support for SB514. This bill mirrors the successful legislation enacted to support development of a coordinated Youth Suicide Prevention, Intervention and Postvention Plan (YSIPP) for youth ages 5 to 24; established a youth suicide coordinator at OHA; and required formation of an advisory group (Alliance) which has played a vital role in supporting and shaping the work of the YSIPP. Oregon needs to continue to lean into supporting vulnerable young people, failing to provide the same type of supports for adults is short sighted.

Oregon's suicide rate is 30% higher than the national average, according to CDC statistics, and as of 2021 suicide is the second leading cause of death for people ages 10 to 34, and 3<sup>rd</sup> leading cause of death for adults ages 35 – 44. We are also losing many older adults to suicide in communities across Oregon.

Last year, with leadership from OHA, 130 people came together to create a five-year Adult Suicide Intervention and Prevention Plan. This plan will soon be published. In order to achieve its goals, the ASIPP will need both to be carefully coordinated and monitored. SB514 would establish an advisory council, with a membership of 20% lived experience, to monitor progress and provide guidance and feedback. Additionally, the bill ensures that the recently established Adult Suicide Prevention Coordinator position is embedded long-term in the infrastructure of OHA.

Suicide is preventable. We know with coordinated, cross-sector efforts we can help reduce obstacles, provide lifesaving education and connect people with needed resources so that they have the right help at the right time. By passing SB514, we can help the adult plan to live up to its promise it holds to reduce the number of Oregonians who die by suicide across the lifespan.

Please support passage of SB514.

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
