
CREATING A MORE COMPREHENSIVE CONTINUUM OF CARE

FUNDING FOR OHCS AND ODHS PROGRAMS FOR WRAP-AROUND SERVICES FOR YOUTH AND FAMILIES

RENEW ODHS HOST HOME PROGRAM

\$8.25 million for host home housing that keeps youth in school - or enables them to return to school - by providing:

1. A HOME 2. FOOD 3. A SUPPORTIVE FAMILY



EXPAND GRANTS FOR YOUTH EXPERIENCING HOUSELESSNESS PROGRAM

\$ 15.25 million to expand or enhance existing UHY shelter facilities, outreach, culturally specific services, mental health/substance use services, and other transitional housing options - builds upon existing network to ensure smooth implementation



PREVENTION: SUPPLEMENTAL FUNDS TO PREVENT EVICTIONS AND RAPIDLY REHOUSE YOUTH AND FAMILIES

\$6.25 million in emergency funds to prevent youth and families from becoming houseless in the first place
