Opposition to House Bill 2979

Dear Chair Nosse and Members of the House Committee on Behavioral Health and Health Care,

I have been a Dental Assistant for 11 years. While I do support several sections outlined in this workforce package bill, I am here today to express concern regarding section 9 and 10 of House Bill 2979 in its current language. This section is asking for \$2 million dollars to create free, chairside training modules.

As a dental assistant, I know first-hand on the challenges that the workforce shortage poses on our dental community. While the dental assistant deficit was prevalent nationwide before COVID-19, the pandemic has only exacerbated the shortage. Many of the dental assisting programs responded to this need pre-COVID by increasing their class size and offering curriculum through non-traditional methods.

I am expressing concern because there are already dental assisting training modules available at a very reasonable price through The DALE Foundation (the official affiliate of DANB). These modules support on the job training in rural areas that do not have access to formal dental assisting programs and are updated regularly by educators and subject matter experts to provide participants the skills and knowledge with quality and high standards. This allows anyone (dentists or the public) immediate access to chairside training content and allows the dental assistant to be trained on the job.

Since training modules and remote programs are already available for rural areas, I ask that you amend House Bill 2979, Section 9 & 10.

The \$2 million-dollar funds are better allocated elsewhere.

We understand that there are conversations already occurring addressing the language and we look forward to working together and transparently with the supporters and sponsors of this bill. We believe this bill can be amended to gather overwhelming approval to support each pathway to become a dental assistant in Oregon and help address the critical shortage of dental assistants in our state.

As the American Dental Association's Health Policy Institute Pointed out, shoring up the workforce pipeline will require long term changes.

Let's work on this together and transparently.
