Bill 2996 is not the solution and it puts dental patients and dental professionals, at risk. I might find myself getting an X-ray by an assistant who is not properly trained, which could increase the chance of my exposure to ionizing radiation, which is associated with a risk of cell damage that can increase the chances of getting cancer.

Please vote no on HB 2996 because it:

- Increases risk to patient and provider, alike
- Waters down the quality of care received by patients
- Devalues the dental assisting profession
- Could worsen the workforce shortage.

Proponents of the bill believe it will solve the dental assistant shortage, but there are dental assistant shortages in every state, including in those states where requirements for entry into the field are much less rigorous than Oregon's. Removing a necessary safety measure will not solve the dental assisting shortage, and it could make it worse. Removing the exam requirement devalues the dental assisting profession, making it more likely that dental assistants will leave for another career. Studies show that professional credentials increase career commitment and job satisfaction. Eliminating professional requirements does the opposite, while putting patients and providers at risk.

An objective radiation safety exam is necessary to protect patients and workers. The current exam, DANB's Radiation Health and Safety (RHS) exam, is convenient and accessible
