## Natalie Break up with Plastics Testimony

"Chair Sollman, Vice-Chair Findley and members of the committee, for the record my name is Natalie and I am a Freshman at University of Oregon, I study Environmental Science and I am an intern with OSPIRG Students at the University of Oregon.

OSPIRG Students is a student run, student funded advocacy organization here on campus. I am working with the beyond plastic campaign working to ban polystyrene in the state of Oregon.

Polystyrene is the foam takeout cups and containers that harm our environment, pollute our land and last for a very long time. The foam cups and containers are singly used and don't break down. Because of this, 70 million foam cups are thrown away in the US every single day. Of these, about one third end up in waterways and most of the remaining waste will spend hundreds and thousands of years sitting in landfills. These plastics never fully break down, and are instead broken into smaller pieces called microplastics that have been ingested by hundreds of different species, including us. Because plastic foam takes hundreds of years to degrade, every piece will continue to pollute and threaten ecosystems for centuries. We need to stop that. Using other options such as; paper or reusable containers are a big impact.
